## 4-H Gold Star Awards Given Monday Night

Gold Star Boy and Girl awards for Runnels County 4-H Club activities were presented Monday night to Bob Colburn of Winters and Lois Halfmann of Ballinger.

Colburn, 16, was reporter for the Winters 4-H Club from 1961-63 and president in 1964. In 1965 he was elected county council delegate and has served in that post since. He was council secretary in 1966 and council chairman in 1967.

Colburn has been active in both steer and sheep feeding programs, and has exhibited grand champion sheep and steers at the Winters Livestock Show and in 1963 had the champion Red Angus carcass steer at the Fort Worth show and the reserve champion of all-breeds carcass.

In 1964 he showed the reserve champion hoof-Charlais at Fort Worth and took second with his Red Angus. He had the reserve champion Charlais at Fort Worth in 1965 and reserve champion Shorthorn in 1966.

## WE MUST TAKE ADVANTAGE OF OPPORTUNITY!

AN EDITORIAL

Much has been said regarding the Winters Street Improvement Bond Election set for Saturday, November 11. But on this eve of the election, it is important that we all review some of the vital facts surrounding the issue which will be put before the voters.

First: What is the purpose of the election?

● To determine whether or not the City Council shall be authorized to issue Street Improvement Bonds not to exceed \$120,000.

For what purpose will the proceeds from the bonds be used?

● The City will use the proceeds to pay its share of the cost of purchasing right-of-way for the widening of U. S. Highway 83 through the city.

Which parts of Main Street will be widened?

● All but two blocks in the central section of the city will be widened. All of Main Street from the South City Limits to Wood Street and from Parsonage Street to the North City Limits will be included. A very minimum of extra footage will be required. Property owners will be paid for the little extra footage required, and the Highway Department will rebuild sidewalks and curbs.

Will the City pay the total cost of the project?

● No. The City will pay ONLY one-half of the costs for purchasing right-of-way. The State Highway Department will pay the balance and will also maintain the highway after its completion. This maintenance cost alone, if the highway is routed around town and the City assumed maintenance responsibilities, would amount to much more in a short period of years than the proposed \$120,000 bond issue.

Will a tax increase be necessary?

● No. Money to retire the bonds will be made available from a surplus that will exist in future years' budgets under the present tax structure.

When does the City plan to issue the bonds?

● Immediately, so that work on the highway can begin as soon as possible.

Of what benefit will the Street Improvement Program be to the citizens of Winters?

● The benefits from the street improvement program will be in having the highway come THROUGH the city rather than forcing it to go AROUND. If the highway should be routed around town it would have a detrimental effect on the entire economic structure of the town. For instance, service stations depend much on through traffic; if the highway should be routed around town, these businesses would of necessity have to follow the traffic, and move out of town. These businesses now carry a large share of the City's tax load; if they were forced out of town, the share they now pay would have to be assumed by those businesses and individual property owners who were left. In addition, every business and individual in town profits to a very large extent from the traffic which flows through town; if traffic is turned away this income would cease, never to return.

Contrary to some opinion, it is only the larger cities which can afford to let through traffic be routed around. In almost every instance where a through highway is routed around the smaller towns, such as Winters, there has been a damaging effect on the economy; a damage which can never be repaired. There are too many graphic examples for any of us to believe otherwise. If this were not so, why is it that all of the smaller towns, such as Winters, fight desperately to keep their through highways?

Sentiment and a desire to cling to the old ways have no rational place in this issue. We must take a long, hard look at the cold facts. To do otherwise would be to abandon all pretense of progressiveness and lay the groundwork for a rapid depreciation and drying up of our town. We must take advantage of this opportunity to maintain a favorable status... WE NEVER AGAIN WILL BE OFFERED THIS OPPORTUNITY!

## Sidewalk Sale Sat., 17th

Winters merchants will give away more than \$2,000.00 in merchandise during this year's Christmas sale on Friday, Nov. 17. The sale is being promoted by the Winters Chamber of Commerce.

Approximately half that amount will be given away in drawings during the big Sidewalk Sale next Friday night, Nov. 17.

As of Wednesday morning of this week, 22 businesses were listed with the Chamber of Commerce as planning to participate in the individual drawings which will spotlight the Sidewalk Sale, and will give merchandise to customers who register in their stores. It was expected that others may announce participation before the week is over.

Most every business in Winters will remain open in the evening for the Sidewalk Sale, which begins at 5:30 p. m. Friday, Nov. 17, and will offer outstanding money-saving specials on merchandise.

Each business participating in the drawings will conduct their own drawings, and shoppers will be asked to register at each business for the merchandise to be given away.

It has been stressed that in the many drawings to be held, no one will be required to be present at the drawing in order to be eligible to win. Time of each drawing has been left to the individual merchant conducting the drawing.

The several separate drawings to be conducted by merchants will replace the one big drawing which was sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce in other years. This same program was conducted last year by Winters merchants and drew much response from residents of the area. Thus, shoppers who

register will have many chances to win merchandise or cash.

The Sidewalk Sale next Friday is the first of a series of events planned by Winters businesses to promote the Christmas shopping season. The big Christmas parade will be held Dec. 2, and a Moonlight Sale and drawings will be held Dec. 18.

Bert V. Massey of Brownwood announced today that he is a candidate for the State House of Representatives from the sixty-fourth district of Texas. The sixty-fourth district includes Comanche, Brown, Coleman, and Runnels Counties. This House seat will be vacated by House Speaker Ben Barnes who has announced his candidacy for Lt. Governor.

Winters voters will decide Saturday whether to authorize the City Council to issue general obligation bonds in the amount of \$120,000 to pay for the City's part of widening Main Street, which is U. S. Highway 83 through town.

Voting will be at the City Hall, with polls opening at 8 a. m. and closing at 7 p. m. H. G. Gerhart will be election judge and Mrs. Gaylene Harrison alternate judge.

City Secretary Buford Baldwin said that as of Tuesday noon 13 absentee ballots had been cast. Absentee voting was expected to be heavier than usual because election day falls on the first day of the State's deer hunting season, and many residents expect to be absent on Saturday.

If approved by the voters, the City Council will immediately issue the bonds. The money will be used to pay the City's one-half cost of purchase of right-

of-way needed for the street widening project. One-half will be paid by the State Highway Department. The High Department also will pay for all construction costs.

The Winters City Council has stated that it will not be necessary to increase taxes to retire the bonds.

All persons who are resident qualified electors who own taxable property in the City of Winters and who have duly rendered the same for taxation may vote in this election. To be qualified a voter must be a citizen of the United States, must have lived in the State of Texas one year preceding the election, and in Runnels County for the last six months, be a resident of the City of Winters at the time of the election, and must be registered as a voter. An elector, otherwise qualified, who is over 60 years of age on the day of the election, need not be registered.

## Colorado City Wolves Win 27-7 Over Hapless Winters Blizzards Friday

The Winters Blizzards lost a 27-7 decision to the Colorado City Wolves last Friday night. The Wolves' speedy Dan Steakley gained 170 yards on 29 carries and simply left the Blizzards standing still.

The Blizzards started out as if they meant business, driving to the Colorado City 4-yard line. Randall Boles picked up 17 and 12 yard gainers and quarterback Reese McCuiston completed a 16-yard pass to Jerry Tischler. A fourth down try failed and the Wolves took over.

The Winters team held and forced a punt but lady luck had deserted the Blue team. The punt was fumbled and Colorado City recovered deep in Winters territory. From here Steakley scored on a 2-yard plunge with 7:12 left in the second quarter. A 40 yard pass play had put them in scoring position. The kick was good and it was 7-0.

Six minutes later the Wolves wound up scoring position again. A 4-yard quick pass from quarterback Brubles to end Parker added another 6 pointer. The extra point was good and the Blizzards trailed 14-0 at half time.

The Winters defense, which looked improved in recent weeks, caved in completely on this extremely cold night. With 8:20 left in the third period, Steakley capped a 72-yard drive in 7 plays with a 6-yard scoring run.

As if this was not enough, the Blizzards fumbled the ball on their next possession. The Wolves recovered and moved in for the TD six plays later as

another pass was completed for Colorado City. This made it a lopsided 27-0 before Winters managed to get on the scoreboard.

Speedy James Greer intercepted a Colorado City pass and returned it 61 yards before being brought down late in the fourth quarter. Reese McCuiston passed 21 yards to Tischler who drove in to pay dirt. Sam Scott added the extra point and it was 27-7.

Arlon Barnes, playing his second game at linebacker, led with a whopping 16 tackles. Charles Mathis continued his fine defensive effort from safety position.

The statistics were all too one-sided as Colorado City led 17-9 on first downs and 318 yards to 146 on rushing and passing.

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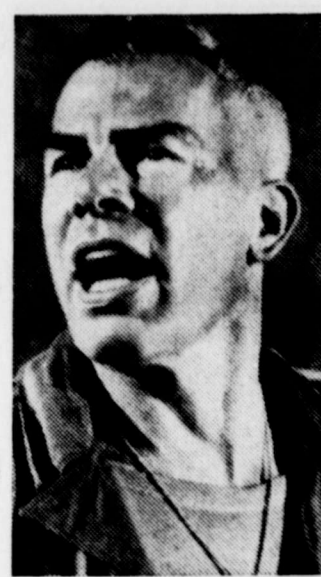

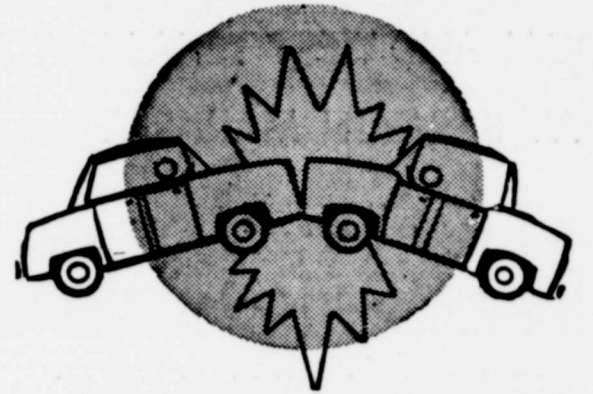

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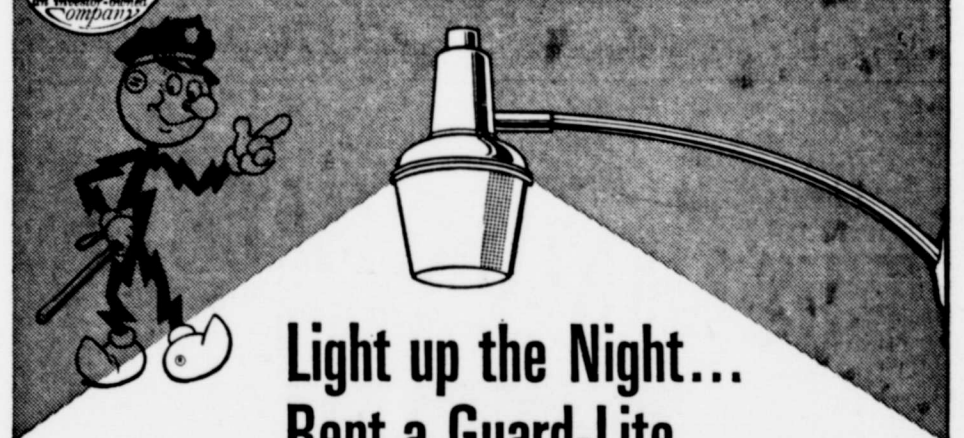

## Cong. Burleson Announces Tests For Summer Jobs

Congressman Omar Burleson (D-Texas) has announced that the Civil Service Commission is now receiving applications for the 1968 competitive examination for summer employment with the United States Government. The examination leads to eligibility for appointment to mast temporary summer jobs at

Grades GS-1 through 4, and also Post Office Seasonal Assistant jobs at PFS-4 level.

Those who are interested in the summer jobs covered may apply to take the written test on or before three filing dates — Dec. 8, 1967, Jan. 5, and Feb. 1, 1968. Representative Burleson stressed that no application postmarked after Feb. 1 will be accepted. If you miss the last test, you cannot be considered for jobs filled by this application and for maximum consideration, you should apply early.

The Congressman noted that last year's eligibles, including

those who were selected for a summer job, must take this new examination. This will provide an equal chance for all applicants to compete for one of these short-term non-career jobs.

Congressman Burleson pointed out that one significant change in this year's program will permit applicants to be considered for Post Office seasonal assistant jobs, which, in prior years, were filled by taking a special examination.

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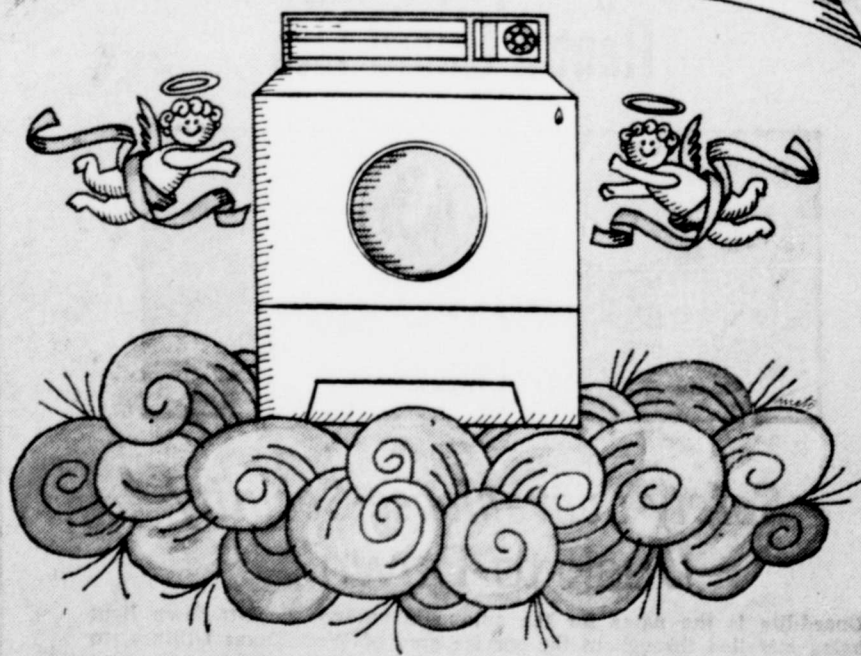
