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

Muleshoe Schools Outline Lunch Policy

Muleshoe Schools has long recognized the need for helping meet the nutritional needs of its students. The following schools, Richland Hills Primary Mary DeShazo Elementary, Muleshoe Junior High and Muleshoe High School serve a wellbalanced nutritious lunch each school day. The charge to students who pay is 50 cents for Kindergarten, first and second grades, 55 cents for third, fourth and fifth grades and 65 cents for sixth through twelfth grades. However, since some families find it difficult to pay this full price, the school will provide these lunches free of charge or at a reduced price to those children determined by the Director of Special Programs to be unable to pay the full price for their

The USDA has Proposed New Food Stamp Regulations. Under a proposed regulation announced August 19, by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, an individual who wants to retain eligibility for food stamp programbenefits would have to accept a job which requires joining a bonafide labor organization recognized by the National Labor Relations Act. The regula-

tion would not require the recipient to join a company union. In order to participate in the food stamp program all recipients, with certain exceptions, must register for and accept em ployment. Current regulations, however, permit a recipient to

County Agent, Farmers Report

County Agent, Spencer Tanksley reported to the Journal Friday on the general effect of the

last weeks rains in the area. Tanksley said, "This rain has definitely been beneficial to cotton from the standpoint of moisture, and also to late planted sorghum. It has taken the pressure off of the irrigated land watering situation."

He further stated that "Grass land is greening up considerably and the rain might enable the cattle men to hold over cattle

The County Agent reported that "this rain will definitely be a boom to the planting of wheat land and other small grain crops. Bug ingestation has been slowed down,'

"The rain, however," stated Tanksley," has temporarily stopped silage harvest and done some damage to cut hay, which was laying in the field. The mike of cotton will be affected some because of the wetness and hot weather will be needed to progress the harvest season,'

Tanksley reported approximately three-quarters to one and one-half inch has been received county-wide over the last three days, August 20, 21

and 22. In other rain reports received by the Journal, the Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge reported approximately one inch for the three period. The refuge is located 19 miles south of Muleshoe. To date for August they have recorded tow and thirty six one hundreths inches of

har-Swiss"-UpcomingNewBreed

Judge Glen Williams and his son-in-law, Benny Splawn, have recently gone into the business of raising Char-Swiss cattle. They have purchased foundation stock for their herd. Thus, two more enterprises have been added to the history and economy of the Muleshoe area.

" Char-Swiss" is a relatively new breed, which was developed by C. W. Adams of the Water Valley Ranch near San Amgelo, These cattle are produced by crossing selected pure-bred brown swiss and then crossing again to produce a three quarter to one-quarter blood mixture; in other words, three quaters charolais and one quarter brown swiss. This mixture can also be achieved by crossing a pure bred charoais-half brown swiss bull. With selected and appraised stock on each side, the off-spring, being three quarters charolais and one quarter brown swiss, can be registered in the Char-Swiss Association.

In September, 1974, however, the Association will be closed so that no other breeding up and registering from the outside can be done. From that date on, all registered charswiss cattle will come from the original herds and their decendants. Moreover the name is patened so that no one except member of the Char-Swiss Association can use it. It is therefore believed that there will be many opportunities for charter members of the associ-

In describing the breed, Judge Williams said that "Char-Swiss cattle are uniform in color, ranging from white to golden white. They are gentle, large, fertile, fast-gainers and good milkers. A typical char-swiss calf at six months of age will weigh from six to seven hundred pounds; and, he will gain consistantly one hundred pounds

per month to maturity". "Taurus", the herd bull at Water Valley weights 3600 pounds at thirty six months of age and will easily reach 4,000 when mature. He is agile, active, travels and handles himself well. He was mated to "Twiggie' an outstanding cow and this mating produced the char-swiss bull calif in the

world. This young bull calf was named Enero and is now owned by Williams and Splawn. He now weighs 1740 pounds at eigh-

The Williams-Splawn partnership have purchased nineteen char-swiss heifers which are now being mated to Enero'. Twenty-two registered charolais cows, originally from the Capp Yates herd, have also been bought and are calving char-swiss calves now. They are being bred back to a halfblood bull from the Dean Wade Ranch in Missouri.


