### Castor Bean Shortage To Be Relieved

Washington, D.C. -- Senator Lloyd Bentsen has introduced legislation designed to relieve the current world shortage of castor beans by giving more flexibility to the farm program.

"I am pleased that the Senate Agriculture Committee has informally agreed to incorporate both this measure and my proposal for an annual study of various farm production costs in the 1973 Farm Act," Bentsen said.

The Senator pointed out that the U.S. imports more than 100 million pounds of castor oil a year to meet present needs. The oil is used in the production of jet fuel, among other things.

"Plainview, Texas, is the only place in the country where castor beans are now planted and the 12,000 acres in production in that area will provide some 10 million pounds of castor oil in 1973 according to USDA."

## May 1973 Was A Dry, Windy Month

The month of May 1973 will go down on record books as the driest month so far this year. Only .93 inches of moisture was recorded in Muleshoe during the month of May.

The dry month also high winds sand, high temperatures and even a frost.

In May of 1972 3.16 inches of rainfall was recorded during the month.

This brought the total for that year to 3.44 inches by the first of June.

Of course this year Muleshoe has had just about double the moisture that was received the previous year. To date Muleshoe has recorded 7.26 inches

of moisture from January 1 to May 31.

In 1972, Muleshoe had recorded only .28 inches of moisture up to May and the May total of 3.16 inches brought the five month total to 3.44 inches.

Although moisture was prevalent during the early spring months and the underground moisture in this area was considered the best in many years, farmers are now having to irrigate, especially the fields of corn which are up and growing. Some fields in the area are sporting plants over a foot high at this time.

**Cotton is a little late this**

year, with most of the fields just coming up.

Vegetables in the area were damaged some by the dry, hot and windy month of May, but are now up and growing and predicting a bountiful harvest for the late summer and fall.

Showers Friday afternoon, June 1, refreshed the crops in the area and brought some relief from the dry windy days that preceded them.

The outlook for Bailey County agriculture this year is still bright and experts are still predicting a bountiful harvest for this area, barring complications.

## Good Driving Tips Help Conserve Fuel

With summer trips soon to begin motorists can conserve fuel and save money by heeding a few good driving tips, reports the Consumer Services of the Texas Department of Agriculture. "Fuel shortages in certain areas of Texas have already been reported by agricultural users. With thousands of vacationers soon to be on the highways the situation could become critical," Agriculture Commissioner John C. White stated.

Commissioner White has already informed the federal Office of Oil and Gas that fuel shortages are affecting the farming industry in Texas and urged immediate compliance to federal guidelines that would assure adequate fuel supplies for Texas agriculture this year.

"All of us need to do everything we can to make certain that the vital food industry has the energy it needs," Commissioner White stated.

The Consumer Services Division gave the following advice

to drivers:

Unnecessary idling, excessive low or high speeds, and quick starts and stops wastes gasoline. Coasting to a stop when possible and starting at normal or below normal speeds are other fuel savers. Braking a car to a stop from 30 miles an hour wastes two and a half times as much energy as when braking to a stop from 20 mph. From 60 mph the loss is nine times greater.

A steady speed of 50 mph is 25 percent more economical than varying speeds from 30 to 70 mph. The most economical cruising speed is 55 mph. Dragging brakes, underinflated tires, an out-of-tune engine, and a too heavy motor oil also contribute to wasted fuel.

According to the Division, savings will depend on the type of car, but a properly driven automobile can increase its gas mileage up to five miles a gallon. Maintaining an average speed on the highway will save between 1 1/2-2 miles a gallon.

the Senator added.  
The bill proposed by Senator Bentsen would permit the Secretary of Agriculture to consider acreage devoted to castor beans as though it were devoted to cotton for purposes of the farm program.  
"The 1970 Farm Act," Bentsen explained, "requires cotton farmers to plant their allotment of acreage in cotton, even though this is costly to the farmers in years when excess supply drives prices down."  
"Under my proposal the farmers could plant castor beans on some of their acreage and receive credit for this toward their cotton allotment," he continued.  
"This would not only provide an incentive for increasing castor bean production, thereby decreasing our dependence on foreign sources for this important commodity, but would give our farm program a needed flexibility," Senator Bentsen concluded.

There will be a wider spread in 1973 between Commodity Credit Corporation loan values for the 3,724 different grade, color, staple and micronaire combinations of eligible U. S. upland cotton, according to officials of Plains Cotton Growers, Inc., of Lubbock.  
The 1973 schedule of premiums and discounts that will determine physical loan prices above and below the 20.65 cents per pound base price of Strict Low Middling 1-1/16 inch cotton, released May 17, generally shows higher premiums for the upper quality range and greater discounts on lower qualities. The base price is applicable to cotton in the desirable 3.5 to 4.9 micronaire category at average U. S. location. Location differentials for the various U.S. warehouses have not been announced, but Lubbock area loan levels are normally five points below the national average, which would give this area a base loan of 20.60 cents.  
The 1972-73 loan schedule was based on Middling 1-inch cotton at 19.5 cents per pound. The change to SLM 1-1/16 inch

base, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, was made because less than 1 percent of the U. S. crop falls in the Middling-inch category while over 13 percent is in the new base quality. The loan price for Middling - inch, obtained by subtracting the announced 115 point discount from the 20.65 cent base, remains at 19.5 cents per pound for 1973.  
The widening of loan price differences for 1973 reverses a three-year trend toward narrower differences. Premiums and discounts that make up the loan schedule are developed from spot market prices recorded over the nine - month period from August through April of the preceding marketing year, and prices for the upper level of qualities during this period of 1972-73, in relation to the lower qualities,

were considerably higher as a result of supply-demand factors.  
USDA also announced May 17 that 1973-crop cotton would not be subject to the 50-point or 12 cent per pound penalty long applied to cotton which is reduced in grade because of extraneous matter, including bark, or spindle twist. Elimination of this \$2.50 per bale discount on "barky" cotton had been requested by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. on the grounds that the penalty was not justified by a loss of such cotton's spinning and finishing performance.  
This matter sparked sharp controversy, with some in the industry saying removal of the 50-point penalty would increase the amount of barky cotton produced. It was further stated that the additional barky cotton would increase the incidence of byssinosis, or brown lung

disease, in textile workers.  
But PCG President Ray Joe Riley of Hart denies these allegations. He reasons that the price penalty that accompanies the lower grade assigned to barky cotton, which is much greater than 50 points, "is more than enough incentive for producers to grow and harvest the cleanest, highest quality cotton possible under a given set of conditions."  
"Moreover," Riley states, "there is absolutely no supportable evidence, nor to our knowledge any previous suspicion, of any connection between bark in cotton and byssinosis."

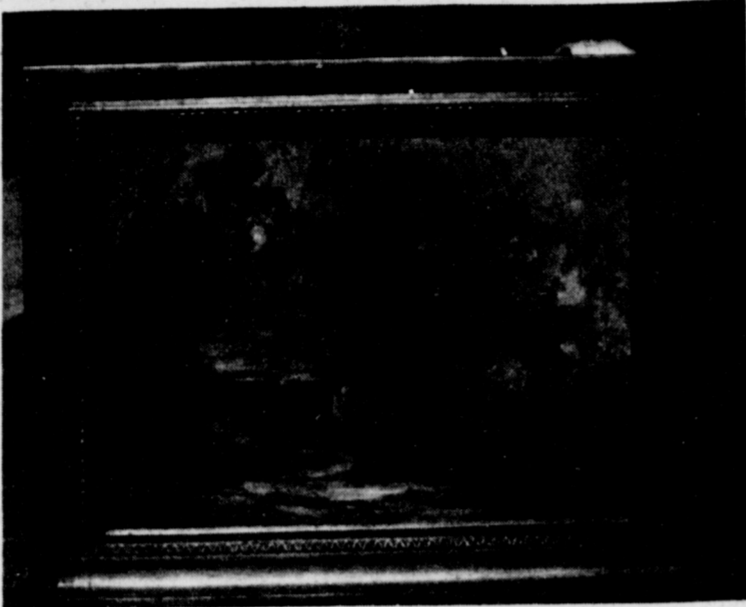
