The following short editorial, picked up from The Fort Worth Star-Telegram, is timely, because cold weather is upon us and more people will have heating units turned on:

"Last year, 49 Texans died of carbon monoxide poisoning, most of them in their homes. They were casualties of a not uncommon accident - leakage of the colorless and odorless deadly gas from defective heaters, furnaces or other household appliances.

"We are in the heater season, now, and bearing that in mind the State Department of Health has issued a warning to householders that they should have gas-burning appliances

"It is good advice. Also, besides the need for periodic checking of stoves and heaters, the homeowner should remember that a cardinal rule of wintertime safety is that never should a heated room be kept shut tight. In the family home, as in the family automobile, some ventilation should be provided both day and night, so that fresh air can enter and possible dangerous fumes be dissipated."

In the first place, safety people say, electric tree lights never be strung on any kind of metal Christmas tree. Should a bare wire come in contact with one of the metal branches, it could cause a fire, or worse. someone could be electrocuted If metal trees are used, it has been suggested that they be placed well away from electric appliances or cords. The metal in the trees is excellent conductors of electrical current.

With natural or real trees, care should be taken if electric Christmas tree lights are used. In many instances, the sets of lights are taken down each year and stored away, without thought of inspection. Screwworms Still A Problem Screwworm infestations coninue to be a serious problem over much of the state, and livestock owners are urged to inspect and treat all animal wounds, says County Extension Agent Parker.

Although colder temperatures are beginning to slow down screwworm activities in the Panhandle and certain other areas of the state, many sections of the state have not yet recorded sufficient prolonged cold to hamper the troublesome livestock pest, he adds.

A short cold snap will cause the flies to become inactive for a time, but as the temperatures rise the flies again become a problem. Several successive days and nights of sub-freezing of near freezing temperatures are necessary to deal a crippling blow to the screwworm

Livestock owners therefore will need to continue their vigilance against new screwworm outbreaks. It's still important to collect samples of all cases and send them to the Mission Screwworm Eradication Laboratory for identification.

Locations of all known cases are needed for the future planning and treatment by eradicaprogram officials. They need a permanent record of hard-hit counties and areas.

The current screwworm ou break began reaching epidemic proportions in the spring and has continued through the summer and fall. Texas recorded 1,832 cases during the week ending November 11. At mid-November, total screwworm confirmations in the southwestern states reached the 94,173 mark, an all-time record. Texas had 89,587 cases by that date, with only 3,186 non-screwworm samples being processed at the Mission Lab this year. Of course these numbers do not include the many cases we had and I know were not sent into the la-

Clean Up Pesticide Application Equipment

A clean-up of pesticide application equipment will add to the useful life of the equipment and eliminate a potential hazard to the farm family, farm employess, livestock and pets.

The following are methods to clean the spray rig:

1. Use either a strong household detergent or an ounce of household ammonia per gallon of water. Fill the spray tank to capacity and run the sprayer about five minutes with the cutoff valve to nozzles closed. Then open the cut-off valve and drain as much as possible. Next, rinse the tank with clean water. Avoid splashing rinse water on the skin or eyes. 2. Use at least one-third of a tank of water adding 1-4 pound of activated charcoal and 1-8 pound of laundry detergent per 10 gallons of water. Wash the equipment for two minutes by swirling the liquid so that it reaches all parts of the tank. Pump some of the mixture through hoses and nozzles. Drain the tank and rinse the equipment with clean water. Avoid splashing rinse water on the skin or eyes.

Other parts of the spray rig also need a thorough cleaning. notes Parker. Scrub the outside surfaces of the spray rig with one of the above mixes. Use a stiff bristle brush. Remove nozzle to clean screens and tips. Remove caps from the ends of booms and stand them on end to remove sediment. Check all

hoses and filters. Coat all iron parts exposed to the chemical with a rust inhibitor of light oil. If the sprayer is powered with a gasoline engine. drain the fuel tank and carburetor and pour a tablespoon of engine oil through the spark plug hole. Turn the motor by hand to distribute oil on the cylinder walls.



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

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
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
