HOME TOWN Talk

The Christmas parade sponsored by the Winters Chamber of Commerce this year — Saturday, December 6, 10 a. m. — will be strictly for the kids. There will be four divisions in the parade, with cash prizes for winning entries in each division. (See story this page). Age limit for entries will be 12 years and under, and each entry must have a Christmas theme to be considered in the judging.

For this year's parade, no plans were made for entry of business or organizational floats. Committees planning the parade figured that everyone would be too busy to spend the necessary time to construct and enter floats. Too, this type of parade seems to be a thing of the past, at least locally. So the committees decided to make it an affair just for the kids. This doesn't mean, however, that organizations and businesses cannot have floats in the parade, if they choose. There just will not be any cash prizes to serve as an inducement.

So if you have a child 12 years of age or younger, give him a chance to take part in something which has been designed especially for him. Encourage him to dress up, decorate his wagon or bicycle or tricycle, and join a group or enter as a single. He stands a chance of winning a cash prize—it will make the season more "Christmasy" for him—and the experience will be something he can remember. The commercial part of Christmas may belong to the older people, but the fantasy part belongs to the young children, and they should be allowed to enjoy a bit of it. Too soon they'll cross over the magic line which separates the fantasy from the real . . . help them enter the parade and help it.

It's that time of year again when the thundering herds stampede into the discount centers and department stores of the larger cities. When tempers become frayed and we become exasperated at the thoughtless bellowing, pushing, rushing, shoving, stamping, swearing of all those nincompoops who waited until the last weeks to do their Christmas shopping—those OTHER shoppers who should KNOW that we are in a hurry.

Then we lug all those items we've managed to grab during our lunging through the crowds to the long line to the checkout counter, where we stand for what seems like hours waiting on someone ahead to make up his mind to move along. That's when the suspicion hits us that that battery-operated gadget we've just bought will not work on Christmas morning anyway; that that electric appliance we're dragging will prove to be faulty; that that "bargain" garment we have over our arms will turn out to have a button missing or a seam unsewn. Then we just know we'll have to make another trip to go through all this again to get things right.

Then we hit the street. Those OTHER drivers and pedestrians are enough to drive us out of our minds! No thought for the other fellow, no siree! Just barge ahead! And then that traffic on the highway leaving the bigger city! It's slow when we are in a hurry to return home, and fast when we have a car full of kids and we'd rather take it easy.

Yessir, it's real tough, shopping these days! To have to fight inconsiderate crowds, drive against inconsiderate drivers, and hand our hoarded Christmas shopping dollars to complete strangers! Then return home looking and feeling as if we had just gone through the Second Battle of Bunker Hill!

It's a yearly ordeal, isn't it? And we sometimes wonder if the Christmas season is worth the wear and tear it causes!

It's ALMOST enough to make us resolve to do our Christmas shopping at home next year, isn't it? To shop in leisure in the stores operated by our friends and neighbors. To know that the person we happen to bump into is our neighbor from across the street, or a fellow member of our club. To know that if the piece of merchandise we buy does not fit or is not what we expected we can always return it, and get a smile instead of a frown. To know

Basketball Tournament Underway At Local Gym

Boys' and girls' basketball teams of Winters High School are hosts to a basketball tournament which began in the Winters gym Thursday. Two games are scheduled for each afternoon, and two for each evening in the tournament which will continue through Saturday.

Sgt. Monty England Injured In Accident In South Vietnam

Word was received Monday that Sergeant Monty England, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cloy Allen of Wintgate, was injured in an accident recently in South Vietnam.

Mrs. Allen said she received word Monday that Sergeant England had been transferred to a military hospital in Japan, suffering from compound fractures of the lower left leg. Plans were to fly him to the hospital at Fort Sam Houston, San Antonio, as soon as his condition permitted the transfer.

Sergeant England, who was a motor sergeant at a base in South Vietnam, had seen quite a bit of action against the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese recently, and was wounded about November 23 or 24.

Sergeant England, a 1962 graduate of Winters High School, entered the U. S. Army shortly after graduation. He spent three years in Germany, returning in May of 1968. He received order for Vietnam in October, 1968, and went to Vietnam in January.

Sergeant England was married while serving in Germany. His wife recently returned to Germany for a visit with relatives.

Council Asks Gas Company For Later Information In Rate Increase Study

Winters' city council Monday night asked Lone Star Gas Company for additional and more up-to-date information on expenses and revenues before further consideration of a company request for an increase in consumer rates in Winters.

Using figures which were said to be averages in revenues, expenses and net profits for the company spread over a 30-year period, the company had requested permission to increase rates about 9.2 percent locally. This would give them a 7.25 percent net on local operation, it was stated.

Figures on operational costs and revenue for 1968 were presented to the council by Marshall Wharton, Winters manager for Lone Star Gas. These figures indicated, according to the council, that the company realized a 6.92 percent net for that year, with about 1230 customers in Winters.

company prepare and present operation figures for 1969, which would give a more realistic picture of the present local situation. Basing requests for an increase on operations over a long spread of years would not be consistent with present requirements, councilmen pointed out.

Mayor Wade White said Monday night that a special meeting would be called within the next few days to again consider the rate increase request, upon presentation by the company of additional and later information.

The gas company had stated in their request for permission to increase rates, that increases in operational expenses, cost of gas, and increased costs of distribution property and equipment called for a raise in local rates. They said the cost of gas in the field had increased 41 percent in ten years, from 1958 to 1968, and that costs of property and equipment had skyrocketed.

Protest Closing Driver License Office In Winters

Following announcement last week of the closing of the Winters driver license office, city officials, organizations and individuals immediately began to file protests with State representatives and officials of the Department of Public Safety.

The office, which had been a branch of the Ballinger office, had operated in the Winters City Hall on the first, third and fifth Thursdays of each month, issuing driver licenses and giving driver exams to residents of North Runnels County.

Announcement was made last week that the office would be discontinued effective December 1, and all applicants for licenses and renewals would have to go to Ballinger.

According to information from Winters City Hall, city officials contacted the district office of the Department of Public Safety in Midland, but were informed that the office would be closed.

Woodrow Watts, president of the Winters Chamber of Commerce, contacted State representatives to protest the closing of the Winters office. No word had been received this week regarding any action taken.

Those protesting the closing of the Winters driver license office have pointed out that near half of the driver licenses issued in Runnels County were to residents of the north part of the county. Closing of the office, they told State representatives, and officials, would be a great inconvenience and work hardships on North Runnels drivers.

Most of the people who would be applying for licenses or renewals, or taking driver tests, they said, would have to take off from their jobs or businesses to travel to and from Ballinger, in addition to having to wait in line for long periods of time in the Ballinger office.

It was also pointed out that the driver license division of the Department of Public Safety is a public service and as such should take every means possible to operate in the best interests of the public.

Cotton Harvest Slow In Entire Area, 2788 Here

Cotton harvest has been delayed by weather in the entire Abilene USDA Cotton Cladding Office area, with all sections reporting enough rain to delay picking for several days yet.

Harvest in the North Runnels area has followed the same pattern, with only 2788 bales received to noon Monday of this week. Ras Gideon, manager of Winters Warehouse Co., said Monday that limited picking was getting underway that afternoon with several bales expected to be received Monday night, and activities to pick up as the week got underway, barring more wet weather.

B. B. Manley, Jr., in charge of the USDA Cotton Cladding office in Abilene, reported that 26,500 samples from the area were classed for the week ending November 28, compared to 56,500 for the same period last season. Season's total for the office is 92,500 samples classed compared to 335,000 for a season's total last year ago.

More Than 400 Registered At Sub Tax Office

More than 400 voters already have applied for voter registration certificates through the Winters sub office of the county tax assessor-collector, Mrs. E. Ellen Meyer, deputy tax assessor-collector said this week.

Many others from this part of the county also have applied for registration through the county office in Ballinger.

January 31 is the deadline for registering as a voter during 1970.

Mrs. Meyer said those registering must fill out an application and either bring or mail it to the tax office in order to register. Applications may be completed at the tax office on North Main Street, or blanks may be obtained at several business places in Winters. Registration certificates will then be sent to the voters, she said.

Under the State Law, members of an immediate family may apply for certificates for other members of the family, as agents. However, agents are limited to husband, wife, father, mother, son or daughter. In laws cannot make the application, it was stated.

The applications for voter registration certificates have several spaces for vital information to be filled in by the applicant. Voters filling out the applications should pay special attention to each entry, the tax assessor-collector's office said, or the application will be returned for correction, thus causing delay in issuance of the registration certificate.

Blanks to be filled in by the applicant include voting precinct, county, name, address, date, age, sex, occupation, length of residence (in years) in the state, county and city, and birthplace (state or county), and citizenship status. Also, if applicant is under 21, and will reach majority during the voting year, date of birth must be shown. If applicant has resided in the state less than one year, he must show date of arrival and in county less than 6 months, show date of arrival.

For Winters residents, those residing east of Main Street, are in voting Precinct 6, and those west of Main Street are in Precinct 7.

As it Looks From Here

Burleson Heads Congressional Group Opposing Return Of Okinawa

Washington, D.C.—On November 18 several members of Congress addressed the following letter to the President of the United States:

"Dear Mr. President: Your current negotiations concerning Okinawa with Prime Minister Eisaku Sato of Japan are of great concern to many of our constituents.

"We are mindful of the tragic cost of Okinawa, including memory of over 12,500 Americans killed, 49,000 casualties, loss of over 750 aircraft and 35 ships.

"Notwithstanding the demonstrations by the radical 'students' in Japan, it is the opinion of the undersigned, in the interest of national security, the United States must retain control of Okinawa.

"The Soviets flatly rejected Japan's claim to four Kurile-chain islands seized by the Russians during World War II, and a similar posture by the United States as it relates to Okinawa is certainly reasonable.

"Accordingly, Mr. President, we urge you to indefinitely postpone further negotiations relative to Okinawa, and retain the control granted by virtue of Article 3 of the Treaty of Peace with Japan, effective April 28, 1952.

As is now known, the President did not adopt the views which we urged. An understanding reached by President Nixon and Prime Minister Sato will relinquish Okinawa to the control of Japan in 1972, including some jurisdiction over the Ryukyu Islands stretching between Japan and Okinawa. As a part of the agreement nuclear weapons are to be removed from Okinawa.

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Grandsons Of Former Residents Died In Pecos

Two brothers, Mark Titus McCasland, 22, and Bruce Kent McCasland, 17, both of Midland, died of asphyziation in Pecos Thursday night of last week.

They were sons of Mr. and Mrs. Barney McCasland of Midland, and grandsons of Mr. and Mrs. Barney McCasland Sr., of Lubbock, former residents of Winters. They were nephews of Mr. and Mrs. Billy McCasland of Bradshaw.

The brothers were found dead Friday morning in a small apartment at the rear of their aunt's and uncle's home in Pecos. They were found by their uncle, H. H. Schmidt, when he went to awake them.

A Peace Justice in Pecos pronounced them dead at the scene, and said they died of asphyziation caused by an unvented gas heater in a closed room.

Mark McCasland was born in Jackson, Miss., Jan. 19, 1947. He attended Texas AM University, and was a student instructor there.

Bruce McCasland was also born in Jackson, Miss., Sept. 21, 1953. He was a junior student at Midland High School.

Survivors include their parents, Mr. and Mrs. Barney McCasland of Midland; four brothers, Barney McCasland III of Durango, Colo., Pike McCasland of Australia, Schott McCasland of Valesta, Ore., and Ross McCasland of Midland; their maternal grandmother, Mrs. I. R. Titus of Pecos, and their paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Barney McCasland Sr. of Lubbock, former residents of Winters.





AUSTIN—A 1968 constitutional amendment did not affect the amount of fees that should be paid county tax assessor-collectors for assessing and collecting county taxes, but it limits the amount that may be paid by the state. So ruled Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin recently. (State cannot be required to pay more than two per cent of state taxes assessed which are actually collected.)

In other recent opinions, Martin concluded that: State Department of Public Welfare is authorized to spend money to refurbish the interior of a building which is leased by a county on a long-term basis and furnished the welfare agency rent-free.

An otherwise recordable affidavit of heirship may be recorded in the office of a county clerk even though the unprobated will is attached. However, the unprobated will not constituting the exhibit to an affidavit may not be recorded with the clerk although it contains acknowledgement.

Texas Board of Corrections is not obligated to collect, nor must public utilities pay, for placing lines along public roadways transgressing state-owned lands under prison system control. (TBC has no authority to reserve exclusive right to grant utility easements over such public roadways.)

Harris County Hospital District may legally enter into a lease contract for an X-Ray equipment system for a period of five years, contingent on availability for appropriate funds.

DDT BAN URGED

Travis Audubon Society of Austin called on Governor Smith to use "all resources" to ban the use of insecticide DDT in Texas.

Resolution claimed that DDT is harmful to wildlife, remains toxic in environment for 10 years, is spread by wind and water, and has been "implicated" as a possible cancer

Texas' State Antiquities Committee has decided to spend \$2,000 of its \$25,000 budget to help preserve the artifacts found in the wreck of a Spanish galleon off Padre Island.

Dr. Fred Wendorf, Southern Methodist University archaeologist who was elected chairman of the committee, proposed the expenditure for chemicals and photographic supplies for emergency work to prevent rusting of iron cannons and other iron artifacts.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler, who is a member of the Committee, made it clear that it is now absolutely illegal for anyone to explore for offshore artifacts without a permit from the new committee.

DEMONSTRATORS

Texas' Board of Regents of State Senior Colleges endorsed the suspension of 10 Southwest Texas State University students by the school's president for participating in an unauthorized demonstration. Students were suspended by Dr. Billy M. Jones after they failed to break up a moratorium demonstrations on university property. Farmers Get Tax Forms Early This Year

About three million 1969 Federal income tax forms for America's farmers and fishermen were sent to them around December 1, a month earlier than usual, the Internal Revenue Service announced this week. All other taxpayers will receive their packages about January 1.

A first for Internal Revenue, the early mailing is an attempt to assist the farmers and fishermen in taking advantage of options open to them in filing returns and paying their tax, IRS officials said.

Estimated Tax forms, in a separate package, will reach farmers and fishermen about the same date. In previous years the estimated tax forms were included in the income tax packages.

Farmers and fishermen have a choice of filing dates: they may elect to file and pay in full an estimated tax declaration by January 15, 1970, and file an income tax return by the April 15 deadline; or they may elect to file only an income tax return by February 16 and pay the tax due with the return.

Like the other 77 million taxpayers expected to file tax returns for 1969, farmers and fishermen will be using the new income tax form 1040.

The form, which replaces both the old form 1040 and 1040A is a one-page, basic form to which separate schedules can be added to cover any tax situation.


