Olives Brighten Up Vegetable Cookery

Vegetable cookery is an art that has been largely ignored in some of the world's best kitchens. Little wonder then, that the average American homemaker, as a rule, uses scant imagination and less variety when she prepares them.

Vegetables should provide appetizing flavor, color and textural contrast as well as nutrition. They should be welcome rather than merely grudgingly accepted at mealtime. A few basic principles of preparation will help: Don't overcook vegetables or drown them in water, don't always boil them, do drain them well before serving, add seasonings and serve them in a variety of sauce.

To give you an idea of the many marvelous things you can do with your vegetables we offer two new recipes from the Spanish Green Olive Commission. In these dishes, it is the tang and color of the easy-to-use pimiento-stuffed olives that lend a distinctive eye and appetite appeal.

Corn and Olive Sauce is a versatile accompaniment and its sunny color and zesty flavor will do wonders in brightening up your menus. Spanish Vegetable Medley is a tasty melange of a single meal's vegetables-in-one-dish. It is festive enough for company, and best of all, the vegetables are served in the tomato juice they are cooked in so their flavor and nutrition are retained.

A vegetable in the broadest sense is any kind of plant or plant product. But to most homemakers a vegetable is a plant or part of a plant utilized for eating at the main part of a meal. When eaten in the proper quantities, vegetable supply essential nutrients including water, vitamins and minerals plus energy and cellulose. Cooked properly they are crisp delicacies worthy of an honored place on the menu.

Spanish Vegetable Medley
Makes 8 to 10 servings.
4 medium carrots, sliced
4 medium onions, sliced
2 cups sliced celery
2 medium green peppers, chopped
2 pkgs. (10 oz. each) lima beans, thawed
2 cups tomato juice
1/4 cup olive or salad oil
1 1/2 tsp. salt, 1/2 tsp. pepper
1 tsp. crushed oregano
3-4 cup sliced, pimiento-stuffed olives

Combine all ingredients except olives in saucepan. Mix well. Cover and heat to boiling point; cook over medium heat 15 minutes or until vegetables and lima beans are almost tender. Add olives and cook 5 minutes longer.

Dealers Assure City of Supply Of Diesel Fuel

Winters dealers of diesel fuel have assured the City of Winters that diesel fuel for the generating engines of the Municipal Power Plant will be available.

However, City Hall sources said, the price of the fuel will be considerably higher than has been paid in the past. Cost has been about 13.5 cents per gallon in the past, and may run as high as 18 cents in the near future.

In other business Monday night, the City Council authorized expenditure of about \$75 for the City's share in police department equipment, including camera and fingerprint equipment. The City and the West Central Texas Council of Governments share cost in this program, with COG paying 85 percent of the cost, and the City 15 percent. Federal funds will be provided through COG for the law enforcement equipment.



Jimmy Roberts With Archaeologists Digging In Historic Euphrates Valley

Dr. Jimmy J. Roberts, formerly of Winters, and an assistant professor at Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, Md., is a member of an archaeological excavation team from Johns Hopkins now exploring and digging at Tell el-Fraies in the historic Euphrates Valley of Syria.

A number of ancient cities and biblical sites will be flooded following the scheduled completion of a high dam on the river in the fall of 1975, and archaeological are working feverishly to unearth historical sites and gain as much knowledge of ancient times as possible before the high water comes.

Theresa Howard Carter, assistant professor of Near Eastern studies at Johns Hopkins and a veteran of a number of archaeological expeditions in the eastern Mediterranean area is directing the Euphrates expedition in association with Dr. Roberts.

The Euphrates expedition was organized more than a year ago in response to an urgent appeal from the Syrian government for assistance from the international academic community in salvaging antiquities from 5 or more sites that will be flooded.

Johns Hopkins is the only American university which is participating, although a number of European universities have responded and are working this spring.

Dr. Carter spent nearly a month last year surveying the site. Because of the changeable climate and rainfall in the region, actual digging can be done for only brief periods in the spring and fall. Dr. Carter and Dr. Roberts are now at the site assembling a work force that will number about 60, and digging is expected to begin soon.

Dr. Goedicke, chairman of Johns Hopkins Department of Near Eastern Studies, described the ancient sites in the area as ranging from Neolithic settlements to cities of the Byzantine and Islamic periods. During the time from about 2000 B. C. to 1000 B. C., Syria was a battleground for the major powers of the Ancient Near East. Situated at the top of the legendary Fertile Crescent, northern Syria served as a bridge over which artistic and literary currents passed between east and west.

Dr. Roberts is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne Roberts of Winters. He is married to the former Virginia Lou Compton, and they have four children, Kay, Amy, Susan Riesel, and Nathan. They live in Baltimore.
