Over 6,500 Votes Cast In Eastland County Saturday

Paul Brashear was elected State Representative of the 76th District, J. B. Williams was the winner of the Eastland County Sheriff's race and Governor Shivers carried the county a

More than 6,500 Eastland County voters went to the polls. Paul Brashear was the winner in the runoff with incumbent Omar Burkett for the 76th Legislative Post. Brashear carried all three counties with a total of 6,463 votes to 3,885 for Burkett. The vote in each county was as follows:

COUNTY FARM BUREAU QUEEN TO ENTER DISTRICT CONTEST

Miss Irma Lilley of Gorman, who was recently named Queen of the Eastland County Farm Bureau, will represent the county at the District Seven elimination contest at Brownwood on Saturday night, Sept. 21, President A. Z. Myrick reported today.

The district contest will be at the Brownwood Hotel as the climax of a program. Miss Lilley was named county queen, with Franklin Myrick of Cisco as king, in the recent contest at Eastland.

Nominees from 13 districts, including the winner at Brownwood, will compete for the honor of being named state queen at the annual state farm bureau convention in Galveston on November 8, Mr. Myrick said. Many prizes will be awarded to the state winner.

All district queens will receive expenses-paid trips for themselves and their matron escorts to attend the state convention. The 12 district winners, not including the queen, will receive wrist watches from the state Farm organization. In addition, a Mineral Wells hotel has offered a week's stay for the girls and their matron escorts.

Prizes for the state queen will include \$500 for expense money to the 36th annual convention of the American Farm Bureau Federation in December in New York City. The queen will make the trip on a special train carrying the Texas delegation to the convention.

In the event the Eastland County Queen is unable to attend the Brownwood meeting, Miss Mary Evelyn Laminacy, runner-up, will take Miss Lilley's place.

San Angelo Men Pay Huge Hunting Fines

AUSTIN, Aug. 25. — Out-of-season deer hunters have paid some heavy fines according to the latest arrest report announced by E. M. Sprott, director of Law Enforcement for the Game and Fish Commission.

Three San Angelo men prosecuted for taking two deer, one a doe, paid \$600 in fines plus costs. Several \$100 fines plus costs were meted out in similar cases elsewhere.

Illegal fishing cost several men substantial fines, including levies of as much as \$100 fines plus costs.

Turkey Crop For Texas Is Smaller Than Last Year

Austin, Aug. 31. — Texas turkey growers are raising 3,271,000 turkeys this year — 4% or 136,000 below last year, according to a preliminary estimate of the Crop Reporting Board of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Heavy breeds estimated at 2,682,000 decreased in number by 11% or 316,000 birds while light breeds, estimated at 589,000, increased 180,000 birds or 44%.

Farmers of the nation are raising 61,045,000 turkeys this year—9% above last year. Large varieties increased in number by 6% and small varieties by 16%. The previous record crop was 60,686,000 in 1952. However, light breeds were 30% of the total this year, compared with 24% reported for 1952.

Last January, farmers expressed their intentions to produce 7% more turkeys than in 1953. This followed a good turkey year where the relationship between the price of turkeys and the cost of feed was favorable. Turkey prices during the August-December 1953 marketing season were about the same as a year earlier; however feed prices were down during the year about 8%. This year's crop is about the same as intended for heavy breeds but is up sharply on light breeds from the 9% increase planned by farmers in January.

Breeder hen holidays of the heavy breeds on January 1, 1954, were 7% smaller than a year earlier, while holdings of light breed hens were 40% larger. However, there was an ample supply of hatching eggs for both heavy and light varieties during the season.

For the United States as a whole, the trend toward earlier marketings continues. Growers marketed 9.9% of this year's crop before August 1, compared with 9% reported last year. If growers carry out their intentions, they will market 6.8% of the crop in August, 11.1% in September and 17.3% in October. Growers expect to market 45.1% of their turkeys before November 1 this year, compared with 44.8% last year. Expected marketings in November at 30.2 percent are the same as a year ago. December marketings are expected to account for 19.6% of the crop, compared with 20.2 percent intended in 1953. January or later marketings will be 5.1 percent of the crop, compared with 4.8 percent last year.

Connelllee Hotel Sale Completed

Dr. Claude L. Reeves of Oklahoma City, owner of the Victor Hotel in Cisco and a number of Oklahoma hotels, has purchased the Connellee Hotel in Eastland and will take over that property on September 1, The Press learned Saturday.

Dr. Reeves is buying the Connellee Hotel from Don Hill of Eastland for an undisclosed sum. He has owned the Victor Hotel here for several years.

The Connellee is Eastland's largest hotel. It contains some 80 rooms and several ground floor business locations, including a coffee shop.

Curried Rice and Tuna Make a Tasty and Thrifty Filling for Luscious Tomatoes

Rice brings together the deep sea goodness of tuna fish and the Oriental excitement of curry in this versatile main dish. The curry powder contributes exotic flavor and intriguing color enhanced by the bits of green pepper and the brilliant red of the tomatoes.

Served piping hot from the oven or cold and refreshing on a bed of greens, this "something special" for the family is also something quick and easy for Mom to fix.

INGREDIENTS:
8 medium sized ripe tomatoes
4 tablespoons minced onion
2 tablespoons minced green pepper
4 tablespoons butter or margarine
1 7-ounce can tuna fish
2 cups cooked rice
1 teaspoon curry powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/8 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup water

PREPARING THE FLUFFY WHITE RICE: To make 3 liberal cups of fluffy rice, put 1 cup of uncooked rice, 2 cups of cold water and 1 teaspoon of salt into a 2 quart saucepan and bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover saucepan with a lid and leave over this

low heat for 14 minutes. Do not remove lid nor stir rice while it is cooking. Turn off the heat.

Use exact measurements of uncooked rice and water. Time the cooking accurately.

For real convenience and economy of time and effort, keep unused rice in the refrigerator in a covered container at all times. Use it for many quick, delicious and inexpensive soups, salads, casserole dishes, hot breads and desserts.

METHOD: Peel tomatoes easily by scalding, plunging into cold water and then peeling. Slice off stem end of tomatoes. Carefully scoop out pulp. Cook onion and green pepper in the butter or margarine until tender. Add the tuna fish, rice, curry powder, salt, pepper and water. Mix thoroughly. Fill the tomatoes with the tuna and rice mixture and bake at 350° F. about 15 minutes or until the tomatoes are tender. Serve hot. Garnish with green pepper rings if desired.

For a cool and refreshing salad, chill the tomatoes after they are stuffed and serve on salad greens. This recipe makes 8 servings or 3 cups of the curried tuna and rice mixture.

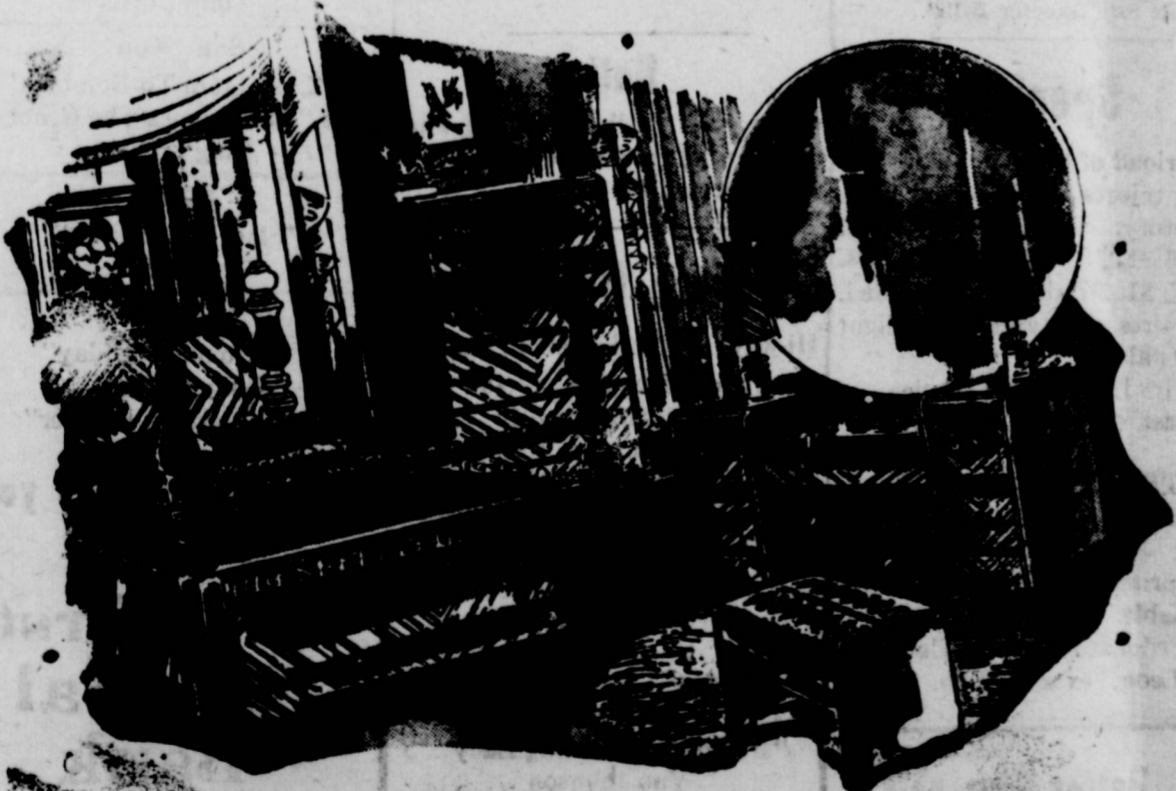

Mountain Lions Raid Black Gap, Doe Deer Killed

AUSTIN, Aug. 31.—The Assistant Director of Wildlife Restoration for the Game and Fish Commission reported that mountain lions are cutting down some of the big game transplanted in the Black Gap Game Management Area in the Dead Horse Mountain country.

Returning from an inspection trip West of the Pecos, he said the big cats have been moving into the Brewster County refuge from nearby Mexico and the Big Bend National Park.

"There seems to be two main reasons for the invasion," the Assistant Director explained. "One is that the deer population in the nearby park seems to be thinning out. The other is that we have been stocking the Black Gap area and have been impounding water which is attractive to both our transplanted deer and antelope and certainly to the lions."

He said "it is the old story of having to take the bad with the good" and then added: "Wherever you have wildlife you have predators. We expected the raiders sooner or later, but frankly they seem to have shown up in surprisingly large numbers."

The Director quoted the Resident Manager of the Area—Fred Moore—as reporting that deer were the main targets of the lions. "The deer prefer the foothills and that is where the cats prowl around most," Moore observed. "The antelope prefer the open plains and are more or less out of range."

Moore has been trapping in an effort to curb the invaders. His last catch was a big female which had been denned up with two kittens. Moore said he believed the young ones either perished or left the area. This lion had killed at least three doe deer, two of them bearing fawn.

The Resident Manager said the grim counter attack routine recently was spiced by his black cocker spaniel, named "Skeeter Bill," which began acting like a lion dog.

That is the dog did until he foolishly leaped off an overhanging rock upon the head of the big cat that had one leg in a trap. Only thing that saved the pooch was that the lion, in swinging furiously at the pup, shook it loose from the ear to which it was clinging. Had the lion's paw struck home that would have been all for "Skeeter Bill."
