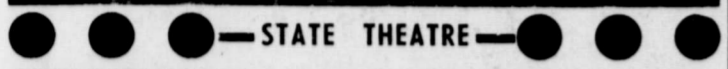

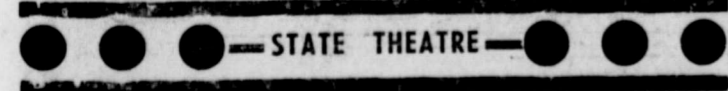

Official Marker Gives History Of Methodist Church

The cast aluminum historical marker which recently was placed on the site of the First United Methodist Church in Winters, gives a short and concise history of the local church, and will be dedicated Sunday afternoon at 2:30 as a part of the Homecoming services of the church.

The marker recently was authorized by the Texas State Historical Survey Committee, and measures 27 by 42 inches. This is the 16th Official Texas Historical Marker to be erected in Runnels County, according to Rankin Pace, chairman of the Runnels County Historical Survey Committee.

The inscription on the marker reads: "First Methodist Church of Winters.

"Site of the first church building at Winters and oldest Methodist Church site in Runnels County. The congregation was organized in 1891, under George D. Wilson, pastor. For eight years, they shared the local school building with other denominations.

"The first church building—a frame structure—was erected on this site in 1899 under the pastorate of John Wesley Bowden, pioneer circuit rider. In 1911 a large tabernacle, also frame, was built near the first church, which was moved to Hatchel in 1912. The tabernacle was unique in that its sides could be opened to receive cool breezes in the summer.

"It was used for services until the third church was erected in 1913. Subsequently, it housed summer revivals and large community gatherings. It also substituted as a sanctuary at necessary times.

"The third church—a steeped red brick building—served for 11 years, until the present brick church was erected, at a cost of \$40,000. In 1925 parishoners literally placed \$8,500.50 in cash on a barrelhead one Sunday to retire the church building debt, and, incidentally, to act out the familiar saying.

A church building has stood on this corner—and worship has been held here—each Sunday since 1899. (1969)."

Governor Smith To Investigate Rates On Auto Insurance

Governor Preston Smith said Thursday he will launch a "full-scale" investigation into the spiraling private passenger automobile insurance rates in Texas.

"The announcement Tuesday that the Insurance Commission staff has recommended an 11.4 per cent increase in private auto rates borders on catastrophe and has become intolerable for many of our citizens," the Governor said.

One of the first steps the Governor plans is to call a meeting in Austin "as soon as possible" of a representative group of presidents of insurance firms in the state.

He also said he is exploring the possibility of naming a small select panel of lay citizens outside the insurance industry to make a thorough study and recommendations.

"There also is pending in both the House and Senate appointment of interim study committees of Legislators to look into auto insurance rates," the Governor added.

He said he is hopeful combined efforts on all fronts can "come up with some solid recommendations and steps which the Legislature can take at its next regular session."

"We must face the fact," Smith said, "that Texas is one of the few states in the nation which still maintains a controlled rate system on auto insurance."

The vast majority of states are under a competitive system or utilize some form of the merit system which Texas once had, the Governor said.

CTO Gets Grant Of \$14,782 For Program Service

Congressman Omar Burleson has notified The Enterprise that Central Texas Opportunities, Inc., has received a grant of \$14,782 for program administration and neighborhood service systems. The grant is from the Federal Office of Economic Opportunities.

CTO serves Callahan, Coleman, Concho, McCulloch and Runnels counties. The grant received is for eleven months.
