DALLAS, Aug. 7. - Education is good business; the more schooling citizens have the better cus-

In the light of such facts, established by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, the U.S. Labor Department's Wage-Hour Division here is urging all boys and girls who have not graduated to return to school this fall.

Furthermore, it hopes that every Texas community will conduct a back-to-school campaign of its own -- in its own self-interest.

Regional Director William J. Rogers said pay checks may look good to minors who have been vorking during their summer vacation, "but they should look ahead - and so should the community in which they live."

Research by the U. S. Chamber of Commerce in 145 American cities shows clearly that the average educaitonal level is directly related to total retail sales - the more schooling, the more sales.

Dallas, for instance, was ranked among the top 19 U. S. metropolitan areas of 250,000 population or more where th eaverage adult has completed between 11 and 12 years of school. These same areas also had the highest retail sales, averaging \$1100 per capita. Education, the official said, increases a person's earning power and imprvoes his standard of liv-

ing. The combination results in more retail sales for the community and more personal satisfaction for the individual.



# **Roof Protection From Heat Being** Studied By U of T

AUSTIN, Aug. 7. - Better roof protection against the Southwest's blazing heat is the goal of new research at the University of Texas.

Assistant Professor R. A. Bacon is testing abilities of roof construction to resist heat or let it pass through, His research is expected to help engineers and architects plan roofs which will keep homes cooler in summer and warmer in winter.

"The roof is a primary factor in keeping any structure cool," Bacon asserts. "A roof bears the brunt of the sun's rays and in the Southwest usually is equal in area to outside walls."

A roof which insulates well can provide much living comfort when combined with a properly-used attic fan. It also can cut power costs for operating airconditioning equipment, Bacon said.

Bacon has taken his research literally to the roof. He has built himself an eight-foot square laboratory atop the Engineering Building.

The laboratory roof is divided into four panels. One panel is two-inch-thick lightweight concrete; another, six-inch-thick lightweight concrete. A third panel is four-inch-thick sand-and gravel concrete and a fourth is three - fourths - inch - thick pine boarding.

The lightweight concrete contains many air bubbles which insulate against heat. How much is not known. Engineers and builders aren't sure how pine boarding and heavier concrete react to heat. Bacon said he hopes to make those facts available.
