A budget totaling \$536,036.00 has been adopted for the 1968-69 school year by the board of trustees of the Winters Independent School District. Title I federal funds alloted

Winters for this school year total \$32,808.

The budget is divided into: administrative costs, \$33,720; instruction, \$376,852; operation of plant, \$35.100; maintenance of plant, \$2,700; fixed charges, \$3,750; student activities, \$4,550; capital outlay, \$10,233; debt service, \$40,201. These figures include Title I funds the Elementary-Secondary

Education Act. The school tax rate remains unchanged at \$1.55 per \$100.00 valuation. Of this \$1.31 is for maintenance and operation and 24 cents is for debt retirement. District valuation is \$17,326,405
