The Name of the Game Is Elitism By RALPH NOVAK

NEW YORK (CEF) Considerable controversy has been generated by the recent statements of Zane Meathead, 14-year-old director of the White House Office of Pro Football Policy.

It all started with Meathead's post-Super Bowl denunciation of NFL Commissioner Pete Rozelle for "failing to make sure the Redskins won and thereby robbing the nation's football fans of their just rewards

Meathead announced that the administration would in-troduce legislation making it mandatory that the Red-skins win all of their games next season, with no victory margin less than 64 points. And he accurate Reproduct VIET margin less than 64 points. And he accused Rozelle's NFL office of "elitist elitism," which he declined to define on the grounds that he just says what he is told to say.

He later granted a special round-table interview to 117 writers and editors from Sports Illustrated in which he insisted that he was not really in favor of stricter govern-ment control of pro football but in fact wanted to liberate the other teams of the NFL so they could lose to the Red-skins as, he said, "we all know they want to do."

Some criticism has been leveled at Meathead because of his background. Before assuming his current post, he was President Nixon's newspaper boy and his hobbies were gargling and stepping on ants. An aggressive per-sonality, he was voted "Fourth Grade Smart Aleck of 1972" by his classmates (marking the seventh straight year he had won that award) but his knowledge of pro football was limited to one game he saw on television when he was 5.
