

Mrs. T. P. Griffin Of Blackwell Died In Sweetwater

Mrs. Thomas P. Griffin, 79, of Blackwell, died at the Simmons Hospital in Sweetwater at 10:45 a. m., Sunday, Oct. 15, following an illness of about a year. She had been hospitalized for three days.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Tuesday from First Baptist Church in Blackwell, with the Rev. Clarence Minton and the Rev. Kay Corley officiating. Burial was in Lakeview Cemetery in Winters under direction of Spill Funeral Home.

She was born Lillie Pearl Clary Aug. 23, 1888 in Coryell County, and married Mr. Griffin Sept. 29, 1907, at Copperas Cove. For a number of years following their marriage they lived at Killeen. They later moved to Stratford, and in 1933 the family moved to a farm in the Drasco Community north of Winters. In 1939 they moved to Blackwell where they lived until 1949 when Mr. Griffin retired from farming and they moved to Winters. Mr. Griffin died Aug. 15, 1955. Mrs. Griffin then moved to Blackwell where she made her home until about a year ago when she moved to a rest home in Sweetwater.

She was also preceded in death by two daughters.

Mrs. Griffin was a member of the Blackwell First Baptist Church.

Survivors include five children, John T. Griffin of LaCadena, Calif., Lynn Griffin of Los Angeles, Calif., Mrs. T. J. Hart of Glendale, Calif., Mrs. Gerald Townsend of Hereford, and Mrs. Gordon Montgomery of Blackwell; four brothers, Vol Clary of Temple, Ray Clary of Brady, Oscar Clary of San Antonio and Ace Clary of Killeen; three sisters, Mrs. Will Wilson of Brownwood, Mrs. James Norman of Melvin, and Mrs. L. B. Baker of Abilene; ten grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren. Pallbearers were R. Q. West, Travis Downing, Bill McRorey, Emmitt Ware, Dewey Nabors and Bill Johnson.

Former Winters Pastor Died In San Antonio

Word has been received in Winters of the death of the Rev. Charles Taylor, who had served as pastor of Mt. Carmel Catholic Church until going to San Antonio where he was hospitalized recently. He died in San Antonio.

He also served as pastor of St. Joseph's Catholic Church in Ballinger while holding the Winters pastorate.

He was born in Beeville and was ordained to the priesthood 45 years ago, the first candidate from the Present See of Corpus Christi.

Most of his service was with churches in the Southwest Texas area.

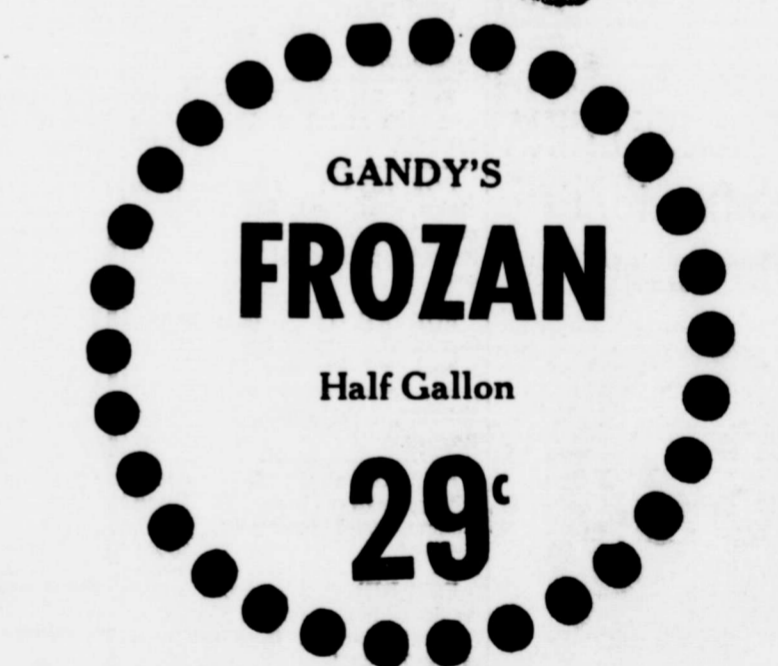

Blizzards Lose 25-0 To Fast-Moving Indians In First Conference Tilt

The Haskell Indians, undefeated in six games, continued their winning ways by the score of 25-0 over the Winters Blizzards last Friday night.

For the entire first quarter the Blizzards moved the ball well as backs Arlon Barnes and "Jackrabbit" Greer swept around the ends. But each drive was duffed by fumbles and mistakes.

With 7:27 left in the second quarter, Haskell quarterback

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Ivy passed 35 yards to all-district end Ray Herren. In their next possession of the ball, Tim Everett evaded all tacklers as he darted and twisted 30 yards for the TD. The point after try failed and it stood 6-0 at the halfway mark.

Winters was unable to mount any offensive punch in the third quarter. Late in this period, the Indians again hit on a quick pass that carried to the six yard line. Everett climaxed the 58-yard drive by plunging over for another 6 pointer. The kick was good and it was 13-0.

Haskell scored early in the fourth quarter when the Blizzards were smothered on a punt

attempt, giving up the ball on their own 40-yard line. Again a pass, this time to Herren, and they went in for the third score of the night.

Greer returned the kickoff to the 40-yard line and the Blue finally started to move. QB Reese McCuiston completed a series of passes to end Alton Pierce that carried the Blizzards down to the 7-yard line. A fumble halted the drive on fourth down.

The Indians then decided it was time to wrap it up as they drove 93 yards and scored again.

The big play was another pass to that man Herren. Offensively, the passing of McCuiston, running by Barnes and Greer, and the pass receiving of Pierce stood out. On defense, Donald Wade, Sam Scott, Danny Killough and Lanny Bahman played tough, aggressive ball.

Haskell accounted for 15 first downs and Winters 9. They also led in total yards gained by 367 yards to 148 yards for the Blue.

Haskell, the only other undefeated squad in the group, duplicated past performance last week and refused to let the Winters Blizzards cross their goal line, while running up a 25. This reportedly was the first time for the Indians to defeat the Blizzards since they were put in the same conference district.

This week, the losers in last week's games will all play last week's winners. If the losers should happen to come out ahead, there'll be confusion around the loop. The Stamford-Colorado City, and Haskell-Anson games will be something to watch — anything can happen. The same could be said of the Winters-Hamlin game, which the Pied Pipers are favored to win. One peculiarity of schoolboy football is the way the wind can blow during one weekend.

Work-Training Project Set For Poverty War

A new Federally-financed Community Action Program has been approved for administration by the Office of Economic Opportunity, and will be directed in this area by Central Texas Opportunities, Inc. CTO offices are in Coleman, and Joe D. Philpott is director for that organization.

Known as Operation Mainstream, the program is said to be designed to provide an opportunity for chronically unemployed people to improve both their work skill and standard of living. The project will place these people into on-the-job work-training situations where they will work and receive training.

The objective is to provide training, while the individual is earning, which will lead to permanent jobs in a competitive job market. Enrollees will receive pay for 40 hours per week. They will receive 34 hours of work-training on the job, two hours of professional counseling and four hours of remedial or vocational training.

Applicants for the program will be interviewed and tested to determine their interests and aptitudes and eligibility. Enrollees must be 22 years of age or older and be chronically unemployed to be eligible. Selection of any individual may also depend upon the availability of a job fitting his desires and aptitude. Philpott explained, "we will be depending on the public agencies in the community to develop work assignments for enrollees."

The operation does not include private industry job sources, but is confined to non-profit organizations. The program, sponsored by the Community Council of Comal and Blanco counties and approved by the Department of Labor, includes a 27-county area. Project director is Winton C. Brown and area coordinator for the seven-county area of Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Concho, Eastland, McCulloch and Runnels is Carlos Flores, with office at 117 West Street, Coleman.

The Runnels County chairman is Mike Zuniga of Winters. Applications for persons wishing to sign up for the program are being handled by Mrs. Beatrice Pounds at 140 North Church Street, Winters. Public agencies such as city, county, federal government, non-profit hospitals, and schools will provide the places of work for enrollees. Enrollee wages will be paid from program funds and the cooperating agencies will provide on-the-job supervision and training.

RESOLUTION AND ORDER FOR CITY BOND ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF RUNNELS CITY OF WINTERS

ON THIS, the 17th day of October, 1967, the City Council of the City of Winters, Texas, convened in regular session, being open to the public, at the regular meeting place thereof in the City Hall with the following members present and in attendance:

WADE WHITE, Mayor

HOMER HODGE, RAY ALDERMAN, NELAN BAHLMAN, E. E. VAUGHAN, Aldermen.

and with the following absent: W. L. Bean, constituting a quorum; and among other proceedings had were the following:

Mayor White introduced a resolution and order.

Alderman Homer Hodge moved its adoption. The motion was seconded by Alderman Nelan Bahlman. The motion, carrying with it the adoption of the resolution and order, prevailed by the following vote:

AYES: Aldermen Hodge, Alderman, Bahlman and Vaughan.

NOES: None.

THE RESOLUTION AND ORDER

is as follows:

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Winters, Texas, deems it advisable to issue the bonds of said City for the purpose hereinafter mentioned; therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED AND ORDERED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WINTERS, TEXAS:

SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 11th day of November, 1967, which date is not less than fifteen (15) nor more than thirty (30) days from the date of the adoption of this resolution and order, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of said City, who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation:

"SHALL the City Council of the City of Winters, Texas, be authorized to issue ONE HUNDRED TWENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$120,000) general obligation bonds of said City for the purpose of constructing street improvements in and for said City; said bonds to mature serially over a period of years not to exceed FIFTEEN (15) years from their date, and to bear interest at a rate not to exceed FIVE PER CENTUM (5%) per annum, payable annually or semi-annually; and to provide for the payment of principal of and interest on said bonds by levying a tax sufficient to pay the annual interest and to create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem said bonds as they become due?"

SECTION 2: That said election shall be held at the CITY HALL in the CITY OF WINTERS, TEXAS, and the entire City shall constitute one election precinct.

SECTION 3: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election:

H. F. GERHART, Presiding Judge

MRS. GAYLENE HARRISON, Alternate Presiding Judge

If the regularly appointed Presiding Judge is unable to serve at the election, the Alternate

Presiding Judge therefor shall serve as Presiding Judge. The Presiding Judge shall appoint at least two (2) Clerks (one of whom shall be the Alternate Presiding Judge if the election is conducted by the regularly appointed Presiding Judge) and not more than Two (2) additional Clerks, as he deems necessary for the proper conduct of the election.

ABSENTEE VOTING shall be conducted at the City Secretary's Office in the City Hall, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code.

SECTION 4: That said election shall be held under the provisions of and in accordance with the laws governing the issuance of municipal bonds in cities, as provided in the General Laws of the State of Texas, and only resident qualified electors, who own taxable property in the City, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be qualified to vote.

SECTION 5: That the ballots for said election shall be prepared in sufficient number and in conformity with Chapter 6, V.A.T.C.S., Election Code, and printed on such ballots shall appear the following proposition: "THE ISSUANCE OF \$120,000 GENERAL OBLIGATION STREET IMPROVEMENT BONDS"

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear to the left of each proposition. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST" and each voter shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 6: That a copy of this resolution and order, signed by the Mayor of the City and attested by the City Secretary, at the top of which shall appear the words "NOTICE OF ELECTION FOR THE ISSU-

ANCE OF BONDS", shall serve as proper notice of said election. Said notice shall be posted at three public places in said City, one of which shall be at the City Hall, not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date on which said election is to be held, and be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Winters, Texas, the first of said publications to be made not less than fourteen (14) full days prior to the date set for said election.

Advisory Group Named For Local Head Start Plan

Eight people were named at a meeting in the Elementary School Library Monday night, to a policy advisory committee to work with the Head Start program in the Winters school next summer.

The policy advisory committee will offer suggestions for administration of the program, which is designed to prepare the children of underprivileged families for entering school. The committee also will act as liaison between the families and the project administrators and with the public.

Members of the committee, named Monday night include the Rev. Walter C. Probst Sr., the Rev. Edward H. Otwell,

Mrs. Isidro Lopez Jr., Mrs. Gaston Boatwright, Mrs. Arthur Fairey, Mrs. Frank Thompson, Mrs. Otto Cortez, and R. L. Johnson.

At the meeting, attended by parents who will be enrolled in the project, and others, Mrs. J. B. Whitlow, director of nutritional services for the program, and Mrs. Fred Young, director of health services, explained the part their departments will play in administration of the Head Start project.

George M. Beard, principal of the Winters Elementary School, is director of the project. He said that 17 pupils had already been registered for next summer's program, which will begin June 10, and continue through August 2. Other parents of children who will be eligible to attend classes under the program have been urged to contact the director and register the pupils. Beard said next summer's program will accommodate 45-48 pupils, as it now is planned.

According to rules from the Federal bureau directing the Head Start program, at least half of the members of the policy advisory committee must be made up of parents of pupils who will receive training under the program.
