

Girls attending Winters Pubic Schools may now wear slack sets, under provisions of an amendment to dress rules approved by the Board of Trustees of Winters Independent School · District in the regular board meeting Tuesday night.

Previous rules had prohibited wearing of slacks. Superintendent of School Carroll Tatom said under the rule amendment, slack sets are defined as "slack suits, slacks with tunic or overblouse or hip-length loose fitting sweaters." Previous rules had prohibited girls wearing slacks of any type to school, except during extreme weather.

In other business, the school board changed the time of regular meetings, from 8 p. m. to 7 p. m., on the second Tuesday of each month.





It can be served baked, boiled, creamed, spiced, fried or raw And of course, it's the prized vegetable for flavoring such items as potato dishes, casseroles, souffles, salads and meats. You'll probably find it best to

buy onions often, since home storage conditions frequently vary, and onions are best when kept in a cool, dry place. The size onions to purchase will vary with the use. Small ones are best for boiling whole, stewing or creaming. Medium onions are best for serving stuffed, and you'll like the larger ones for luscious, thick slices on top of delicious hamburgers and other sandwiches. All are good for grating, chopping, dicing or In selecting, look for hard or

firm onions which are dry and have small necks, says Mrs. O'Connor. They should be cover ed with papery outer scales and be reasonably free from green sunburn spots and other blemishes. Avoid onions with wet or very soft necks, which usually are immature or affected by decay. Also avoid onions with thick, hollow, woody centers in the neck or with fresh sprouts.




