HOME TOWN Talk

One of the latest editions added to the large and growing list at the Winters Public Library will be a welcome addition to those who have a place in their hearts for the world of Currier & Ives. It is possible—probable—too, that the ranks of Currier & Ives lovers will be at least be lengthened to some extent because of the presence of this edition in the local library. Because even those who have never given a thought one way or another to these 19th Century artists are bound to be affected after even the most casual flip-through of the book.

"The World of Currier & Ives," by Roy King and Burke Davis, is a large book, with over a hundred reproductions of Currier & Ives prints. Fly-leaf description says, "The purpose of this luxurious volume is to make available once more the remarkable lithographs, just as they came from the hand presses of Currier & Ives, 'Printmakers to the American People'."

The original prints reproduced in the book—using six-color deep-etch offset to retain their unique beauty—have been selected from the Roy King Collection. Each is accompanied by an evocative description which re-creates in words the vanished time it represents—the "World of Currier & Ives."

The introductory essay is a lively, authoritative narrative of the lives of these Yankee super-salesmen, Currier & Ives, of their early "production line" for hand-tinted prints, and their unique success in reflecting the color and tradition of an age.

Go around to the Winters Public Library and study this book. It'll make your life just a mite fuller.

The book was presented to the Winters Public Library by Bob Bredemeyer in memory of the late Melvin Kurtz. Because of its size and the desire to keep the book in as good condition as possible, it will not be available on a check-out basis, but may be read in the reading room at any time the library is open.

The Junior Livestock Show will be held in the school livestock barn in early January, and is sponsored by the Winters Agricultural and Livestock Association.

Four Youths Are Charged With Additional Acts

Four youths who were charged last week with destruction of private property over \$50 in connection with two vandalism incidents near Winters recently this week were charged with additional acts of vandalism. Bond of \$1,000 was set for each of the four in the first charge; later charges brought \$1,000 bonds for three, and \$5,000 for another, according to Winters police. The second charge was for destruction of the Runnels County Archery Association club house on the association's range at the Winters Lake. Fire completely destroyed the interior of the building, and contents were completely destroyed, according to the report. Charged were Johnny Salinas, 18, Juan Sanchez, 18, Johnny Rodriguez, 17, and Eloy Rodriguez, 18. Another youth, age 15, was released to his parents. An estimated \$1,000-\$1,300 damage was done on two tractors and farm equipment on the R. T. O'Dell farm southeast of Winters, and a barn containing 300 bales of hay leased to Ladd Davis, was burned six miles northeast of Winters. These alleged acts were basis for the first charges. The burning of the Archery Association club house reportedly took part on the same night.

November Snows Help Increase Year's Moisture

Three snows in November, unusual for this area, plus accompanying rainfall, helped to increase total moisture received in the first eleven months of 1968 to several inches above what was received in any of the past five years.

The snows of November were "wet," with the month's moisture recorded at 3.44 inches. One snow fell the first part of the month, with the second on November 27, and another November 30. Moisture received during November of 1967, but the total received for the first eleven months averaged high above what had been received this month was below that for November 1967, but the total received for the first eleven months averaged high above what had been received in any year in the past several.

Rainfall and moisture content of snow has been recorded in Winters during the past several months by an official U. S. Weather Recording Station.

School Workshop Set For Next Saturday, Dec. 14

An "overhead projector" workshop will be held for teachers of the Winters school system next Saturday, December 14, in the Elementary School. George M. Beard, elementary principal, has announced.

The workshop will begin at 8 a. m. and continue to 12 noon. Clyde Warren, media coordinator for the Region 15 Education Center in San Angelo will be in charge of the workshop. Teachers attending will receive instruction on the use of the "overhead projector" in the classroom.

Tax Laws Require Good Records On Business Travel

If you plan to list a business deduction for travel and entertainment expenses be sure to have the records to substantiate these expenses, the District Director of Internal Revenue, has warned. Estimates of these expenses are not legally acceptable for tax purposes.

The director said in many instances a taxpayer should keep a diary or timely record as well as receipts and invoices to back up a travel or entertainment expense.

To substantiate entertainment expenses you must establish the amount of each separate expenditure except for miscellaneous items like cabs, phone calls, tips and meals while traveling away from home, which can be added together for each day. In addition, the date of the expenditure must be confirmed, the name of the person entertained indicated and the type and location of the entertainment described.

The director said the taxpayer's records should also show the reason for the entertainment or the business benefit expected, the nature of the business discussion and the names, titles and business relationship of the persons entertained.

Hunters Bring Many Deer To Winters Plant

Deer hunters from this area—and a few from out of the area—have brought in about 115 head of deer to Jay's Locker Plant in Winters since the season opened. Jay Dunnam, operator of the processing plant, said he expected a good many more deer to be brought in before the season closes the first of the year.

Most of the deer have been bagged in neighboring counties, and in the hill country. A few have been shot in Runnels County, it was reported. This has been a good year for deer, it was said, with most of the animals in good shape.

As for wild turkeys, there has been reports on the luck hunters have had. Turkeys are game which hunters dress out themselves and do not take to locker plants to have processed. Dunnam said his plant was not equipped to handle turkeys.

Early Snows Scotch Cotton Picking In Area

The unseasonal snows during Thanksgiving week again brought to a halt for several days stripping of the rest of the 1968 cotton crop in the North Runnels County.

Strippers had been back in the fields only a few days, after moisture in the form of rain and snow earlier in the month had run them out, when another rain and heavy snowfall on November 27, the day before Thanksgiving, stopped them again. The snow returned—for the third time in November—on Saturday of last week, prolonging re-entry into the cotton fields.

A high percentage of this year's cotton crop has been stripped, but there still remains much to be done to complete the job. As of Tuesday noon, Winters Warehouse Co. reported that 10,605 bales had been received from three North Runnels County gins. Some of the gins still are working long hours in an attempt to clear their yards before the strippers go back to work. One big disadvantage this year in the harvest of the cotton crop has been a shortage of cotton trailers. Many farmers would have been finished if there had been a larger supply of trailers, it has been indicated.

City Employees Have Put Up New Yule Decorations

Employees from several departments of the City of Winters within the past few days put up the Christmas decorations on downtown streets.

The tinsel stringers which are strung across the streets are new this year, replacing stringers which had become worn and weather-beaten. The new tinsel is gold; old tinsel was green and white. Also, several new lights were installed on the stringers.

The stringers which have been in use for several years were originally purchased by the Winters Chamber of Commerce. The City of Winters has provided the new decorations.

Post Office Lists Suggestions For Christmas Mailing

The Post Office Department has released several suggestions—concerning Christmas mailing which should help to expedite delivery of mail during the peak holiday season, Postmaster H. M. (Jiggs) Nichols has announced.

These suggestions have to do mainly with the mailing of Christmas greeting cards and the use of the ZIP code. Postmaster Nichols said greeting cards for distant States should be mailed not later than December 11 and those for local delivery not later than December 16, if there is to be any assurance that they will reach their destination by Christmas. He also reminded that there will be no delivery of Christmas cards and letters, other than special delivery, on Christmas Day.

The advantages of using first-class mail, and the fact that the postage is no higher than the third-class rate, should be noted, the postmaster said. Greeting cards prepaid at the first-class rate (6 cents) may be sealed and contain written messages and will be given priority of dispatch, delivery and forwarding, he said. Also, undeliverable first-class mail is returned to the sender at no additional cost if the return address is shown on the envelope. Christmas cards will require 6 cents postage, whether sealed or unsealed, it was stated. If no return address is used, they will be handled as third-class mail, and if undeliverable, will go to the dead-letter department.

Importance of including the ZIP code will help to expedite delivery of all mail, the postmaster said.

The Post Office will be happy to lend any assistance or give any information which may help in Christmas mailing, the postmaster said.

The annual Christmas Parade scheduled for Saturday (December 7) will open the Christmas season in Winters. The parade will start at 3 p. m.

Immediately following the parade, a "hay-money scramble" will be held for the kids, on the street in front of the Chamber of Commerce office.

Organizations and service clubs have been invited to enter floats in the parade. Floats entered in this category will compete for cash prizes of \$35, \$25, and \$15. The Chamber of Commerce has provided money which organizations can use to build floats.

There also will be a division in the parade for commercial floats, to be judged for first, second and third places. Plaques will be awarded in this division.

All businesses and firms are being urged to enter some type of float in this Christmas parade. All kids who would like to enter the parade, on bicycles, in wagons, or in any manner, will be welcomed, and are urged to do so by the Chamber of Commerce.

The Winters High School Band, under the direction of Kirke McKenzie, will lead the parade. This year, for the first time, the Junior High School Band also will be in the parade, McKenzie said.

Immediately following the parade, a "hay-money" scramble will be held on West Dale in front of the Chamber of Commerce office. In this event, hay will be spread over the street and \$50 in silver will be scattered in the hay. Kids will be allowed to "scramble" for the money. This event will be divided into two divisions, with kids age 5-6 in one group, and those age 7-8 in the other. The area will be roped off. In case of inclement weather, the hay scramble will be moved to the Fred Young parking lot building across the street from the Chamber of Commerce office.

In a regular meeting of the board of the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday night, directors expressed the hope that merchants and businesses in town participate in this parade, in some manner. It was noted that some other towns in the area were having parades on the same day and that competition will be keen.

WHS Band, Choir To Give Concert Monday, Dec. 16

The Winters High School Band and Choir will present the annual Christmas Concert Monday, December 16, in the high school auditorium. The program will begin at 7:30 p. m.

The band and choir will present new and different numbers for this year's concert, Kirke McKenzie, band director, said.

The second quarter continued in the same manner with the Blizzards having trouble getting enough momentum to take the lead. The half time ended with the Blizzards still trailing 28-24. Gary Antilley and Randall Sneed led all scoring with 10 apiece at intermission.

The third quarter saw the Blizzards make their challenge and with less than one minute remaining the score was tied 39-39. With two seconds remaining Antilley made one to grow on with a 30 foot set shot. The quarter ended 41-39 in favor of Winters.

The fourth quarter was a sizzler with the Blizzard supporters on edge the entire time. When the going got tough, it was Mr. Sneed who provided the necessary effort. He canned 10 points in the final 8 minutes. Gary Antilley also cooled the visitors with his two perfect charity tosses. The game ended 58-54.

The Blizzards close out the tournament at 7:30 Saturday night in a grudge game with Coahoma.

Grapefruit, Other Citrus:

You get the most vitamin C from grapefruit and other citrus by eating the pulp as well as the juice. Of course, most of us eat grapefruit because of how good it is, rather than how good it is for us! Nevertheless, half of a large grapefruit provides more than half the daily vitamin C requirement of an adult. What an easy time to serve this item. All that is really necessary is to cut the grapefruit in half. To make eating easier, take out the seeds and center core and cut between the sections. Most of us prefer grapefruit "as is," but sometimes there's a call for salt or sugar.

When grapefruit halves are served as appetizers or desserts, the center is usually decorated with colorful fruit—a maraschino cherry, a few grapes or a strawberry. Or put a mound of fruit sherbet—orange, lemon, lime or raspberry—in center of each half.

A delicious way to sweeten grapefruit is to cut out the white center and fill the hole with strained honey. Set the sweetened fruit in the refrigerator for a few hours or overnight, so that the honey can penetrate all parts of the fruit, giving it a delicious honey flavor. Some restaurateurs that serve breakfast grapefruit this way call it Grapefruit Supreme. Another sweetened variation is prepared grapefruit halves with a spoonful of strawberry, raspberry or cherry preserves in the center. Or try a dish to delight the youngsters — grapefruit halves with peppermint stick candy crushed very fine and sprinkled

generously on top. Let the candy stand on the grapefruit about 15 minutes before serving.

Try broiled grapefruit: You'll be surprised at how the heat mellow the flavor. Just sprinkle each grapefruit half with sugar and a dash of spice—cinnamon, mace or nutmeg. Then dot with bits of table fat and broil 10 to 15 minutes with direct heat on the broiler rack set 3 to 4 inches from the heat. When the grapefruit halves are just slightly browned and heated through, serve them hot. Or tray baking the grapefruit halves 15 minutes in an oven set at 400 degrees.

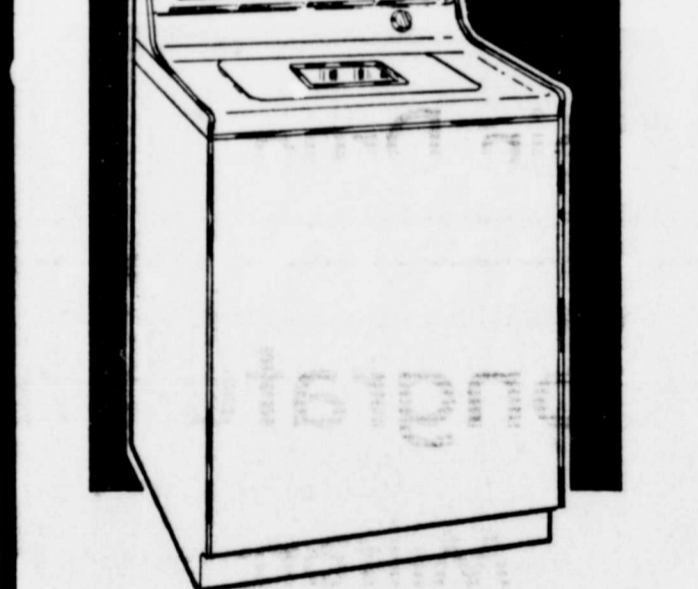
