The customer had saved say 28 cents by purchasing the package at discount-and the fact that several of the items in the package were no good did not distract from the idea of the saving he made! After all, the brand name was the same, so why couldn't the local merchant make good on the no-

And why is it that a local merchant can't exchange a good shirt for one purchased at discount prices far away; just because the size marked is wrong, and the brand is one the localer never heard of should be no · reason for refusal to exchange! . After all, there was a savings of 79 cents on that particular

. Then up comes the question of servicing products bought from the miles-away distributer. ("I bought this particular appliance at the 'No Refund, No Exchange Discount House,' and it won't run. Will you fix it for me?... No, I don't think I should have to pay more than a dollar for you to come out and get it and fix it. After all, it is new and the tag says 'Guaranteed' and pay for having a new item fixed. Probably just needs a little adjustment on the thingamajig, anyway.")

How many of us ever stop to think just how costly a small apparent saving can be? The , saving is of the moment; the cost-eventual can be reckoned with when it comes up. That seems to be our attitude in too many instances. 

Governor Connally chopped \$3.2 million from the Legislature's spending plans after the 1967 regular session.

Another rider likely to feel Connally's hatchet would deny funds to any state employee who took a leave of absence to work in a political campaign. This proviso wasn't in either House or Senate bill originally. How it showed up in the conference committee report is a mystery of the special session.

Some legislators contend that the governor cannot veto riders. But Connally has done it effectively in the past, and nobody has vet to challenge his authority in court. It's a good bet he plans to do it again
