But all considered, we all prefer this kind of fall weather conditions over what was experienced last fall. There is a great deal of difference in the weather this fall; we already have received as much rain since the first of September as was received from October of last year to May of this year. In October of 1966, 2.7 inches was received; there was no more rain during the year, and it was not until February 27. 1967, that enough fell to measure-then only a tenth of an inch. And it was not until March that as much as an inch fell during a whole month-March measurement was 1.2. It was June before we received a real good rain, even though a few showers were recorded in April
