

EASTLAND COUNTY AGENT WINS NATIONAL HONORS FOR WORK

COLLEGE STATION, Sept. 9. - J. M. Cooper, Eastland county agricultural agent since 1945, is one of six Texans named to receive the National County Agricultural Agents Association's Distinguished Service Award for 1954. He was selected by the Texas Association, and the announcement was made by Bexar County Agent R. B. Tate, chairman, State Selection Committee. The awards are made annually

to county agents who over a period of years have made outstanding contributions to agriculture. Formal presentation, a highlight of the annual national meeting, will be made in Salt Lake City, Utah. Cooper plans to attend this October 11-14 meeting.

Cooper's first Texas Agricultural Extension Service appointment was made on February 1, 1938, when he was named county agent in Trinity county. In April 1942 he was transferred to Stephens county and in 1945 to his present position.

In Trinity county he is credited with organizing the Davy Crockett-Trinity Soil Conservation District. He was best known in east Texas for his pasture work. Hairy vetch, White Dutch and other clovers were introduced as cover and pasture crops.

The 4-H Boys under his supervision gathered pine seed, and from them in nurseries grew pine seedlings for reforestration. Communities were organized and through these groups educational programs on the latest methods of crop and livestock production were taught. Several wildlife conservation areas were also established under his direction.

In Stephens county he helped to organize the Upper Clear Fork of the Brazos Soil Conservation District; introduced vetch as a soil building crop for the county and through an expanded 4-H program, commenced many new demonstrations including swine improvement. Also carried on the many community and county



activities connected with the war program.

tending annual national associa-In Eastland county he is directing programs which have been developed around commodity group interests. He has organized a county dairy association; the Central Texas Turkey Growers Association and more recently a county pecan show which is the only one of its kind in Texas. His work in the field of horticulture is well known.

Tours and field days held on the farms and ranches of demonstrators have been used by Cooper to spread educational information on the use of new and improved farm and ranch practices. The acreage planted to alfalfa has increased in the county as has the number of trench silos used. Soil and water conservation, 4-H club work, community improvement and many other activities all get attention in the Eastland county extension program.

Cooper is a native of Shelby county and a 1931 graduate of Texas A. and M. College. Prior to his extension employment, he taught vocational agriculture and worked for the Soil Conservation Service and the Agricultural Adjustment Administration.

He has just completed a twoyear term as a director of the Texas County Agents Association and for the past two years has served as chairman of Favors Committee of the state group attion meetings in Chicago and Philadelphia.

Auto Inspection Period Dates Set By State Agency

AUSTIN, Sept. 2. - Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety Commission has oficially set the dates for the new inspection period for autos under the provision of the State's Motor Vehicle Inspection Act.

Texas motorists must secure the annual inspection of their cars between September 15th, 1954, and April 15th, 1955, according to the Commission Order.

At the same time George Busby, Chief of the DPS Motor Vehicle Inspection Division, said that the inspectors from his office have filed 106 cases against car owners who failed to have their cars checked during the current inspection period. These, he said, are in addition to those cases filed by members of the Texas Highway Patrol and by various local police departments throughout the State.

Unable to give an estimation of the actual number of violations for which arrests have been made during the 1953-54 period, Busby said that he "believed the figure to be comparatively low" due to the fact that frequent spot checks indicate that Texans have conformed with the law "almost 100 percent."

Rising Star Man Is Appointed To **FHA** Committee

Oral E. Davis of Rising Star is the newly appointed member of the Eastland County Farmers Home Administration committee, George I. Lane, the agency's county supervisor, announced this week. The appointment became effective August 27. Mr. Davis operates a general farm.

The other two members of the committee are Leslie H. Hagaman of Ranger and Ewing Baker Jr., of Eastland.

Each member is named for a three year term, and one appointment expires each year. No member completing a three year term can succeed himself.

Every agricultural county in the country has such a committee to help the Farmers Home Administration county supervisor adapt the agency's loan policies to local conditions, including farm credit needs.

ty committee for Eastland county has approved 171 loans out of a total of 258 of applications received, Mr. Lane reported.

The Farmers Home Administration makes loans to family-type farm operators to buy, improve or operate efficient farms, or to construct or repair farm water facilities needed for profitable operation. Special livestock loans are made where temporary credit is needed to enable the operator to remain in operation. The agency also makes emergency loans in counties or states that have been designated by the Secretary of Agriculture as areas where emergency credit is needed. However, the agency does not make loans of any type to any applicant whose needs can be handled by other credit sources.

Before any money can be borrowed through the agency, an applicant must have the approval of the county committee. In the case of a farm ownership loan, the farm to be purchased, enlarged, or improved must also be approved by the committee, the county supervisor explained.



orris W. Parker, manager of **Texas** Insurance Advisory ociation, said that figures compiled by his organization showed that smoking in bed caused 44 hotel fires last year. Leaving burning cigaretts in ash trays, tossing them into waste baskets and other careless smoking habits accounted for 28 other hotel fires.

Electrical wiring and kitchen grease fires accounted for most of the other hotel fires last year, the insurance trade association said.

County Aid Asked For Fire Fighting


The Eastland County Commissioners Court has under advisement a request for help in setting up and maintaining a rural fire department for the county at their meeting last week. All cities of the county were represented.

Sutton Crofts, rural fire chief; L. E. Sublett, city fire chief, and R. N. Cluck, city commissioner, represented Cisco at the meeting. The various delegations spoke in favor of the project.

County officials pointed out that it was doubtful that state laws will permit funds to be spent for rural fire departments.

NEW YORK, N. Y. - William Paul Moss, ranch and oil magnate, and former West Texas judge, is the author of ROUGH AND TUMBLE, his life-story which is released today by Vantage Press, New York Publishers. \$3.00.

Now owner of a magnificent ranch house in Odessa, Texas, set on 31 acres of his 7,000-acre ranch, Mr. Moss started life on a farm in Clay County, N. C., a member of a poor but hard-working family. Ultimately, he managed to work his way through Hiawasee College in Georgia, and Valparaiso University in Indiana, from which he received a law degree. Later, he did graduate work at Texas University.

His ambition and restless spirit brought him to Odessa where he felt sure he would succeed in making a place for himself. After many years of hardships, through rugged determination Mr. Moss achieved success in his legal profession, became District Judge (70th Judicial District, Texas), and achieved financial success when his luck finally turned.

The author of three previous books, William Moss has now found time to present the details of his colorful career in a vivid fast-moving picture of U.S. life as it was at the turn of the century. His baptism of fire in the West came on a day when young Paul rode over a hill in the New Mexico badlands and ran smack into a blazing gun battle. A tranger, shoving a rifle into his hands, shouted: "If you can shoot, take this and fight for your life," and left the young man to do exactly that. Mr. Moss has been fighting ever since, in the law courts and on the Texas plains. ROUGH AND TUMBLE is the story of his colorful career.
