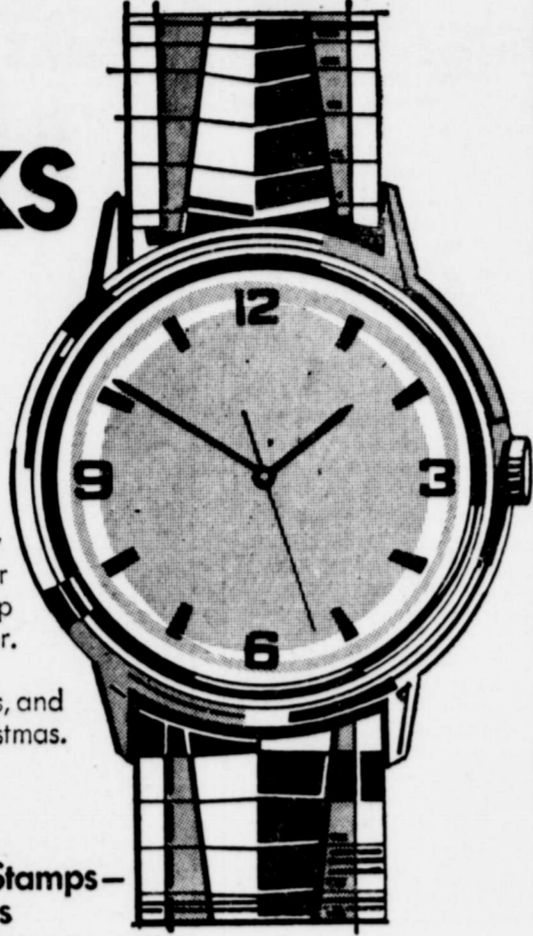
A \$100,500 federal grant has been approved for Marina Bay Park recreation facilities at Wichita Falls.

### FHA Bi-District Meeting Sept. 26 In San Angelo

A bi-district meeting of the Farmers Home Administration will be held in San Angelo September 26-27, according to County Supervisor Foy I. Brown.

Information obtained at a regional meeting held in St. Louis on how to check the flow of rural people into urban areas will be discussed by the state office staff.

The local Farmers Home Administration office will be closed from Wednesday, September 25, at 3 p. m., until 8 a. m., Monday, September 30, due to the meeting. Those attending from the Coleman unit will be Foy I. Brown, county supervisor for District 8.

Brown said that through 133 county offices, the Farmers Home Administration in Texas will loan about \$130 million to rural families and communities this fiscal year.

Last year, about \$60 million was loaned for operating expenses. Over 4,100 rural Texans received loans to improve or construct homes. More than 660 farmers became land owners through the FHA farm ownership loan program and nearly 250 Texas communities received FHA loans to build or expand water systems, sewer systems, recreation projects, and grazing associations.

### Commissioners Set Budget At \$544,579 For Year

A budget of \$544,579.27 for Runnels County for fiscal 1968-69 was adopted by the County Commissioners Court at their meeting Monday.

Property valuation was estimated at \$24,342,545, down \$1,155,808 from last year. County tax is 95 cents on the \$100 valuation.

In the Monday meeting, commissioners adopted a resolution to ask the county tax assessor to assess and collect taxes for the Valley Creek Water Control District, for that part of the district situated within Runnels County, and for Willow Creek Water Control District. This action had been requested by the directors of the respective water control districts.

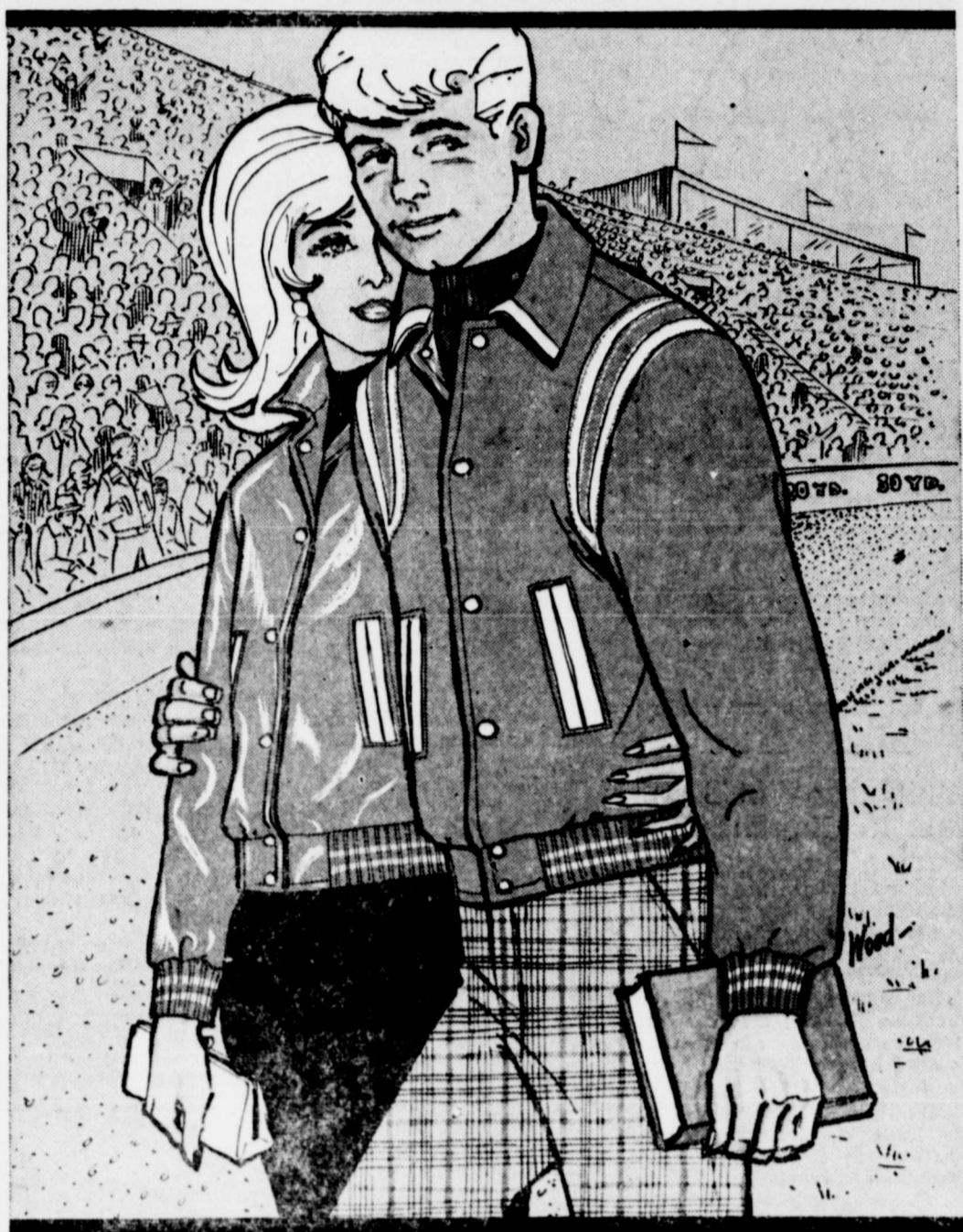

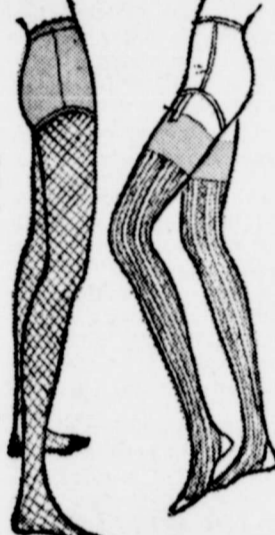

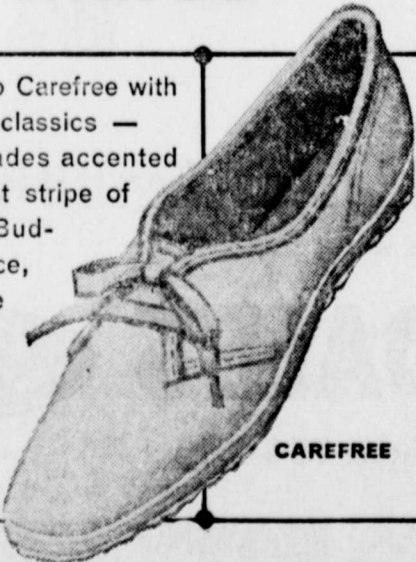

### Four Winters High School Coaches Come From Four Different Colleges

The four members of the Winters High School coaching staff have a varied background in athletics, and are graduates of four different colleges.

The head football coach and athletic director of Winters High School, Jerry Gibson, is a graduate of Abilene Christian College; Jerry Neely, football coach and head basketball coach, is a graduate of McMurry College; Charles (Chili) Black, who will be track coach, is a graduate of Texas Tech; and Tommy Konczak, junior high, freshman and "B" team coach, is a 1968 graduate of Tarleton State College.

Coach Gibson graduated from Abilene Christian College in 1964; he was quarterback for the Wildcats for almost two years. After graduation he coached two years at Lee Junior High School, San Angelo, and was varsity backfield and defensive secondary coach at Central High School, San Angelo. He coached at Abilene High School last year.

Gibson was an all-state quarterback at Breckenridge where he was a student from 1956 to 1959. Also while in Breckenridge High, he was state champion in boys' declamation in 1959, and recipient of an athletic award as a letterman with highest scholastic average. In ACC, he received honorable mention as an All-Texas college quarterback.

He is married and has two sons, ages 6 and 2.

#### JERRY NEELY

Coach Neely is a graduate of Jacksboro High School, where he received 12 letters in tennis, golf, basketball, track and football. A graduate of McMurry College, he was a guard on the Indian Basketball team. In high school, he ran the quarter-mile in track, was a guard on the basketball team, and halfback on the football team.

He has coached at Pampa, Denison, prior to coming to Winters.

#### CHARLES BLACK

Charles "Chili" Black is a graduate of Colorado City High School, where he was a lineman on the football team. He graduated from Texas Technological College, where he majored in physical education and government.

Coach Black was line coach at Post High School 1961-66, and was assistant coach at Denver City in 1967.

He is married to the former Carolyn Bilberry of Colorado City. They have two small sons. He is line coach for the Blizzards and will be track coach.

#### TOMMY KONCZAK

Coach Konczak is a 1968 graduate of Tarleton State College at Stephenville, where he was a four-year letterman in football, playing guard and tackle. He is a graduate of Clyde High School where he ran track and was offensive tackle and defensive guard on the football team.

In addition to coaching the freshmen, "B" team, and junior high team, he is linebacker Coach for the Blizzard "A" team.

Coach Konczak is married to the former Jerry Billings of Midland.

### Four Blizzards Elected Captains

Four members of the WHS Blizzard football team have been named as team Captains for the 1968 football season. They are Mike Kozelsky, Donald Wade, Sam Scott and Charles Mathis.

These Captains were elected by popular vote of the members of the football squad.

According to some sources, in predictions published well in advance of the few days summer pre-season training authorized for Double A schools, the Winters High School Blizzards were tallied as the favorites, or "the team to beat," in District 7-AA this year.

No one really knows who does this pre-season picking — it's suspected that information and experience of returnees, past records of individual teams, coaches' experience, and perhaps even astrological data on team members, is put into a computer and the punch-card answer is passed out as predictions of things to come.

Length of the list of experienced returnees does have a lot to do with it, however. And the Blizzard list is something to gape at: 21 lettermen, plus a goodly batch of upcomers from last year's freshman squad, to lend depth to the 68ers. The returnees remember the dismal 2-8 '67 campaign, but they are using the remembrance for a profit. They got a liberal education through participation in those battles, and seem to be determined to make that education pay off this season. Also, they're bucking to hold onto spots of their choosing or assignment: (Where does a 400-pound gorilla play? Just about any place he wants to!) The coaching staff has been endeavoring to instill that "gorilla" spirit into each of this year's crop—they're going to have to "want" to play, or there will be someone else ready to fill their particular slot!

Thus the "human" element added to the "statistical" element may be the prime factor in making predictions of things to come.

There is a long, lumpy road ahead of the Blizzards this year—and for the other members of 7-AA, for that matter—with only three contests for mettle-testing before the "for keeps" marble games start. Instead of the five non-district games, and the five district games, as has been the case in the past several years, the additions of teams to the 7-AA roster

has increased the counters to seven. The district lost a team—Colorado City went upstairs to AAA—and then picked up Coleman, Merkel and Ballinger. Now the list reads Winters, Stamford, Coleman, Haskell, Hamlin, Anson, Ballinger and Merkel.

The Blizzards opened the season last weekend in a non-conference contest with Sonora, there. Sonora—Single A—were state champions in their category in 1966, and went 9-2 in '67. They were supposed to return 7 offensive and 5 defensive regulars this season, and were pre-season picked to give some real tough competition in their 8-A district, and in out-district also, for that matter.

#### COAHOMA

This week's contest is another non-con. with Coahoma visiting the Blizzards. Another Single A team—District 5-A—Coahoma is supposed to have 6 offensive and 8 defensive returnees. They had a 6-4 season in '67. Some of the returning lettermen are said to be HB Dean Richters and Ricky Evans on offense, and linemen Gene Snow, Rodney Wall and Leo Bender. Others probably will be QB Royce Reid, FB Johnny Fowler, and Linemen Ronnie Lepand and Gaylon Williams.

#### CLYDE

Next week the Blizzards, having started the season against Single A teams, go up a slot and take on a team of equal category—Clyde, of District 8-AA, at Clyde. This will be the last no-counter before the go-for-broke season.

Clyde had a tough season in 1967—0-10—but put their bets this year on, say 7 offensive and 7 defensive returnees. The cope is that Clyde lacks size and speed, but they are capable of giving just about anybody a run for their money.

#### ANSON

On October 4, all the pre-season training and pre-conference playing will—or better—begin to pay off for the Blizzards. On that date, and again on the road, the Big Blue will

begin to play for keeps, going against the Anson Tigers.

Anson had a hard season—4-6—in '67, and reportedly have no depth of returnees—none offensively, and only one defensively, it is said. They can be expected to build up some valuable experience by the time this game is whistled open. One of last Anson's victories last year was over Coleman, 26-7.

#### HAMLIN

Hamlin will come to Winters October 11. The Pied Pipers had an 8-2 record in '67, but lost five all-districters. Four offensive and three defensive men are expected on this year's Piper squad.

Hamlin edged Winters last year 21-20, and also beat Clyde 21-0.

#### HASKELL

Winters vs. Haskell October 18, at Haskell.

The Indians, after being put in the same conference with Winters, went for several years without a win over the Big Blue. In last year's annual contest, they finally did it—25-0—helping to sustain an 8-2 record for '67. They have a passer—said to be QB Lanny Ivy—who is one of 4 offensive returnees for this year. Reportedly, the Indians have two defensive returnees.

This game will be a counter, so anything can happen.

#### MERKEL

Merkel was promoted for this year, up from Class A. They had a 9-1 '67 season, and bring back about 4 defensive and 4 offensive starters.

The Blizzards haven't met Merkel in a good many years, and will be dead-set against letting these newcomers to 7-AA carry any trophies away from Blizzard Field October 25.

#### STAMFORD

Game in Winters, November 1.

In four years, Stamford advanced to the playoffs three times, and they will be against any idea that Winters can match them this night on the playing field. They took the Blizzards 17-0 last season, but

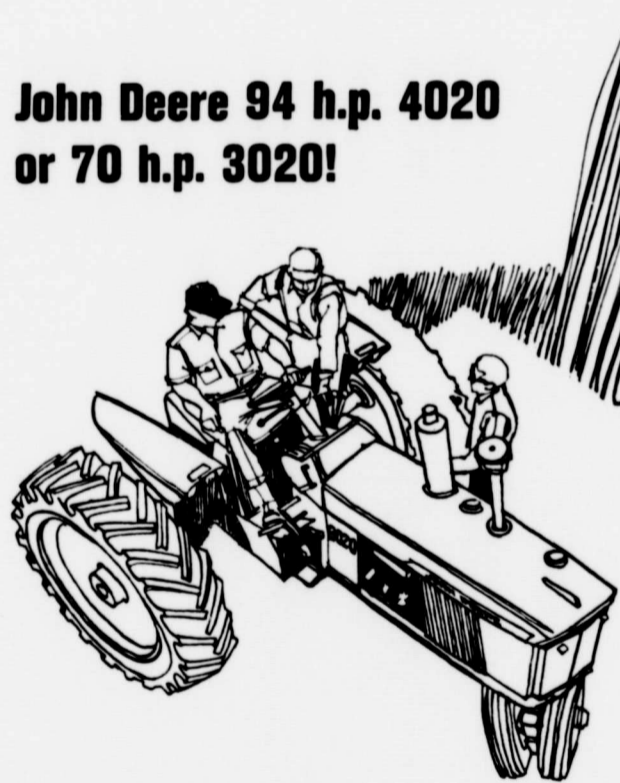
Patterson is a senior student, and was an outstanding lineman during his Blizzard football days.

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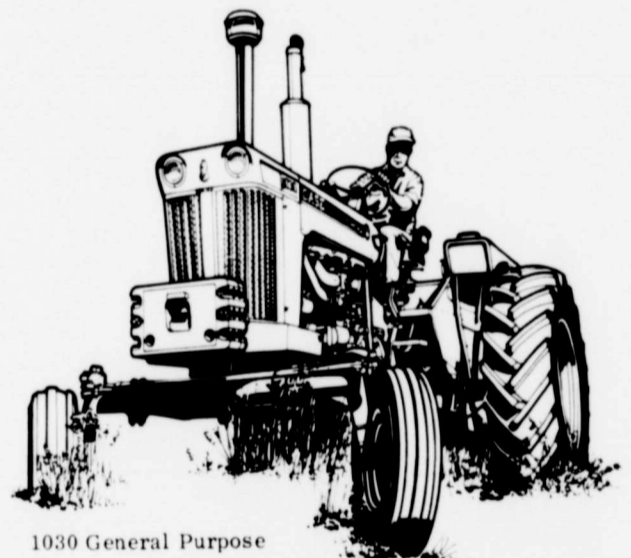
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## "Football" Has Been Around A Long Time

Ancient savage tribes started kicking a ball around 'way back beyond the limits of recorded history. The Athenians and Spartans and Corinthians, 2500 years ago, had a "ball kicking" game. The Greeks called it "Episkuros," and the Romans called it "Harpastum." The latter are supposed to have carried the game of football to the British Isles when they invaded in the First Century, B. C.

Without a doubt, the game called football in the United States today comes directly from the English game of Rugby, though there obviously have been modifications. A game called football was played on college greens well over a century ago. An annual Freshman and Sophomore series of "scrim-

mages" began at Yale in 1940. The first formal intercollegiate football game in the U. S. is said to have been the Princeton - Rutgers contest at New Brunswick, N. J., Nov. 6, 1869. Rutgers won 6 goals to 4.

The number of men on a team varied in the early days of the game among colleges in this country. By mutual agreement, teams had as many as 25, 20, 15, or eleven players. A football convention was called in 1880, and schools were persuaded to agree to a rule calling for 11 players on each side.

A rule was adopted in 1882 requiring the offensive team to make 5 yards in three downs or surrender the ball.

In 1906, President Theodore Roosevelt called a meeting of Yale, Harvard and Princeton representatives in an attempt to reforming and improving the game of football. The game had become so brutal that many colleges outlawed it. The forward pass was introduced, and other modifications made, and the game "cleaned up."

## Blizzard Attack Will Be Basically From Split 'T'

Blizzard mentor Jerry Gibson is training toward a basic Split "T" offense, but not all of the Winters eggs will be put in a single basket. The Blizzards will be out to win, so flexibility will be the rule for the 1968 football squad, and the system of attack will depend on the team being played on a given date, it was indicated.

On defense, the Big Blue Bunch will use the "Oklahoma 52" defensive pattern, the coach said.

For passing attacks, the arms of Mike Kozelsky, senior, and Reese McQuiston, junior, will be the mainstays. Kozelsky is a probable starter in the quarterback spot.

Arlan Barnes, a junior, is a probable for the starting fullback post. James Greer probably will start most games at right half, with either Fred Wilder or Charles Mathis at left half.

End positions will be filled by probables Jerry Tischler and Alton Pierce, with Sam Scott and Rex Harrison at tackle.

At guard, it probably will be Donald Wade and Alan Hart as starters.

Bob Colburn at center. This year's Blizzard squad is of medium weight, perhaps heavy for a AA school, averaging about 170 on the line.

Alan Barnes and James Greer, both fast on the field, will probably see a lot of ball-carrying action. Greer is a "10-flat" sprinter, and if given a little air in the secondary is capable of splitting any situation wide open.

Coach Gibson reports the Blizzards to be in good condition (prior to the first game of the season), with few injuries to plague them. Alan Hart received a torn muscle on an instep in pre-school training, but it is not expected to give him much trouble once the playing season is underway.

The Blizzards showed up good in a scrimmage with Colorado City a couple of weeks ago, and intersquad scrimmages have taken a lot of kinks out of them. The first game of the season, against Sonora last week, was used to further condition the team and to make any necessary adjustments in assignments

## McMurry Coach Former Blizzard

Buddy Fornes, football coach at McMurry College, Abilene, is a graduate of Winters High School and an ex-Blizzard.

Coach Fornes is in his third year as McMurry Indian coach.

Films of the football game played on the previous Friday night are shown, the coaching staff speaks to the Boosters and briefs them on the game played, and discuss the game scheduled for the following Friday.

The Booster Club provides the film for movies of Blizzard football games, and members of the club operate the camera.

### Fish Cleaning Made Easy

Keep things neat by scaling fish on an old copy of a magazine. Clean one fish, turn a couple of pages, clean another, and so on. You always have a clean place to work and very little mess to clean afterwards.

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# OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

Probably the first fish a youngster catches is the so-called perch or bream, or if you want to be more formal, the sunfish.

Some anglers never graduate from this stage, continuing to catch these diminutive battlers right on through life . . . an understandable and admirable

thing to do. Catching perch, anyway you take it, is just plain wholesome fun.

Trouble is, most anglers approach the sport with the wrong idea. They use heavy tackle that soon aborts any notions the perch may have about putting up a protest.

Secret is to catch them on light tackle, the lighter the better, something like an ultra-light spinning outfit with two-pound-test line or maybe a fly rod.

Ounce for ounce, the perch is the fightiest fish that swims. It even puts the fabled black bass to shame. Show me a perch and a bass the identical size and it will be no contest in a tugging match. The sunfish will win every time.

Only regrettable thing is that the sunfish doesn't grow very large. Get one a half pound or larger and you've got a BIG one. But even one the size of your hand can put a healthy bend in an ultra-light spinning rod or a fly-rod.

In some places, like Caddo Lake and Lake O' the Pines in Northeast Texas, Dam B Lake in Southeast Texas, and Marble Falls Lake in Central Texas, catching sunfish is good sport.

On Lake O' the Pines, one of the favorite baits is the gray cricket. Most anglers fish along the trees standing in the lake. They lower the cricket down deep where the sunfish hang out.

There are many members of the sunfish family in Texas. True identification of your catch is compounded because of hybrids and inter-breeding between the species. Some of them are truly colorful characters, spotted and touched with bright colors.

One of the most popular members of the family in Texas is the so-called goggle-eyed perch. This actually is the warmouth. It is sort of an olive green all over with a large mouth, looking offhand something like a black bass.

Another favorite is the blue-gill. Since the overall coloration will vary, the best identifying marks, universally, are the several black spots visible at the rear part of the top fin when the fin is spread open.

Other important Texas species are the yellow-breasted sunfish and the long-eared sunfish. These can really be confused. Actually, the yellow-breast has longer ears than the long-ear and the long-ear has a more vivid yellow breast than the yellow-breasted.

The common sunfish also is quite common and can best be identified by a bright red spot on the gill cover and light blue stripes on its cheeks.

Another important one is the green sunfish, which as its name implies is generally green all over.

Actually, identification is something most fishermen could care less about. They just like to catch and eat the ubiquitous perch, its nationality be hanged.

No elaborate tackle is needed to catch perch. An ordinary cane pole will suffice. But it is more fun on sporting tackle like an ultra-light spinning outfit or fly-rod.

Most perch are taken on bait. But this is because fishermen never have learned the greater pleasure they can get from catching 'em on artificial baits. Tiny spinner baits and wet flies will take almost as many in number, and usually the average size taken on artificials will run larger than those on comparable natural baits.

It is wise to remember, however, that the wet flies should be small, about No. 10 in size. Also good at times are small popping bugs.

The list of baits that will tempt perch is almost endless. Favorite, of course, is the earthworm. Also good are small grasshoppers, crickets, tiny bits of frozen shrimp, and grubs.

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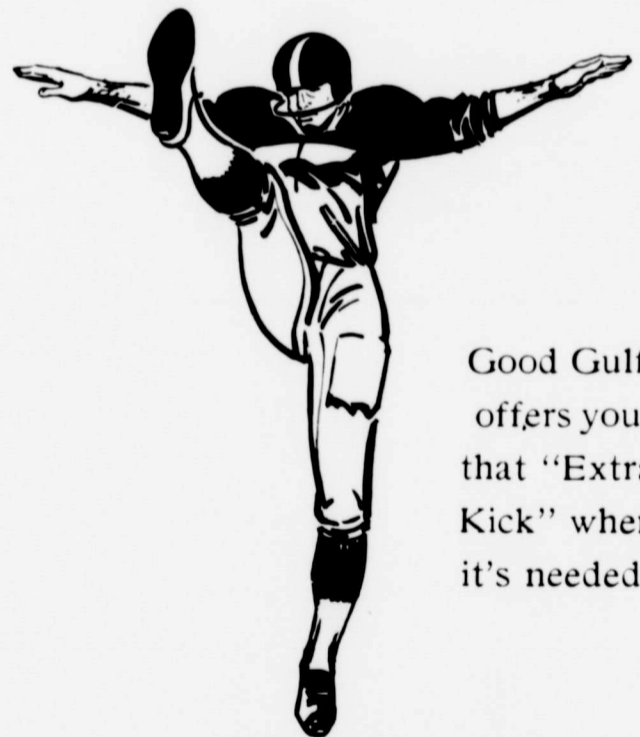

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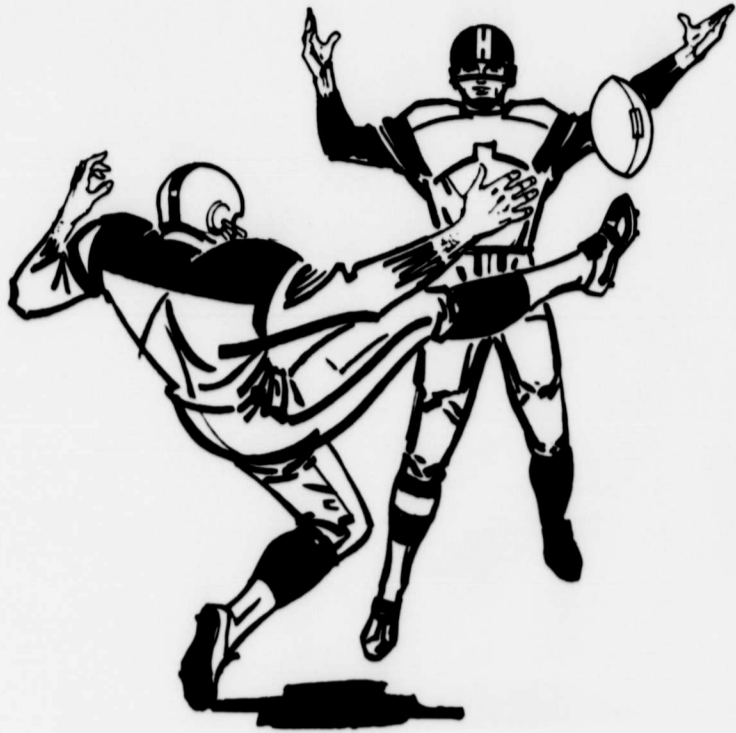
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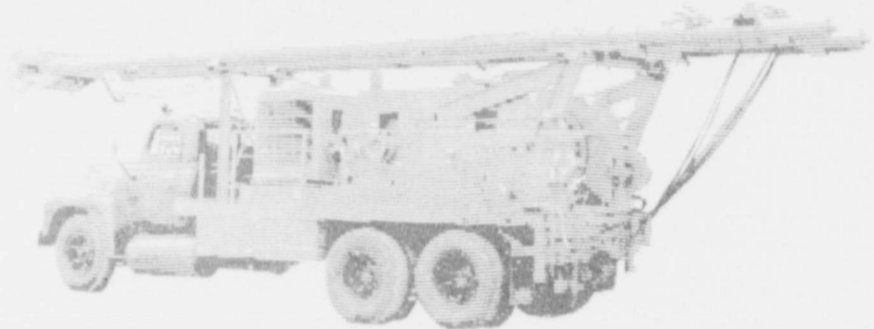
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
