Others will remember the piemelon as we do; there probably are wild patches of this pest around the area now. Resembling the watermelon on the outside, they were good for nothing except perhaps hog feed, but you had to chop them up with an axe, they were so hard. Green inside, they did handled right, though. Can't find "piemelon" in our Webster's, but they, too, are a member of the gourd family, and may be called something else in other localities.

Back to muskmelons - we planted what we thought were cantaloupes in our garden in the spring. The package of seeds was labeled cantaloupes, and the picture on the package was round, just like the cantaloupes we buy over the counter. But (Continued on page 8)

One of the biggest demands each year on the Texas Bureau of Vital Statistics is from parents wishing certified copies of their children's birth certificates to meet the school enrollment require-

With over 250,000 children entering the first grade each year. the demand for certification is great. Many times these records can be obtained in the counties or cities of birth or they may be obtained from the Austin office of the State Health Department for a \$1.50 fee. Searching for records-on request-can be a time consuming process. The quantity alone makes the task a tremendous one. The "searching" branch of the Vital Statistics division last year conducted 307,000 searches of the files upon request. A total of 200,000 certifications and verifications were made.

IRS Tries To Help Older Americans Understand Tax

The Internal Revenue Service has been criticized recently for failing to get the tax forms simple enough for some older Americans to understand.

IRS Commissioner Thrower, in a recent speech says that this is not so, and that Internal Revenue has made a special effort to help older Americans get the full benefit that Congress has provided for retired taxpayers. Commissioner Thrower pointed out that Internal Revenue has issued a special publication to help these taxpayers claim all of the available benefits. Publication 554, "Tax Benefits for Older Americans," is distributed to retired groups and is available at all IRS offices.

Thrower also pointed out that since a good part of our older Americans are subject to many Eastman color. 


