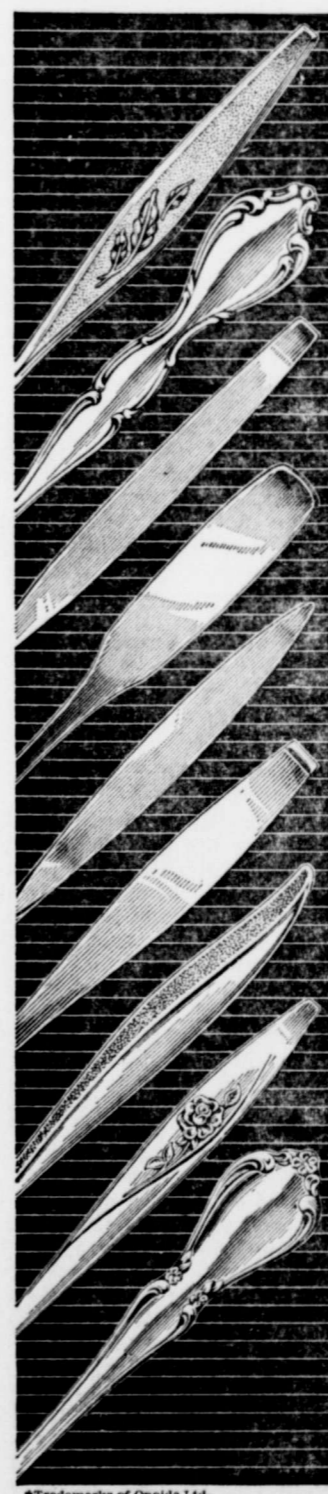

## Time To Make Grazing Plans For Livestock

Harvey Kahlden, Soil Conservationist with the local Soil Conservation Service assisting the Runnels Soil and Water Conservation District, said if livestock owners haven't already done so, it is time to start planning a grazing program for the coming year. Without careful planning many livestock owners run out of grazing during the winter and early spring months. When this happens there are two alternatives—feed or sell (usually at a reduced price). Either one is usually very expensive.

Kahlden said, if you will sit down and make a forage inventory it will usually show that most of the forage is available during the spring and summer months. This is true because most grass species are warm season plants. Kahlden went on to say that once you have made an inventory, you can make a grazing plan. The inventory may show where changes can be made to enable you to have a more year-around grazing program.

Many ranchers are having good success with planting forage sorghums for a summer temporary pasture. If enough forage sorghums are planted to feed the entire herd during the summer months, all the rangeland can be deferred for use during the winter months. This will not only provide grazing for the winter months, but it will also benefit the rangeland. When the rangeland is rested (deferred) native grasses will increase in vigor and the desirable plants will produce seed, therefore promoting natural revegetation. By using this system usually an adequate cover for soil protection can be maintained. Range grasses should never be grazed, so that more than 50 percent, by weight, of the annual growth will be removed by the end of the grazing season.

Kahlden said a winter temporary pasture, small grain and/or a winter legume, may be another alternative. A winter pasture will provide some green grazing in the late fall, winter and early spring. Green grazing will increase beef gains and at the same time reduces hay, grain and veterinary bills.

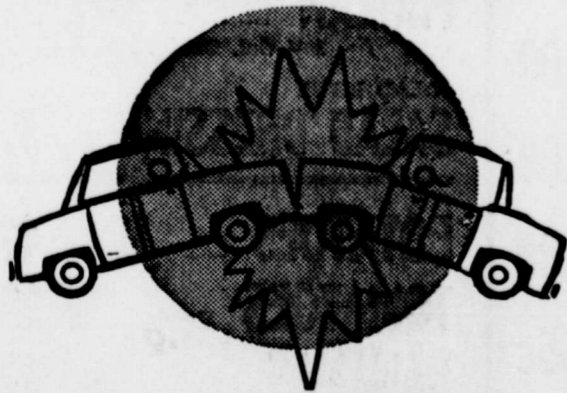
## CAR INSPECTION

### Social Security Offers Protection For Everyone

"Some people still have the idea that social security offers protection only for the 'old folks,'" says Ted F. Moellering, manager of the San Angelo Social Security office. "Actually," he says, "insurance for the young working man and his family has been a very important part of the social security program for many years."

One type of protection under social security, according to

Moellering, is in the form of monthly benefits for a person who becomes unable to work because of a physical or mental impairment. The disability does not have to be permanent. If the condition has lasted or is expected to last for 12 months or longer, the worker may qualify for payments. Benefits may be paid each month not only to the disabled person, but also to other members of his family, such as his wife and children.

"In addition to meeting the disability requirement," Moellering said, "the disabled person must have worked under social security not less than five years out of the ten year period ending with the date he became disabled."

For old folks only? "Not at all," emphasized Moellering, "if the two requirements are met, benefits can be paid regardless of age."

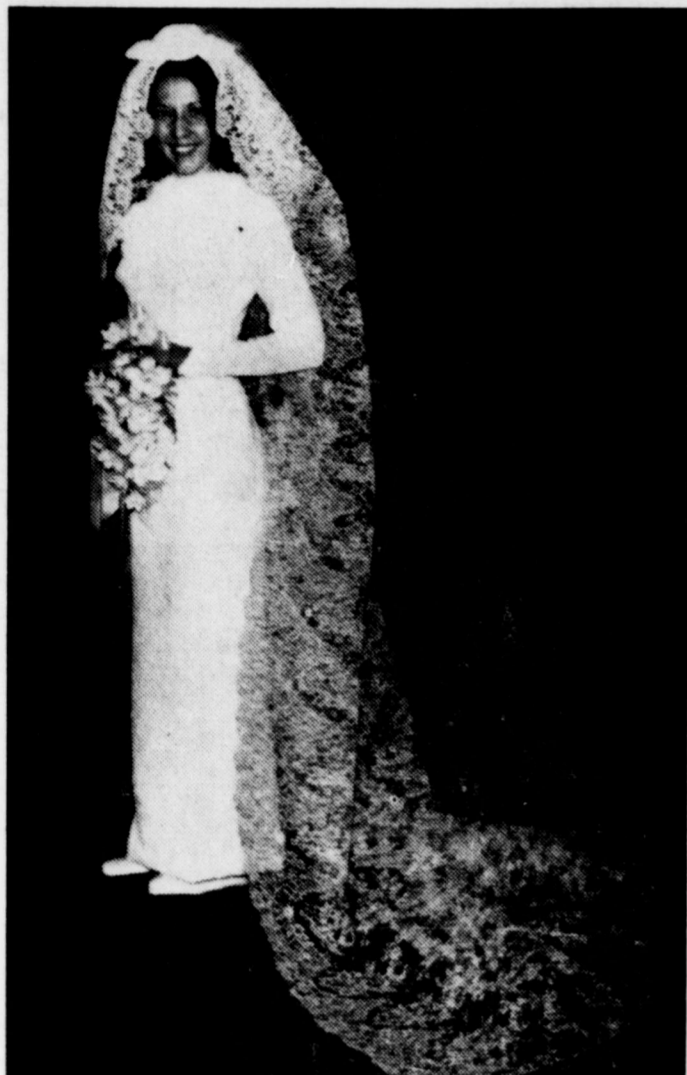

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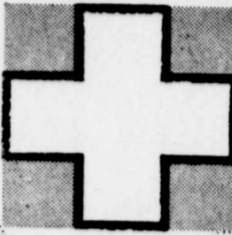
