

The colorful part of the poinsettia is its modified leaves. The

High-quality plants, Janne says, have large colorful bracts and flowers just starting to open. Poinsettias with open flowers and shedding plooen indicate maturity and may not

last through the holiday season. Being subject to cold damage, poinsettias should be placed away from drafts and opening doors to prevent sudden temperature changes. Drafts from circulating air furnaces are especially harmful to these Christmas plants due to rapid drying effects, the horticulturist says.



### Suspension Fencing May Be Answer

sion fence may be the answer to reducing cattle fencing costs Savings of 40 to 60 percent over conventional fences can be expected, said W. S. Allen, Extension agricultural engineer, Texas A & M University.

With a suspension fence, the number of line posts required is reduced approximately 80 percent as compared to conventional fencing, Allen explained, thus reducing the cost. This special fencing is generally satisfactory for cattle, however, there are certain limitations on its use.

The general practice is to use four to six strands of barbed wire. It is similar to conventional barbed wire fencing, except the line posts are placed up to er society, stronger still. It million yearly home accidents 100 feet apart. Wire stays, spaced approximately 16 feet apart, are used to hold the strands at proper spacing, said the engin-

> Because of the wire's resilence, animals are not likely to run through it or break a strand and because of its whipping action, bulls are discouraged from fighting through it.

The nature of the fence requires strong brace assemblies at convenient stretch points. Preventive medicine is familiar to almost everyone these days. People know they do not have to be sick to see a doctor. For many people-but not all, unfortunately-medical checkups are part of an annual rout-

Tuberculin tests should be part of the annual checkup. If the results of the tests are positive-that is, they indicate the presence of TB germs-other trains and other heat producing follow-up tests are necessary sources, the specialist adds. to confirm the findings. Anyone can pick up a tuberculous infection at any time. Just by breathing in the germs. But daily doses of isoniazid, taken for months, can handle the infection.

### Christmas Tree Lites Can Be Source Of Great Danger

Indoor lighting, when properly used, can enhance the entire home during the Christ-mas season. But, if electricity safety rules are ignored, it can cause serious accidents, loss of life and property.

For a good start, Mrs. Jane Berry, Extension home furnishings and housing specialist with Texas A&M University, suggests to check old strings of lights carefully for chipped sockets, cracked connections and frayed wires. Throw out badly damaged ones. Tape the frayed wires carefully and separat-

If new lights are on the proved lights. They may cost bit more than non-approved lights, but the additional cost may mean saving your home

from fire. Mount sockets on Christmas trees so bulbs will not touch foliage, paper or cotton, Mrs. Berry suggests. Use only fire-

proof decorations. After the tree is trimmed, inspect it regularly to see if fol-

iage near the lights has started to turn brown. Change the position of the lights slightly to avoid burns. Bright twinkling lights attract

children, so warn them of the dangers of hot lights and extension cord connections. Never leave sockets empty or run cords under rugs. Always disconnect lights at the outlet when not in use or when the family

is asleep or away. A dry tree is a nuisance since it sheds, loses its color and aroma and poses a serious fire hazard. Be certain the tree receives plenty of water. When needles start falling, take the tree down.





# **Great Plains** Conservation Act Is Extended

The 10-year extension and broadening of the Great Plains Conservation Program in legislation recently enacted by Congress can mean a doubling of the needed soil and water conservation work on Texas farm USDA Soil Conservation Service said this week.

The law extending the program, which was launched in 1957 to give land owners in the Great Plains help in building greater stability in farming and ranching enterprises, was signed by President Nixon on Nov 18, 1969. The program had beer scheduled to end December 31 1971 but has now been extended

The legislation authorizes ar additional \$150 million in Federal funds for the cost-sharing of conservation measures.

In addition to cost-sharing regular soil and water conservation work, the broadened program will provide for the enhancement of fish, wildlife and recreational resources on farms and ranches where it will improve the economic condition of landowners. It will also provide assistance on agriculture-related pollution problems in keeping with the program's overall ob jectives.

It also authorizes the Secre tary of Agriculture to enter in to contracts on land not gener ally considered to be agricultur al but where erosion is so ser ious that conservation work is needed to protect farm or ranch holdings.





## New Tax Form For 1040A Card Users

Each of the 18 million taxpay ers in the United States who filed the now discontinued card 1040A form last year, have either received a post card or will receive a post card within the next few days explaining the changes to the consolidated Form 1040, the Internal Revenue has announced.

This year all taxpayers will receive a larger, complete tax package that includes the onepage basic 1040 and additional pages or schedules, which may or may not be used according

to the taxpayer's needs. Past 1040A users will find that except for a few lines ,the new 1040 asks for the same information as the old card form and that they will probably not need to fill out more than one sheet of paper to make out their returns ,the card says.

In the past, taxpayers who used the 1040A could not take advantage of certain tax credits or exclusions and could not itemize their deductions. A principal reason for making the change to the new form is to enable taxpayers to take full advantage of the tax benefits the law provides, the post card

Most taxpayers should receive their individual tax forms and instructions by mail the first week of January.





#### VOTERS

Nueces, Wichita and El Paso Counties presently have about the lowest voter registration counties.

A survey on December 4 of voter registration for 1970, compared with 1968, showed that Harris County already has reregistered 400,000 of its 590,000or 69 percent.

By contrast Nueces County had registered 10 percent, El Paso 25 percent and Wichita

about 5 percent. State law permits county tax assessor-collectors to mail out postcards which the previous year's registrants can sign and mail back to re-register.

Most major counties are following this permissive procedure. As a result, the big city counties of Harris, Dallas, Tarrant and Bexas have high percentages of their voters ready to vote in 1970. But counties where local officials do not choose to do so have re-registered only a few. Registration deadline is January 31.






