## HOME TOWN Talk

Rains this week in the Winters area have been a mixed blessing. Farmers who still have cotton in the fields which is ready and needs to come out, are anxious to get on with it. Small-grainers are smiling because of the added moisture, with better prospects for a better grain crop next year.

But all considered, we all prefer this kind of fall weather conditions over what was experienced last fall. There is a great deal of difference in the weather this fall; we already have received as much rain since the first of September as was received from October of last year to May of this year. In October of 1966, 2.7 inches was received; there was no more rain during the year, and it was not until February 27, 1967, that enough fell to measure—then only a tenth of an inch. And it was not until March that as much as an inch fell during a whole month—March measurement was 1.2. It was June before we received a real good rain, even though a few showers were recorded in April and May.

It is interesting to note that the 27.8 inches we have recorded for the first eleven months this year is the same amount measured during the first eleven months of 1966 . . . and the same amount measured during the first eleven months of 1964. And we still have another month to go on this year.

One almanac we were looking at a while back, long-range predicted that this late fall and winter would see an above-average rainfall for this section of the country—and also a below-average temperature level. Conditions thus far have gone along with that prediction, with cold, wet weather completing the month of November.

## No State Airport Funds Available But City Will Build Landing Strip

The City of Winters will not get State funds to help develop an airport, but a landing strip will be built anyway.

Mayor Wade White said this week that the City's application for assistance in building an airport has been disapproved by the Texas Aeronautics Commission because of "lack of funds." The City had applied to the Aeronautics Commission some months ago for funds to improve the airport, but according to a letter from the head of the Commission, the program for 1968 had already been planned and no additional funds are available. It was suggested that the City re-apply for State funds at a later date, to be included in a later program.

The land for a landing strip was purchased by the City some time ago. Mayor White said that work would go ahead on improving the strip, located southwest of Winters. It had been planned to begin work on leveling the strip Monday of this week, he said, but inclement weather forced postponement.

The mayor said definitely that the City would make another application for State funds at a later date.

Work planned by the City on the landing strip will include grading and leveling a landing area about 3000 feet long, with a 60-foot hard surface. Cleared area will be 100 feet wide. There will be room on the west side of the strip for construction of hangars, Mayor White said. A representative of the Texas Aeronautics Commission, after an inspection of the strip, recommended that hangars be confined to the west side and on the north end of the strip. There will be room for several hangars, in the event there is need for them, it was noted.

The City will not build hangars, the mayor said, but will cooperate with individuals or firms in allotting space for hangars to be constructed with private funds. There has been some indication that some individuals and firms may build hangars to keep their aircraft in. The City will provide an access road to the highway to the north of the strip, and plans to provide telephone service.

## Winters B Team Won From Central Catholic Cagers

In basketball action Saturday night, the Blizzard B team short circuited the Abilene Central Catholic High School Golden Chargers B team by the score of 52 to 51. The first half was all Blizzards. The second half saw the Chargers come back and almost take the game. At half time the Blizzards went into the dressing room with a margin of ten points as they led 32 to 22. The third quarter produced 25 points for the Blizzards. Early in the fourth quarter with only a two point edge the Golden Charge went into a stall. It backfired, however, as they were able to score only four points while the Blizzards were able to pick up five. The real thrill of the game came in the final sixty seconds. Trailing by one point, the Blizzards had the ball and were moving down court. Bob Colburn took the ball and was driving in for a lay-up when he was fouled. As he stepped to the free throw line the outcome of the game rested on his shoulders. He calmly sank both free throws to put the Blizzards out in front. As the Chargers brought the ball down court a bad pass gave the Blizzards an opportunity to control the ball and win the game. They took the ball out of bounds with thirty seconds to play. The Blizzards called a time out to plot their strategy. When play resumed the Chargers failed to press the Blizzards resulting in thirty three seconds of ball control and their first victory in two starts.

Leading the scoring for the Blizzard B team were Johnny Cathey with 15 points, Arlon Barnes with 11, and Biff White and Bill Grantz with six each.

### Proposals Pending To Change Method Of Electing President, Vice President

The method of electing the President and Vice President of the United States came under long and strenuous discussion at the Constitutional Convention of 1787.

Little difficulty was encountered in agreeing that the President and Vice President should be elected officials, but there was wide disagreement on the method. At the 1787 Convention and since, there have been proposals to elect the President and Vice President by direct popular vote, election by the Congress, election by the State Legislatures and election by Electors, which is the present system.

There are presently pending before the Congress proposals for a Constitutional Amendment which would abolish the present Electoral College System. Others would maintain the Electoral System but provide that each candidate for whom votes were cast for President and Vice President within each State would be credited with such proportion of the electoral vote as he received. In other words, if a candidate received 51 percent of the total vote within a given State, he would receive only 51 percent of the electoral vote of that State, and the opposing candidate would receive 49 percent. Under the present system, a candidate receiving 51 percent of a State's vote, receives the entire electoral vote of that State.

The Constitution of the United States provides that "Each State shall appoint, in such manner as the Legislature thereof may direct, a number of electors, equal to the whole number of Senators and Representatives to which the State may be entitled in the Congress." All States provide for "appointment" of electors through direct election by the people.

In the last Presidential election (1964) the 50 States, with a total of 100 Senators and 435 Representatives plus 3 Electors from the District of Columbia, totaled 538.

Originaly the founding fathers intended that Electors vote as individuals in choosing a President. Experience, however, soon proved that Electors merely acted as representatives of the political parties and expected to vote for candidates nominated by their party. By 1800 voting by Electors almost disappeared. The States began to adopt the unit vote system by the Electors, and by 1892 the present practice had evolved.

It is almost unanimously agreed that some change in the present process of Presidential elections is in order. Congressional Committees are studying a variety of amendments which reveal broad differences as to the precise nature of the present inequity, as well as the method by which it should be remedied. If, however, people are to have a more direct voice in the election of the highest officials of the land, changes from the present system are necessary. Political parties, as such, have no standing under the Constitution but under the present system it is the political parties which stand in for the people and between them and the election of a President and Vice President. Since political parties have no Constitutional standing, they should remain as intended — to be private and free of Federal regulation.

Numerous flaws exist in the idea of the President and Vice President being elected directly by popular vote. Perhaps any plan will not be perfect, but there is a need for the influence of the voting constituency to be brought closer in determining who heads our country.

Winters' annual Christmas parade will be held Saturday, December 2, beginning at 3 p. m.

The Chamber of Commerce is providing \$25 to each organization building and entering a float in the parade—with a limit of eight floats under this arrangement. This money is to be used to purchase materials, etc., to build the floats.

It was announced that anyone wishing to enter the parade may do so, even if they are not competing for float prizes. This would include decorated bicycles, tricycles, ponies, and the like.

Santa Claus will make a pre-Christmas visit and will hand out candy for the kiddies during the parade, and will visit stores following the parade.

Wayne Bedford is parade chairman for the Chamber of Commerce board of directors.

The Christmas Parade is one of several special events planned for this year's Christmas season, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce. A Home Decorations contest will be judged later in the month of December. This contest will include three separate divisions — home decorations, best decorated home window, and best decorated home door. Plaques will be awarded winners in each of the three divisions.

Residents who wish to enter the Home Decorations contest are asked to register with the Chamber of Commerce as soon as possible so that plans for judging may be completed.

Churches and organizations are being asked to decorate windows of vacant buildings downtown. This project drew considerable interest last year and is expected to again be popular this year.

Also included for the Christmas season program this year will be organized caroling by church and civic groups. Several groups have been in rehearsal for this program, and caroling will begin on the evening of December 18, when the big Moonlight Sale is scheduled.

The Moonlight Sale, the second such commercial event of the season, will feature drawings for merchandise and cash. Individual merchants will conduct their own drawings, as was done in the Sidewalk Sale, and no purchase will be necessary in order for persons to be eligible for the drawings.

### Rains Slow '67 Cotton Picking, About Half Out

Rains this week have slowed stripping of the 1967 cotton crop in the Winters area, but it is estimated that about 50 percent of this year's crop has been gathered.

Winters Warehouse reported Wednesday morning that they had received 4000 bales from the gins in Winters, Wilmeth and Wingate. The year's crop is figured to produce about 8,000 bales in the area.

Grades of cotton locally have been better than had been anticipated, cotton men say, but the rains this week may have a tendency to lower grade a little.

## CITY SALES TAX SUCCESS CONTINUES

Five more Texas cities have given overwhelming approval to one per cent city sales tax levies.

Huntsville, Uvalde, Seguin, Commerce and Llano voters asked for the tax by margins ranging from two-to-one to eight-to-one.

So far, 33 cities have approved the local revenue-raising method passed by the Legislature this year although it was believed to be highly controversial. Only two, Lufkin and Electra, have turned it down.

Next two elections—December 2—are in Galveston and Kilgore. Fifty-six cities will vote on December 5, including Houston, Dallas, San Antonio and Fort Worth.

## BOND PROGRAMS

Two state agencies are busily planning how best to take advantage of \$275,000,000 worth of authorization voted them by Texas citizens on November 11.

One of the constitutional amendments revived the Veterans Land Program and authorized the issuance of \$200,000,000 in bonds to finance it. Another set up the Park Development Fund and provided for the sale of \$75,000,000 in bonds to finance it.

Veterans Land Board, administrator of the land program, should be ready to begin its operations soon after the votes are formally canvassed on November 28. No friction is anticipated in this for two reasons.

First, the old Veterans Land Program expired only in 1965, so Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler is experienced in operating it. Second, there are few complications to work out—the state merely sells the bonds and acquires the money, then asks for applications from veterans.

Sadler said veterans should locate tracts they want, then apply for loans after January 15. But Parks and Wildlife Department is facing a different situation. Bond experts met with department officials last week to give them a "short course" on securities.

Neither agency is planning to sell all the authorized bonds at once. Land Office is talking about \$25,000,000 to \$30,000,000 in the first issue, and though the Parks and Wildlife Commission will have the final say-so, the most popular figure discussed at the meeting was \$10,000,000.

Land bonds will be 40-year bonds. Parks bonds are limited to 10 years, and will be retired by revenues from entrance fees to state parks. Both have a 4-1-2 per cent constitutional limit on the interest the state may pay, which could complicate their sale.

## JOB CORPS PLACEMENTS

More than 14,000 Texas young men and women have been employed by the Job Corps.

Since the program began two years ago, about 13,000 male trainees from Gary Job Corps have accepted assignments. The McKinney Job Corps for girls, which began screening applicants in April, already has placed 1,132 on jobs.

## LIQUOR BOARD SUSPENDS AGENTS

Coke Stevenson Jr., administrator of Texas Liquor Control Board, suspended two Dallas agents for "remarks" about board operations, and ordered them to a Tuesday, November 28, hearing here.

Action followed distribution of a circular in the capital area and in Dallas criticizing Stevenson and James E. Dale, Dallas LCB supervisor. Circular also repeated the Baptist General Convention demand for investigation of the Board. Stevenson called the publication "malicious slander."

Dallas State Sen. Oscar Mauzy said he is looking into LCB activities himself following rumors about alleged wrongdoings.

## SHORT SNORTS

House Speaker Barnes has been named to the board of directors of States' Urban Action Center, along with four governors and other national leaders.

Texas draft quota for January will be 1,659 men, highest since November 1966.

Governor Connally selected Nueces County Commissioner Robert Barnes to interim committee to study roads and parking areas on Texas beaches.

## New Book On "Outdoors USA" Published Recently

Woodrow Hoffman of the local Soil Conservation Service said the 1967 yearbook of Agriculture "Outdoors U.S.A." was published last month. He said this book tells of the opportunities that rural America offers for living, working and relaxation. It is a story largely of people and is a handbook of conservation and wise use of our natural resources. And it can be used as a guide to the great American outdoors with its recreational potential.

One article in the book, Hoffman said, is on the economics of deer on our rangeland. He said it was written by two Texans, Olan Dillon, Soil Conservation Service regional biologist of Fort Worth and Vernon Hicks, Soil Conservation Service State biologist of Temple. Another article in the book was written by Tarleton Jenkins, formerly of Fort Worth and now assistant director of the Information Division of Soil Conservation Service, Washington. Among the pictures in the book two are by Hugo Bryan and one by Claude Crowley, Soil Conservation Service Center in Fort Worth.

The book is designed for all Americans—citizens concerned about conservation of natural resources, hunters and fishermen, family campers, children eager to learn about the outdoors, and farmers and ranchers interested in profit making recreation enterprises. The book contains 408 pages of text illustrated with 200 black and white photographs, plus a section with 43 color photographs.

**Split Peas**  
Versatile split peas have a history as colorful as the eating enjoyment they provide. This nourishing vegetable was a food claimed hearty enough for the indomitable Thor, Norse God of Thunder. People in Scandinavia and Germany still eat peas on Thursday (Thor's Day) in his honor. And, there was the king who placed a single pea under twenty mattresses. Worthy maidens were invited to sleep overnight. The one who detected the pea through the mattresses was chosen as the princess best qualified to marry the king's son.

Split peas are plentiful this month. They provide delightful fare on Thursday or any other day of the week. Split peas Au Gratin, for example, is a casserole treat that features the flavor of cooked split peas with layers of grated cheese and cooked sausage. Add minced garlic to the cooked peas for extra appeal. Or, try split pea and frankfurter soup. Take 1-2 cups dry split peas, 1 qt. water, 2 teaspoons salt, 2 tablespoons bacon fat, 1-4 cup finely chopped onion, 1 tall can of evaporated milk (1 2/3 cup) a dash of pepper, and 2 sliced frankfurters. Wash peas, then place in large kettle. Add water and salt. Bring to boil and boil 2 minutes. Remove from heat, cover and let peas soak for 1 hour. After peas have soaked,

do not change water. Add fat and onion. Bring to a boil; then turn down heat. Cover kettle, then cook slowly until peas are tender, about 1 hour. Stir in evaporated milk, pepper and sliced frankfurters. If soup seems too thick, thin with extra evaporated milk. Heat, but do not boil. Makes 4 to 6 servings. This recipe for Chicken Oriental provides 4 servings. You'll need 1 broiler cut into serving pieces and washed and dried, 1 teaspoon monosodium glutamate, 1-4 cup butter or margarine, 1 can (3 or 4 ounces), drained mushrooms, 1 can (14 ounces) drained pineapple chunks, 2 cups mushroom and pineapple liquid plus water as needed to complete measure, 2 tablespoons sugar, 2 tablespoons vinegar, 1 tablespoon soy sauce, 2 green peppers cut into strips, 2 medium sliced onions, 4 teaspoons cornstarch water to mix with the cornstarch and 3 cups hot, cooked rice. Sprinkle chicken with monosodium glutamate and let stand 15 minutes. Melt butter in skillet and brown chicken in butter. Add mushroom-pineapple liquid and bring to a boil. Cover skillet and simmer 30 minutes. Stir in sugar, vinegar and soy sauce. Add mushrooms, pineapple, green pepper and onion. Cook 10 minutes longer. Make a paste of cornstarch and a little water and stir into hot mixture. Cook, stirring constantly, until slightly thickened. Serve atop rice and garnish with parsley.

## Roger Babson Report—

### United States Draining Talented People From All Over the World

Babson Park, Mass. More and more we have been hearing the complaint that talented people from all over the world, but especially from Europe, are lured to the United States by the prestige of our educational facilities.

#### Westward Flow

This talent drain is nothing new. Canadians have long deplored the fact that many of their most promising young people have come to the U. S. for greater educational or job opportunities, and then elected to remain here. The exodus from Canada has included some world-renowned artists, musicians, scientists, and businessmen.

In more recent years there has been an increasing flow to the U. S. of very talented people from many other countries. Britain, especially, has felt keenly the loss of outstanding men and women in a variety of fields who have sought permanent residence here or actually become U. S. citizens. Nowhere is this American attraction of talent more manifest than in medicine. In hospitals throughout the length and breadth of our land today, you will find a preponderance of residents and interns who have come here to complete their medical education or to engage in research.

#### Strong Urban Pull

But even within the United States and among our own people, the brain drain has become quite a problem. Urbanization has proceeded at a very rapid pace and is still going on. The number of residents in our standard metropolitan statistical areas — by definition, at least one central city of no less than 50,000 persons together with the surrounding area economically oriented to it — increased by 10.4 per cent from April 1960 to July 1965.

From the farms and from the

more isolated small towns, people have been moving in ever greater numbers to the larger urban and suburban areas. This migration has been most keenly felt in rural areas, where scarcity of teachers, managerial personnel and medical talent has been especially pronounced.

**Flight From The Core Cities**  
Almost simultaneous with the migration of people from farms to urban areas has been migration from the core cities of metropolitan areas. In the very vanguard of those who have forsaken the large cities for residence in the suburbs have been the more successful and talented, whose affluence permitted greater freedom of choice than was available to their less fortunate neighbors.

Thus have the large core cities lost what they need most — persons of vision and ability, with an interest in city problems and a will to make personal contributions and the sacrifices necessary to implement solutions.

**Neglect Of The Gifted Child**  
In today's fast-changing, highly mobile world, we can't possibly insulate ourselves against drains of talent from particular communities or areas within our borders. But there is another and perhaps more serious brain drain that we can take steps to remedy. It is reliably estimated that, in the U. S. alone, five million talented and creative young people of school age just aren't receiving from their teachers the attention and challenge they need to develop their full potential.

No one knows how much talent has been lost to the nation because of our neglect of the gifted child. To give such children the educational break they deserve will involve a good deal of planning and an increase in expenditure. Smaller classes, more sympathetic and creative teachers following a more modern and realistic curriculum, will be needed. It is indeed time for all of us to ask ourselves: What is my community doing to help its gifted children educationally? What will it do? The answer depends on our interest and on the depth of our concern.

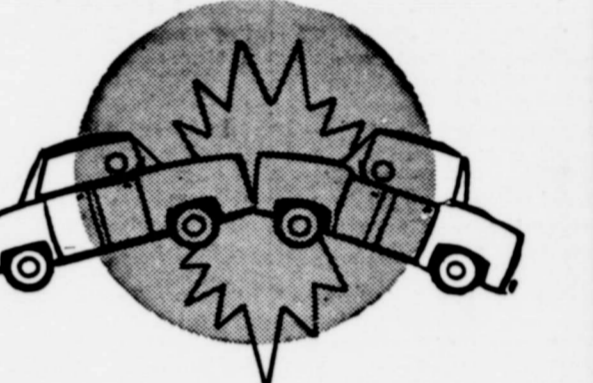
