

the North Vietnamese communist in Hanoi and Paris.

It seems that the lawyers in the Justice Department are saying that if any action is to be taken, it should be recommended by the State Department. The State Department says that it is the Justice Department who should act if there were law violations.

Probably the best explanation at this time is that neither want to pick up a hot potato because (1) they would be accused of political sledge - hammering, which the law has seemingly al ways been; (2) they seem to think it would be difficult to prove "negotiations" and (3) prosecution would tend to make a martyr out of the defendants. So, as it has always been, the Logan Act is something more to talk about than to prosecute under. But in reviewing the Logan Act's history, Harvard law professor Dellev F. Gagts wrote in the American Journal of International Law: "Who can tell when a new administration, thinner skinned or harder pressed than its predecessors, may in its irritation, call into play this sleeping giant?"



"How many Communist invaders do you run into per week in your neighborhood, on the average?" I asked.


