


lobbying when comes to light having the appearance of wrongdoing. In the minds of some, there is a suspicion of both lobbyists and the politicians. This hunting ground for sensation is often fertile. The evils of lobbying come from the evil that is in a few unscrupulous people. It takes a combination of the unscrupulous lobbyist and the unscrupulous official to produce evil. The evil is not inherent in lobbying. as such.

As a matter of fact, it can and does serve a useful purpose for a Member of Congress. Thus far, in the current Session. more than 12,000 bills have been introduced in the House of Representatives. Another 2,000 have been introduced in the Senate. Some of these bills are identical. There still remain enough to make it physically impossible for every Member of Congress to be fully familiar with the contents of each measure.

So, Lobbyists perform a useful function in bringing to the attention of Members the attitude of the citizens they represent. Their numbers and interests are as varied as the segments of our society. The lobbyists are representatives of a particular interest. specialized and able to present arguments for or against a par-


ticular measure, from their IN MILLIORN HOME viewpoint. Then, it is up to the Member of Congress to exercise judgment in whether he considers the arguments persuasive or not.
