These figures would indicate that our local students are progressing on a higher level than the national average. This is, of course, commendable; but our educators are constantly striving to reach even higher plateaus.

It could be said that these comparisons mean nothing, because so many less-progressive schools which are included in the figuring serve to lower the National Norm. This is true, to some extent. However, the finished product tells the story; and it has been stated for some time that the percentage of students finishing local schools and entering college and finishing is one of the highest in the state. We should be proud of that fact; but we cannot afford to rest; a short nap could wipe away an entire decade of progress.


