HOME TOWN Talk

Most of the time the reports, because they apparently have become so common and accepted as a part of the everyday pattern—a part of the fabric of what so many tend to call "progress"—are shunted to inside pages of the newspapers. Except, of course, if those involved be well-known persons or if the happening is such that it becomes "unusual."

The reports are so scattered and so matter-of-fact that we don't really know the "score" and do not become concerned—nor unduly alarmed—unless and until we see the final annual tally . . . and even then they don't seem to dent our armour, because we turn around and increase the count for the next year.

We get all "up tight" when we read the casualty figures from Vietnam—and we should be concerned; and we are shocked, naturally, when nature cuts a swath of death across the countryside. But let several thousand "people"—enough to make up a city the size of Winters—be killed within a year's time, and we only shake our heads a time or two and go our merry way, and do it all over again the next year.

We're talking about traffic deaths. The Texas Department of Public Safety periodically issues a little booklet, "Motor Vehicle Traffic Accidents," in which a complete breakdown of the numbers, causes, fatalities, etc., of the traffic accidents within the State of Texas.

The report was released this week, covering traffic highlights of 1969 (for Texas alone):

—A record high of 3,481 persons killed in motor traffic accidents was reached in 1969. Now, a new record of 3,551 is recorded for 1969. This is an increase of 70 or 2 percent.

—During 1969 there were four days with only one death; however, there were 22 days with 20 or more deaths.

—There were 61 deaths in 47 accidents that occurred on July 25, 26 and 27. The only deathless day was August 9, while on May 17 there were 27 killed in 15 accidents.

—There were nine accidents during 1969 in which six or more were killed for a total of 56 deaths.

In the 384,952 accidents reported for 1969 there were 658,071 drivers involved, an average of 1.7 of every 10 licensed drivers.

—During 1969 there were only 18 counties that had no motor vehicle traffic accident deaths.

—Violations contributing to fatal accidents (percentages): Too fast for conditions, 35; driving while drinking, 34; wrong side of road, 10; did not have right-of-way, 12; improper passing, 3; disregarding signs, 6; improper parking, 1; following too closely, 0.4.

It is interesting to note that of the NON-FATAL accidents, the three leading contributing violations, by percentage, were: Too fast for conditions, 22; did not have right-of-way, 22; and driving while drinking, 12. This should tell us something.

Perhaps is this small booklet prepared by the DPS could be distributed to each driver, along with his license plates or driver's license, each year, and the word would get around, and we would start doing something about it.

Sometime between midnight Saturday and dawn Sunday, they—whoever "they" are—will swipe an hour out of early Sunday and stick it on the end of the day. Result: Daylight Saving Time!

A coffee drinker has suggested "they" pick out the coolest hour of the morning and sandwich it in between two hours of mid-afternoon, so that when hot weather does come along later there will be at least one bearable hour.

Anyway, in spite of some controversy, pro and otherwise, when we get up to go to work next Monday morning we'll find that the sun has waited an hour for us, and after work in the afternoon we'll have an extra hour in which to piddle around. Chet and David will be on in the middle of the afternoon, and Matt Dillon will run the risk of getting sunburn.

New Aldermen Took Office Last Monday Night

Three new aldermen, elected April 4, were sworn into office Monday night, and the City Council reorganized.

Mayor Wade White administered the oath of office to Bill Robinson, James Spill and Hal Dry, at a public ceremony on the second floor of the City Hall.

The three new aldermen succeed Homer Hodge, W. L. (Bill) Bean, and W. F. (Bill) Byrns. The mayor presented service plaques to the three retiring aldermen. Hodge has served six years on the council, Bean, four years, and Byrns, two years.

Following installation ceremonies, the new council met in regular session and reorganized. Nelan Bahlman was elected mayor pro tempore, and each councilman was appointed by Mayor White to head specific departments within the city.

Bahlman retains the Water & Sewer Department; E. E. Vaughan remains in charge of the Electric Department; James Spill will be in charge of the Sanitary Department and Cemeteries; Hal Dry will be in charge of the Streets and Airport Department; and Robinson will have charge of the Parks and Pool Department.

The mayor will have charge of the Police Department and Administrative Department.

"We have become, predominantly, a nation of city-dwellers. Among the new and city-oriented generations, there is a danger that the land in-between cities will be regarded merely as undeveloped space."

Toward this end, two tours, especially for the ministers in the Runnels Soil and Water Conservation District, are being planned for next week. A tour of the south part of the county will leave from the Ballinger SCS office at 9 a.m. Monday, April 27, and will conclude before noon.

On the following day, April 28, a tour of the north part of the county will leave from the Winters City Park at 9 a.m., and will conclude before noon. Land use planning prior to carrying out of conservation work will be emphasized on the tours, Kahlden said.

Kahlden said that "throughout the nation the treasures of soil and water entrusted to our care by the Lord are being disposed of, and commitments are being made for their use, with little thought for future generations and all those who, in their turn, will need to use these resources."

Souffle Success:

A souffle should be served with pride. As you might expect, preparing such a delicate dish requires some careful handling. To insure souffle success every time, there are a few basic points you should keep in mind—and then the souffle will "rise to the occasion" for company-perfect eating.

Eggs should be at room temperature when beaten. To bring eggs to room temperature, remove the shell eggs from the refrigerator, separate the whites from the yolks and allow the whites to remain at room temperature for about an hour.

To keep the yolks fresh, place in clean jar that has a tight-

fitting cover. Add water to cover yolks and cover tightly before placing in the refrigerator.

There are many schools of thought on how to beat the egg whites, says the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture. It is true the electric mixers make the puffed souffles. However, one must take care and stop the beating at just the right moment.

Whites should be at the just-stiff point—soft, moist peaks that stand, then bend slightly when the beater is removed. Just one turn too many can make the egg whites too dry to puff the souffle up to its highest.

Before beating the egg whites, be sure to check for any traces of yolk. Even the tiniest portion of yolk will inhibit the beating of the whites. Be sure the bowl and beaters are very clean and very dry.

when the recipe calls for a cooked sauce is to prepare the sauce. Then, while the sauce cools, whip the egg whites.

When the recipe calls for a hot mixture to be stirred into the egg yolks, stir the sauce in slowly so the heated sauce will cook the yolks just enough to give a firm base. If the sauce is folded into the yolks too rapidly, a thin, runny base will be created which might well be the ruin of the souffle.

The critical point in creating a souffle is when the egg whites are folded in with the other mixture. The trick is to barely blend; overmixing can reduce the volume of the egg whites, allowing some of the air to escape—causing the baked souffle to turn out a limp, sorry, deflated mass.

Grease the bottom of the souffle dish if you wish—but not the sides. Leave the sides clean so the souffle can soar to a lofty height.

Be sure to use the size container called for in the recipe. A souffle baking dish should have a flat bottom and flat sides. A rounded container will yield a round-top souffle.

This Apricot Eggnog Souffle makes a tempting dessert on an entree accompaniment:

1 cup dried apricots,
½ cup water
½ stick butter
½ cup sifted flour
¼ tsp. salt
½ cups plain eggnog
For the Sauce: 1 T cornstarch
½ cups eggnog
4 egg yolks
½ cup sugar
½ tsp. rum extract
¼ tsp. nutmeg
4 egg whites
¾ cup flake coconut
And ¼ tsp. rum extract

For the souffle, cook apricots in water until tender, about 20 minutes. Drain, dice and spread over bottom of two-quart souffle baking dish. In saucepan, melt butter, blend in flour and salt. Gradually add eggnog, stirring until smooth and thickened. Remove from heat.

In separate bowl, beat together egg yolks and sugar until light and creamy. Into this same bowl gradually add ½ of the eggnog mixture in saucepan. Stir and cook over low heat for about one minute. Remove from heat and cool slightly before adding rum extract and nutmeg. While cooked mixture is cooling, beat egg whites until stiff, but not dry. Fold whites into custard. Fold in coconut and pour mixture into casserole.

Bake in a 375 degree oven for 60 to 70 minutes.

To prepare the sauce, place cornstarch in saucepan and gradually stir in eggnog. Cook, stirring constantly, until smooth and slightly thickened. Remove from heat and cool slightly. Add rum extract. Serve warm over fresh-from-the-oven souffle.
