

"A pasture rotation system benefits both the livestock and the range land, Extension Range Specialist Dan Rodgers said. "It is especially helpful to range grasses during the critical periods of low food reserves during early growth and at seed set."

The pasture rotation system, commonly known as the Merrill System, was developed in the late 1940's at the Agricultural Experiment Station at Sonora. experiments during the drought of the fifties, there was an actual increase in the stocking rate of one-third, Rodgers said. During this same time, while others were losing animals from bitterweed poisoning, there were no losses on the ro tation pastures, he continued.

"The system consists of four pastures and three herds of livestock, with one pasture always being rested for a four month period," Rodgers explained. "At the end of a four month period, one herd is always moved to the rested pasture.
