To lift her spirits, Virginia de cided to become a bleached blonde. She stirred two bleach ing products together and applied the mixture to her hair Result: scalp burns.

In short order, she demanded damages from one of the manufacturers. But at the trial, the company pointed out that its directions warned against mixing the product with anything else.

"The fact remains," said Virginia, "that a bleach should not become dangerous merely by being mixed with another

However, the court turned down Virginia's claim. The judge said she had meddled with the merchandise at her own risk.

With increasing frequency, manufacturers are being held liable for harm inflicted by their products. But if the consumer had substantially tampered with the product before using it, that usually will let the manufacturer "off the hook."

This is true even if there is no specific warning against tam-

Another case involved a ladler which collasped under a man's weight, throwing him to the ground. But before using it, he had nailed strips of wood along the bottom in hopes of giving it greater stability.

Because of this alteration which changed the ladder's distribution of weight, a court ruled that the man could not hold the manufacturer liable for his injury.



AHEAD As of now, however, prospects favor a more uniformly favorable environment for commercial banks. After a long laggard spell, both consumer spending and the accumulation of inventories are exhibiting new-found strength. Hence, the demand for bank loans and the rate structure for such borrowings should evidence increasing firmness as this fall season moves along. For the balance of this year, moreover, neither the Fed nor the Administration is likely to adopt measures that would tighten credit to any extent. The regulatory authorities have also clarified the "letter and spirit" of the Amended Bank Holding Act which had been adopted in December 1970. Although recent interpretations of the revised ground rules restrict bank holding companies solely to subsidiaries which engage in banking-related activities (except in the case of nonbanking subsidiaries acquired prior to 1968), there still remains sufficient latitude to permit moves into more profitable fields. Also, in view of the increased emphasis by the leading banks on expanding overseas operations, timely benefits should be derived from the current efforts to boost the nation's exports of goods and services. LONG-PULL INVESTMENTS

Investments in bank stocks tend to find a long-term haven in most portfolios. This is particularly true in the case of commitments made in a local or regional bank, However, those investors who are conscious of performance should bear in mind that bank stocks can become over-priced relative to near-term growth. At this time, however, the Research Department of Babson's Reports recommends holding such bank stocks as Chase Manhattan and First National City in N. Y., and Continental Illinois, which have performed especially well over the past two years. Also, bank stocks of institutions in rapid-growth areas should be retained, including Wachovia and Citizens & Southern (Atlan-

sease, there may not by any symptoms. Common symptoms that come later are coughing a lot, feeling tired all the time, to do something about them. spitting up blood, and losing weight. Any one or all of the symptoms can mean TB. Only a doctor can tell for sure, by giving tests to determine whether or not TB germs are active in the body.

Once the disease is diagnosed, effective drug treatment can begin. For some patients short hospital stays may be necessary. More and more TB patients are now treated in general hospitals. One of the first things patients learn is how to avoid spreading germs; by covering their coughs and sneezes with disposable paper tissues and putting them in paper bags to be burned. Fast-working drugs make TB patients non-infectious to others in a matter of weeks.

Not so long ago, TB patients went to sanitoriums and spent interminable years in isolation. Today, there is no need for long stays in hospitals. In fact, most patients do not have to go to hospitals at all for treatment of
