



### President Nixon vs. Archie Bunker? By RALPH NOVAK

NEW YORK (CEF) The news that President Nixon's trip to China will be televised live in the United States raises some interesting

The Democrats are grumbling that their presidential candidates are in for the biggest upstaging job of all time. Who, they say, will be interested in watching film clips of Hubert Humphrey in Peoria or Edmund Muskie in Pittsburgh when he can watch Mr. Nixon in Peking?

But there is the chance that there may be a backfire effect from this slickly devised maneuver of statesmanship and politics.

Imagine somebody unwittingly turning on his television set, twiddling the dial in the hope of finding Archie Bunker, Big Bird or perhaps an old Dracula movie, when he chances upon the President strolling along the Great

Mr. Nixon did make sure he scheduled the trip after the Super Bowl and Pro Bowl were both done with, so he wouldn't risk competing with them in the ratings.

He will, however, have to be careful to avoid preempting too many popular shows if he does not want to lose more votes than he gains. A little too much TV overexposure will have people talking to themselves: "Does he have to be on every channel?" "Is he going to shake hands with all 800 million of them?" "That Henry Kissinger is sure no Ed McMahon." "Let's hope he's off before it's time for 'My Little Margie.'" "I wonder if he knows how to say, 'I want to make one thing perfectly clear' in Chinese." clear' in Chinese.'

It has become a political axiom of sorts that it is a wise candidate who never gets between a voter and his U.S. time, so if Mr. Nixon wants to be on, say, around 4 p.m. here—thereby coming on after the soap operas but before the detective shows—he will have to visit the Great Wall at 5 in the morning. Even that, however, would be better than offending Marcus Welby's fans; you have to pay the price.

All the complications involved may in fact make Mr. Nixon wish he were back in the good old days, when Marco Polo could just jump on his camel and take off for China, without having to worry about how many reporters to take along with him.

But then again, Marco Polo wasn't running for president when he left for China 700 years ago.
