



Stems of most species are protected by small clusters of spines. These may be white, yellow, red, brown or black. Contrary to some belief they are not poisonous.

The attractive cactus flowers have a ring of waxy petals around a cluster of stamens (male parts of flowers). They occur in many colors including white, shades of yellow, pink, red, blue and violet.

Now is a good time to start cactus in the home since the plants begin their active period of growth in the spring.

Cacti may be started from seeds or cuttings. Seeds may be sown in spring or early summer in any good well-drained potting soil placed in a small container covered with glass or film to retain humidity. Cuttings may also be taken at this time using a sharp knife to leave a smooth surface. They form roots quite readily from cut surfaces, prostrate stems and individual small side shoots. The roots absorb water rapidly during showers, but cannot tolerate constant moisture.

Select shallow containers for cactus plants with a layer of coarse charcoal or gravel in the botton to provide drainage. Use moist, light porous soil containing about one-half sand. Don't water for about two weeks to reduce the possibility of root rot developing.

Small specimens may be transplanted yearly and large ones about every three years when the plants fill the pot. Use leather gloves to protect your fingers

Cactus plants need several hours of direct sunlight per day so locate the collection in a sun-

Parker advises watering the plants two or three times a week during the spring growing period. Reduce watering to about once each week in July and August. Increase the frequency of watering during fall and decrease to none in November and

during the winter rest period. Cactus needs little fertilizer. Young plants should receive moderate applications of a low nitrogen house plant fertilizer every two weeks during May June and July. Mature plants should receive this treatment weekly.





> What has been special about the age of 21 goes back over 700 years of English common law. The distinction was originally made in the common law between being "an infant" and being "of full age." In this ref erence "infant" meant "minor" father than baby. In medieval times a merchant's son, or "burgess," was of full age when he could count money and measure cloth. But the "military which simply one subject to the draft, be came of full age at 21. Why? Because it was assumed he would not be strong enough to wear heavy armor at a younger age. Gradually, the "knightly majority" became the standard in the common law. The "knightly maiority" continues to have a mys tique, and is embedded in many parts of statutory law, espec ially where business is involved Qualifications for voting are a two-way street. First there appears a lack of communication between government and the people it purports to represent There is need for greater em phasis on what Federal, State and local governments are ac tually doing. Second, the citizen voter should find out how he is being served and relate that service to quality and costs. All ages of voters are affected by these two propositions.

Incidentally, of the 122 mil ion eligible voters, 36 million fail to exercise the privilege. It is fascinating to contem plate that after 700 years there is somewhat of a reversion to the ancient British rule of common law, recognizing the capaity of the young "burgess." the freeman in a town, who was of full age when he could count money and measure cloth. In those times this qualification constituted the essentials of adulthood. Things are a bit more complicated nowadays.


