### HOME TOWN

## Talk

By R. C. THOMAS

For some years there has been a running debate between differing schools of thought on how the U. S. economic pie should be divided. One school thinks frills and luxuries should be cut out in favor of greater government spending for "public needs." This school believes taxes should be increased and "wasteful" productivity to satisfy the luxury wants of an already affluent people should be cut back. Another school of thought points out that without expanding industry, payroll, employment and taxes, the government would have no means to carry out its projects for the public good.

When it comes right down to it, the national economic pie should be divided with a fair portion for the pie makers—the nation's producers and savers who like to spend the fruit of their labors as they see fit—or no pie baking business may remain to provide pies to be divided.

One of the reasons often cited for the current wave of strife and discontent in the United States is that people have been led to expect too much, too soon in the way of material gains. Day and night they see a fantastic array of the good things of life spread before them. The situation, it is said, is further aggravated by political promises that cannot be kept — promises of government spending on all manner of programs that a debt-burdened country obviously cannot undertake.

Whatever the reasons, a great many people, as typified by the so-called Poor People's March on Washington and the building of what has been called "Insurrection City," are bluntly demanding a larger cut of the economic pie without too great a regard as to how they get it. Responsible business leaders, high government officials and economists, far from turning their backs on these demands, are seeking workable means of providing a measure of economic well-being to everyone irrespective of whether they add to the productivity of the nation or not. This is a tall order, but some believe it can be accomplished within the framework of a capitalistic, free enterprise system. They believe it can be done without destroying the incentives that have produced the great abundance of the U. S., which, under our existing system, has produced a higher standard of living for more people than was ever achieved before in recorded history. Repeat, a tall order.

The most dramatic support for some form of a guaranteed income came recently when more than 1,000 academic economists endorsed the idea in a public statement. Many other economists declined to support the statement, because it made no attempt to appraise the dollars and cents cost to taxpayers. Any guaranteed income plan, no matter how well thought out and regardless of the degree of political and economic statesmanship behind its advocacy, will very likely encounter an uncertain reception where it counts most. A majority of the electorate may not accept it. A recent Gallup Poll shows that nationally a majority of Americans oppose the idea of a guaranteed minimum income with only 36 percent in favor and 58 percent against such a plan. It is especially significant that 77 percent of the nonwhite population would support a plan guaranteeing everyone enough work to earn a minimum income.

As one competent observer has said of a universal guaranteed income, "The only ones really against it are the people." Another says, "Support for this kind of plan just doesn't exist and couldn't exist in a work-oriented culture." A democratic member of Congress has said, "... a great majority of my people are against it. They think of it as just another handout, another way of avoiding work."

The American people have always been noted for their generosity, but there is no getting

## Plan To Widen Runway At Winters Airport

At a briefing several weeks ago following their examination of the district, field examiners advised members of the District board that they would not recommend certain areas of the District for extensive construction of water retaining structures, but that final action would be up to the State Board. In the event any part of the district does not meet the approval of the State Board for the structures, the legislative act creating the district would have to be amended during the next session of the State Legislature.

## Queen Contest Planned By FB, To Be Announced

A Farm Bureau Queen Contest, "to give farm and ranch girls recognition," is being planned by the Runnels County Farm Bureau's Young Farmers and Ranchers Advisory Committee. Date of the contest and deadline for entry is to be announced later.

The committee was to meet July 9 to make final plans for the contest.

This will be an "honest-to-goodness" queen contest, according to the announcement, and girls entering will be judged on grace, poise, charm, vivaciousness and "all the other qualities that go to make up winsome Texas future homemakers."

To be eligible for the contest, a girl must be a daughter or sister of a Farm Bureau member actively engaged in agricultural production. She must be single and between the ages of 16 and 22 on Sept. 1, 1968. Each entry will be required to furnish a recent picture, preferably 5 X 7. She will be required to speak approximately one minute on "Why are you glad your family belongs to Farm Bureau?"

The girl selected as Runnels County Farm Bureau Queen for 1968-69 will be sent to the district contest, and if selected as district winner, will be sent to the State FB Queen Contest. All district winners will receive a \$500 allowance to go to the American FB Federation convention in Kansas City, Mo., in December, 1968.

## Elm Creek Water Board Meeting Is Postponed

The regular meeting of the board of directors of the Elm Creek Water Control District, scheduled for Tuesday, July 16, has been postponed, according to R. C. Thomas, chairman of the board.

The board is awaiting word from the State Water Board concerning the status of the District following the field examination which was made several weeks ago. The field examiners were to submit their recommendations to the State Board, which in turn would take action on approval or disapproval of soil and water conservation work in the district. This decision by the State Board is expected at any time, according to the ECWCD chairman, and board members and the public will be notified immediately.

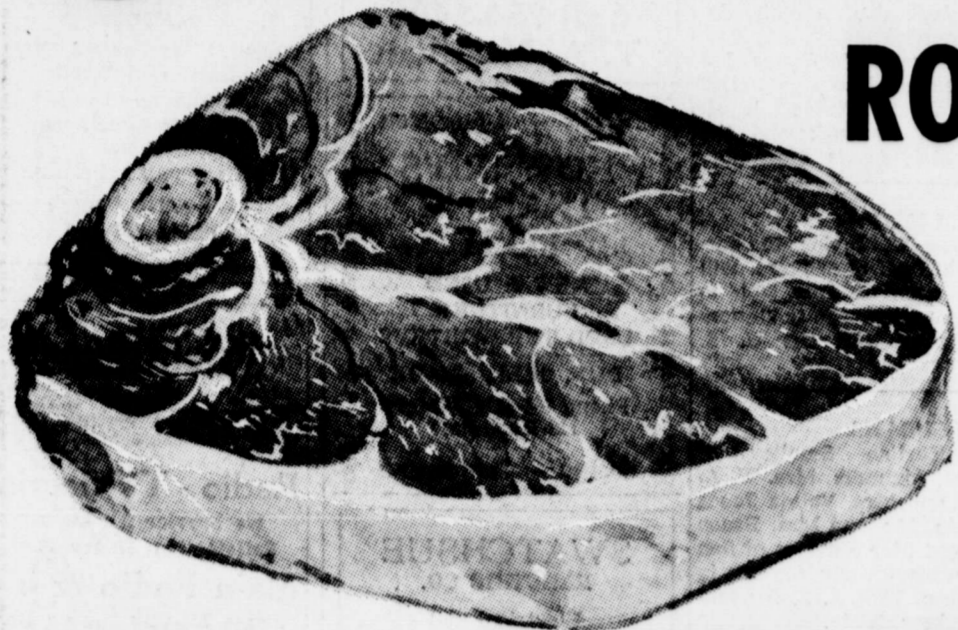

When the special session of the 60th Legislature called it quits and went home, its accomplishments seemed scant—from a cold statistical point of view.

During the 30 days of the session called by Gov. John Connally, the 150 House members introduced 32 bills, and the 31 senators kicked in 30. When all was said and done, only five House bills and no Senate bills were passed.

However, two of those House bills were the reasons Connally called the session in the first place. So their passage within the allotted 30 days gave an appearance of success to the session.

One, of course, was the bill making state appropriations for the fiscal year beginning September 1, and the other was the tax bill to raise the money to pay for all those appropriations.

Texas taxpayers will start feeling the bite October 1 when the one-cent increase in the state sales tax, the one-cent increase in the motor-vehicle sales tax and the 50-cent-per-\$1,000 increase in the franchise tax go into effect.

Rep. Frank Lombardino of San Antonio sponsored the only other new law of interest to the average citizen. It prohibits the carrying of pistols or other concealable weapons into alcoholic-beverage establishments.

The two remaining pieces of legislation were concerned with the internal affairs of state government — transferring \$3,000,000 from the Operators' and Chauffeurs' License Fund to the General Revenue Fund and authorizing the Comptroller to

## SALES-TAX SCHEDULE

When the new increase in the state sales tax goes into effect on October 1, shoppers in cities which have adopted the city sales tax will begin paying the first of the four pennies when they spend their first 13 cents.

Tax applicable to city-sales-tax-covered sales: From 1 cent to 12 cents, no tax; 13 cents to 37 cents, one penny; 38 cents to 62 cents, two pennies; 63 cents to 86 cents, three pennies; 87 cents to \$1.12, four pennies.

Shoppers in areas where there is no city sales tax are facing this schedule: 1 cent to 16 cents, no tax; 17 cents to 49 cents, one penny; 50 cents to 83 cents, two pennies; and 84 cents to \$1.16, three pennies.

However, the Legislature did kick in a few more exceptions. One exempts sales through a coin-operated vending machine when each sale is for 16 cents or less, and another will exempt shipping charges when they are figured separately from the price of the commodities.

A third will exempt machinery used exclusively on farms or ranches in the building or maintaining of roads and water facilities, and exempted from the new third state penny will be sales resulting from a written contract entered into before October 1, and sales for which bids were submitted prior to October 1.

## AUTO INSURANCE RATES RISING

State Insurance Board experts have recommended an increase of about 2.8 per cent in auto insurance premiums.

Although statewide averages are misleading since rates are set by 40 different territories, liability coverage appears to be going up on 33 zones for most drivers. Young drivers face higher rates in 22 territories, lower in seven and the same in 11.

Biggest increase will be for comprehensive and collision policies where the insurance board staff has recommended a hike of 7.7 per cent and 7.1 per cent respectively. Insurance spokesmen claim rising cost of parts and repairs has offset a better traffic accident record.

## Mrs. Juanita O'Connor's Weekly Home Demonstration Agent's Column

### "Fechy-Keen" Fruits

How long have peaches been around? This luscious, fruit favorite has a history that dates back even before the birth of Christ. It was once thought that the peach originated in Persia as is suggested by the botanical name "Prunus Persica L." It is now reasonably certain that the original home of the peach was China. Then it spread westward along the caravan routes through Asia to the Mediterranean countries and later to other parts of Europe.

Considered a symbol of longevity, it has long been cultivated in China. That's why rose-cheeked peaches have appeared so frequently as decorative motifs on Chinese porcelains and art objects intended as birthday gifts.

The Chinese word "Tao," meaning "peach" has been found in Chinese writings of the 5th century B. C. Meanwhile, the Greeks were enjoying this luscious fruit at about the same time. Several centuries later, around the 1st century A. D., the Romans received the peach during the reign of Emperor

Claudius. Afterward it was introduced into countries under Roman influence.

Spanish explorers brought the peach to the New World, and as early as 1600 the fruit was found in Mexico. Because it grew easily from its seeds, the peach spread rapidly northward and westward from where it was first introduced in this country—Florida. By the time the first English colonists came to Virginia, they found peaches growing wild.

That's how the peach got from China to the orchards of the United States of America. What class of plant does the peach actually belong to? Well,

as odd as it might appear, the peach belongs to the Prunoideae subfamily of the rose family (Rosaceae), which also includes the cherries, plums, and apricots, a group known as drupes or stone fruits.

The peach is a succulent and sweet fruit primarily because it contains 87 per cent water. It's low in calories (weight-watchers take note!), and its protein and fat content are negligible. Nevertheless, yellow fleshed-types are especially rich in vitamin A. June is a particularly good month in which to buy peaches, because there is an abundant supply of this exquisite fruit.

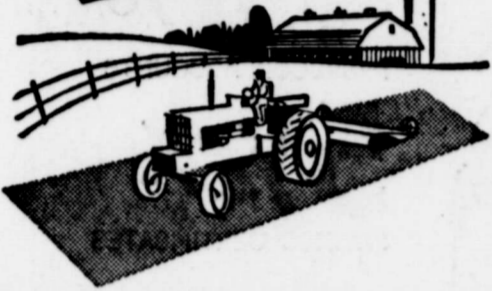

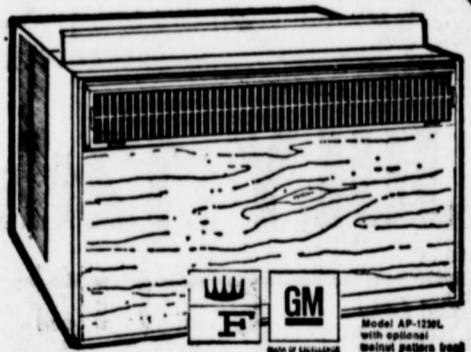

**Bennie Wilde of Bethel Community SWCD Cooperator**

Bennie Wilde, a cooperator with the Runnels Soil and Water Conservation District, has just completed a system of parallel terraces on his farm near Bethel.

Wilde said technicians of the local Soil Conservation Service designed his terrace system to have a minimum of point rows, with an even number of rows between each terrace that can be farmed with 4, 6 or 8-row equipment. He said this would make farming operations easier, faster and cheaper.

Construction of these terraces was done by Wilde with a farm tractor with a dozer blade mounted on the front. A farm tractor with a buggy was used to make the cuts and fill above the terraces to give a more uniform distribution of the water.

Glen Green of the local Soil Conservation Service said this is some 20 miles of parallel terraces constructed by Wilde in 1967-68 as a part of his Great Plains Conservation Program contract.
