When it comes right down to it, the national economic pie should be divided with a fair portion for the pie makers-the nation's producers and savers who like to spend the fruit of their labors as they see fit-or no pie baking business may remain to provide pies to be divided.

A democratic member of Congress has said, ". . . a great majority of my people are against it. They think of it as just another handout, another way of avoiding work."
