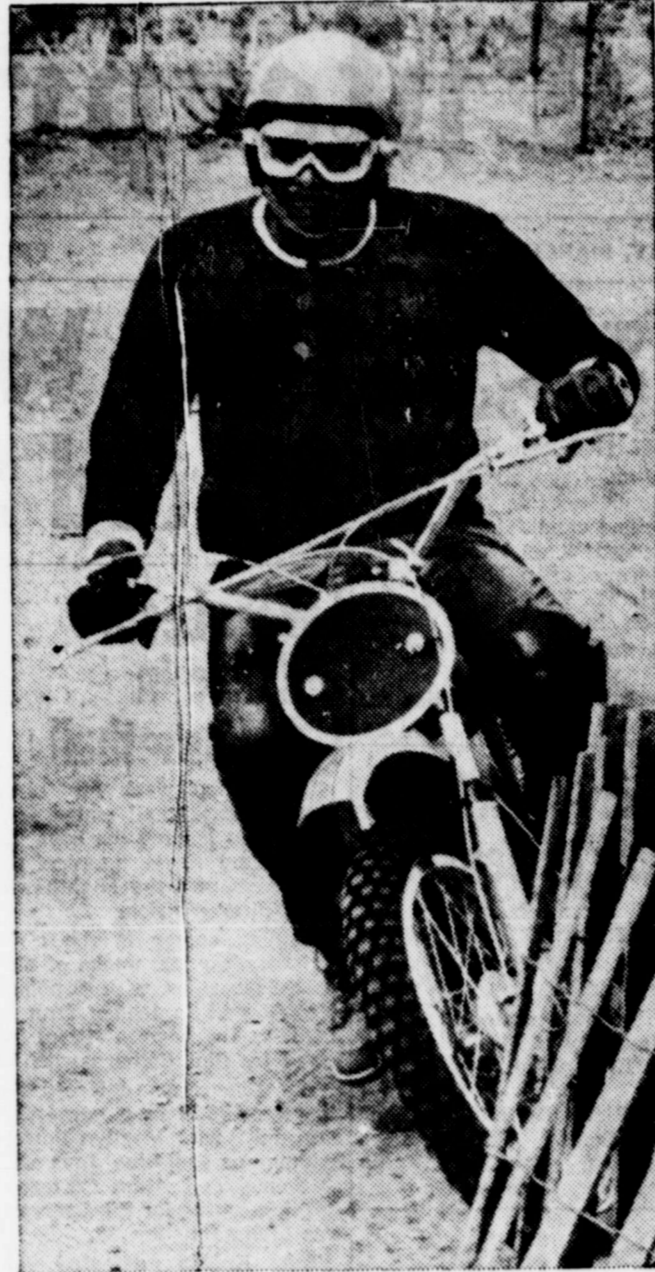

HEALTH FOR ALL

If you're the gambling type, consider this...

On second thought, you don't have to be a gambler to pull it over.

Accept this as a fact: If you're an American, chances are greater than 50 percent that you will die of a circulatory disease—a disease of the heart or blood vessels.

There are statistics to back this up. Diseases of the heart and blood vessels kill more Texans each year than accidents and other diseases combined, say state health officials.

Heading the 10 leading killers in Texas in 1970 and 1971 was heart disease, almost doubling the second biggest killer—cancer.

Cerebrovascular disease was third and arteriosclerosis ninth, according to the State Health Department's Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The cardiovascular disease (diseases of the heart and circulation) afflict more than 27 million children and adults and kill more than one million Americans annually.

Some diseases primarily affect the blood vessels, others only the heart itself. Among the major diseases are those which cause the blood vessels to corrode and deteriorate, with resultant damage to the heart, brain, kidneys or other parts of the body.

The major ailments which injure the cardiovascular system are atherosclerosis, hypertension, and rheumatic heart disease. They may produce congestive heart failure, heart attack and stroke. Also of major concern are congenital defects of the heart and great vessels which are discovered primarily in infants and children.

Although heart attacks are less common in men under 30 years of age, they become more of a hazard as a man grows older—reaching a peak for those between 50 and 60.

The artery-clogging process begins early in life, but it isn't until it suddenly blocks the supply of blood to an area of the heart muscle that a heart attack occurs. Such an occlusion can occur at any time in a diseased artery.

Statistics show that men have more heart attacks than women in the same age group—up to 13 times more in the 30 to 45-year age group—but only twice as many in the age span between 45 and 62. After 65 the rate is about the same between Caucasian men and women.

The heart disease picture is a grim one, but there are a number of practical things which can be done to thwart heart attacks, prevent heart disease and prevent strokes.

Unfortunately for those in the dangerous years, some of the arterial damage from built-up and hardened fatty deposits can't be reversed. But, through exercise, diet and the change in life style—such as quitting smoking—your chances of having a heart attack can be improved a bit.

Peanut Butter French Toast
Want to serve something different but very nutritious for breakfast? Surprise your family with peanut butter french toast, suggests Mr. O'Connor. To prepare six servings, you'll need these ingredients for:

Peanut Butter French Toast
3-4 cup peanut butter
12 slices bread
3 eggs
3-4 cup fluid milk
2-2 tsp. salt
Margarine or butter for fry-pan.

Spread peanut butter on half of bread slices. Put other slices of bread on top to make sandwiches. Mix Eggs, milk and salt. Dip sandwiches in egg mixture. Spread a little margarine or butter on bun pans. Bake in oven as you do for toasted cheese sandwiches.

One whole sandwich provides 2 tablespoons peanut butter and 1-2 egg. For smaller children, you may want to cut the sandwiches in half.

Serve the peanut butter french toast while it's hot. Then serve a half grapefruit or orange. What a refreshing follow-up!

Nephews were pallbearers.



Statewide Deer Hunter Survey

AUSTIN—A select group of Texas deer and turkey hunters will have the chance to brag about this season's hunting suc-cess.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department recently mailed questionnaires to 33,000 resident hunting license holders selected at random from throughout the state.

Looking much like a bill for a gasoline credit card purchase, the information card asks if the license holder hunted deer and/or turkey.

If so, the department wants to know the species of deer, age, sex, where and when killed. Much of the same information is requested for turkey.

It is important for everyone who receives one of the cards to respond even if he were un-successful in bagging either a turkey or a deer.

Postage is paid and checking off a few blanks on the card will only take a few seconds.

The Parks and Wildlife De-partment will use the informa-tion as the basis for formulating a statewide deer management plan.

The survey will enable the de-partment to project the total number of deer killed in the state and where they were kill-ed. Such information will give some idea of the effectiveness of hunting seasons and bag limits and how they should be modified in the future.
