an important key in bread selection. Choose soft bread for sandwiches and a compact, firm loaf for toast. Day-old bread makes an economical choice for stuffings, French toast and bread crumbs.

When storing bread, use a clean, dry, well-ventilated bread box. Keep the loaf tightly wrapped in its original wrapper, except bread with a crisp crust, which is stored unwrapped to preserve crispness. Storage life is short, she said.

If you want to keep bread at home for more than a few days, freeze it, she advises. Zero temperatures preserve flavor, freshness and original moisture if the bread is wrapped securely in moisture-vapor proof material.

Mrs. O'Connor says that bread may be stored in the refrigerator to retard mold growth, especially during hot wea ther, but refrigerator temperatures cause staling and a loaf kept refrigerated one day will stale as much as one left at room temperature for three days.

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



### **Department Hikes** Spending On Striped **Bass** Programs

miles west of Artesia Wells.

Austin - The day may be drawing nearer when a fisherman can catch a string of big striped bass out of a Texas lake. Parks and Wildlife Department biologists hope to set up enough rearing facilities to provide the thousands of fingerling bass needed for stocking experiments in several inland lakes. In addition to obtaining fry from Eastern Seaboard States, the department anticipates joining with Louisiana fisheries per sonnel in setting up a hatching operation in Maryland. This pro ject will utilize live adult stripers purchased from commercial fishermen to obtain eggs for hatching.

Also, some of the adu't bass will be flown to Texas and maintained on hatcheries in an effort o establish a source of brood fish

Striped bass are saltwater fish but it was discovered several years ago that they can survive in freshwater lakes in Texas and elsewhere. They have shown good growth potential in Texas waters - particularly in Spence Reservoir in West Texas and Navarro Mills Reservoir in Northeast Texas. Biologists say they have not selected the target lakes, but
