## Basketball Goal Backboard Falls To Gym Floor

The goal backboard on the west end of the basketball court in the new Winters school gym crashed to the floor of the gym last Sunday afternoon, destroying the glass and causing re-scheduling of some junior high basketball games set for this week.

Kirke McKenzie, band director had been working out on the basketball court, and narrowly escaped injury as the heavy metal and glass goal backboard crashed to the playing floor.

Johnny Bob Smith, school business manager, said the bolts holding the heavy metal frame to the concrete block wall had worked loose from the metal anchors. He was standing only a few inches from the spot where the board hit the floor.

The backboard was of heavy glass, and was shattered when it hit the floor, it was said.

Smith said a new backboard will be in place in time for the basketball game with Coahoma next Tuesday night, when Winters A and B boys, and girls' A teams meet Coahoma boys and girls.

## Group Applies For Permit For Winters Radio

An application has been filed with the Federal Communications Commission for a radio station in Winters.

The application was filed by Winters Radio, Inc. The group includes Tom E. Spellman, his wife, E. Jean Spellman, both of Sherman; Evans B. Wood of Denison and Ross K. Prescott of Dallas.

Spellman said Friday that it would be six months to a year before the application is acted on.

If the station is built it will be on a four-acre plot one mile north of Winters on U. S. 83. Spellman said the 195-foot tower, the office, studio, "the whole works" would be built on the leased acreage. Cost of the entire project would be about \$30,000 Spellman said.

The application is for 1060 kilocycles, Spellman said. The station would operate daytime only on 1,000 watts.

Spellman said the reason the group chose Winters for a station is because the town didn't have one. It's a commercial venture. The idea is simply to invest and see if it will be profitable.

## Winters Man Killed In Car Accident Tuesday

Ray Hood Wilbanks, 52, of Winters, died at 5:30 p. m. Tuesday in North Runnels Hospital from injuries received in a one-car accident a short distance south of town on U. S. Highway 83 about half an hour earlier.

Wilbanks apparently lost control of the car about 4:55 p. m. Tuesday while driving a mile south of Winters. He was thrown from the car when it rolled into a ditch, according to

reports. He was alone in the car at the time of the accident.

Services for Wilbanks were pending Wednesday morning at Spill Funeral Home.

Born April 27, 1922, in Winters, Wilbanks was an Army Air Corps World War II veteran. He was a member of the First Baptist Church.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Myrtle Wilbanks of Winters.

## Father Patrick Ryan, Pastor of Mt. Carmel Catholic Church, Died Jan. 18

The Rev. Patrick J. Ryan, 61, pastor of Our Lady of Mount Carmel Catholic Church in Winters, died in St. John's Hospital in San Angelo Saturday. He had been hospitalized about a week.

Funeral mass for the Rev. Ryan was held at 10 a. m. Monday in the Winters Church, conducted by the Most Rev. Stephen Leven, Bishop of San Angelo Diocese. Rosary was said by the Rev. Blackburn, Oblate in Charge, of San Antonio, at 7:30 p. m. Sunday in Mt. Carmel Church. Forty Catholic priests from a wide area of Texas attended the funeral mass Monday.

Another mass was held at 4 p. m. Tuesday at the College of Oblate in San Antonio, with burial in the Oblate Cemetery in San Antonio. Burial was under the direction of Spill Funeral Home in Winters. Several members of the church from Winters, Bronte, and Ballinger attended the mass in San Antonio Tuesday.

Palbearers were Jack Cervenka, Walter Adami, Herbert Jacob, Manuel Vera, Louis DeLaCruz, Salvador Esquivel, Richau Arredondo, Joe Kozelsky, Andrew Englert and Robert Holder.

Father Ryan was born Sept. 5, 1913, in Thurles County, Tipperary, Ireland. He was ordained a priest June 20, 1937 at Daingean, Offally, Ireland.

Assigned to the Diocese of San Angelo in 1952, he spent two years at St. Ann's in Midland. From 1955 to 1966 he was pastor of St. Mary's Catholic Church in Ballinger with St. Joseph Catholic Church of Ballinger his mission.

Since 1966, he has been pastor of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Catholic Church in Winters, with St. James Catholic Church in Bronte as his mission.

Survivors include a sister and two brothers in Ireland, and a sister in Australia.

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## Mrs. O'Connor's Weekly News Column

**French Fried Onions:**  
3 large onions  
1/2 c. milk  
1/2 tsp. salt  
salad oil  
1 c. flour

About 30 minutes before serving:  
With sharp knife, slice onions 1/4 inch thick; separate into rings.

In electric skillet or deep fryer heat 1/4 inch salad oil to 375 F.

In small dish, place milk. In small bowl, stir flour and salt until mixed. Dip onion rings in milk, then flour mixture. Repeat so each ring is coated twice. In hot salad oil, cook onions 3 minutes or until lightly browned. Drain on paper towels. Serve immediately. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

**Over The Top With Onions**  
Less than two years ago the onion shortage was tagged the "greatest shortage in 50 years." Today heavy supplies of yellow onions have set a record in the other direction.

Marketing specialists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture say the storage onion crop is 18 percent over the 1970-73 average, with enough onions to fill almost 25 million hundred-pound bags.

As a result prices to growers have dropped. In New York, growers received an average of \$1.92 for a 50-pound sack of medium-size, yellow globes the last week of December, compared to \$3.85 a year earlier. In Idaho and Eastern Oregon they got even less—\$1.32 for the medium Spanish types versus \$3.62 a year earlier.

The onion's place on the family table ranks with its historical importance. Dating from pre-Biblical times, the onion has inspired a wealth of myth and legend as to its curative and nutritive powers. Militarily it has gained a permanent place in history—Alexander the Great believed in its power to promote valor. General U. S. Grant wired the War Department in the summer of 1864 that he would not move his Army without onions. They arrived promptly.

Today these legendary footnotes may make good table talk, while the onion remains good eating. And, if the onion has not appeared on your table since the great shortage it may be a good time to consider some of the ways in which it can be served. As a main dish vegetable you may want to prepare a quiche of cheese and onions, or a steaming bowl of French onion soup, a casserole of stuffed and baked onions, or a dish of richly creamed onions.

Nobody needs reminding of the onion's importance as a flavor ingredient. With beef in plentiful supply and many Americans getting acquainted with less expensive and less familiar cuts of beef, onions can help to make these cuts more appetizing.

Here's a word about proper storage. Put them in a loosely woven basket and store in a cool, dark dry, well-ventilated place. Don't refrigerate them until they have been cut. Place them in a plastic bag or bowl in the refrigerator. They will keep for several days. Chopped onions can be placed in a shallow pan and frozen; once frozen, store them loosely in a

jar from which they can be easily scooped.

Menu suggestions using onions: cream of onion and celery soup; baked whole onions, baked fresh onion and tomato scasserole; onion and mushroom casserole; curry topped onion pot pie; onion pies with fresh mushroom sauce; shish kebab with onion; baked stuffed onion; stuffed onions with spinach and bacon; onion and potato au gratin; scalloped meat with eggplant and onion; baked onion and beef casserole.

Onion odor can be removed from a knife by running it through a raw potato. Onion odors can be removed from your hands by rubbing your hands briskly with celery salt before washing. If you don't want your breath to smell of onions, eat a few sprigs of parsley which have been dipped in salt or vinegar.

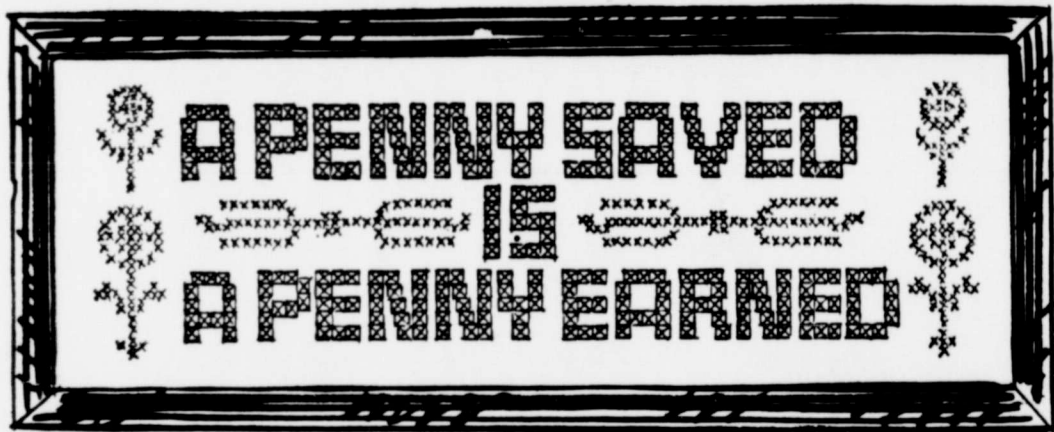

Sometimes a pearl that was expected to be round and spherical will assume a rather "bumpy," irregular texture, within a circular sphere. These cultured pearls are then termed "baroque."

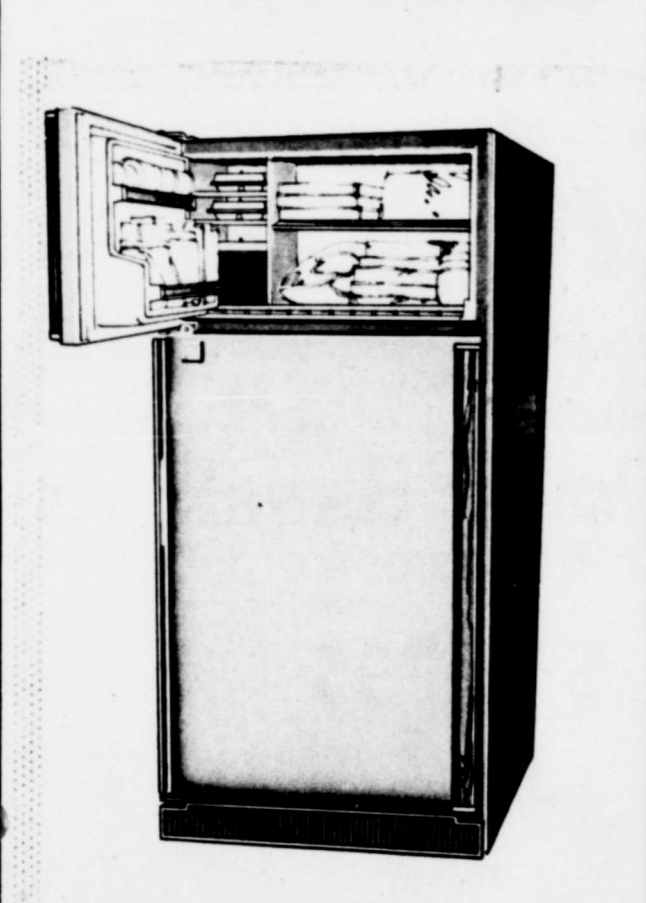

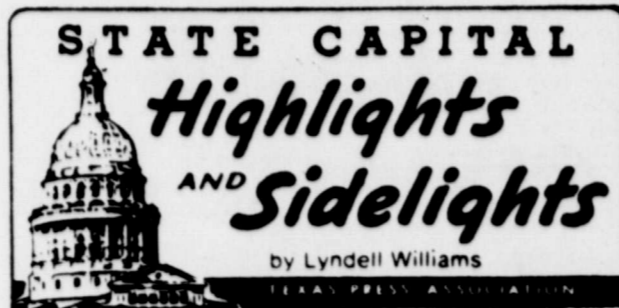
## On Dean's Honor Roll At ASU

**AUSTIN, Tex.**—While the legislature is getting set for action and inaugural activities are being planned, Gov. Dolph Briscoe is faced with hundreds of important decisions on fitting the right men (and women) into jobs.

Within the first two months of the year, he must make appointments or reappointments to about 600 board, agency and commission places where terms of members are expiring.

Before 1975 is over, he will have placed more than 1,700 people in major and minor jobs.

During his four-year term, he will make enough such appointments to "control" every appointive state agency. That is to say, the people he selects will be in a majority of seats on the regulatory, licensing and administrative bodies.

Nearly all the gubernatorial appointments are subject to confirmation by the State Senate.

Three University of Texas system board of regents members will come to the end of their present terms January 13. The most controversial of the three, Frank Erwin Jr. of Austin, has stated he does not seek another term.

State Highway Commissioner D. C. Greer's term expires February 15. Briscoe has stated he will reappoint Joe Christie chairman of the State Insurance Board January 31.

Other agencies with powers reaching into all segments of economic life of the state have vacancies coming up which Briscoe will fill early this year.

**SUPERPORT URGED**—Gov. Briscoe and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby jointly urged public bodies and private interests to apply immediately to build a \$400 million offshore terminal in Texas Gulf waters.

But both officials said they are opposed to state ownership of so-called superport facilities designed to receive and off-load oil imported in huge tankers.

Their statement dealt a perhaps-fatal blow to possibility of a state-financed superport. The Texas Offshore Terminal Commission by a five to four vote had recommended state ownership and control of an estimated \$1.4 billion profit operation over a 30-year span.

The two officials lauded new federal legislation establishing a licensing procedure for the offshore facilities. They said they will cooperate fully with license applicants when assurances are provided that the coastal environment is not jeopardized. The federal act allows states to retain veto power of facilities, requires a \$20 million bond to protect the environment and makes port owners and ships liable for up to \$50 million in damages.

**COURTS SPEAK**—The State Supreme Court upheld validity of a corporation franchise tax surcharge attacked by six corporations in spite of erroneous dates named in the legislation for reporting financial data on which the levy is based.

The High Court in another case, concluded a school teacher fired temporarily while running for county commissioner must go through administrative channels before suing Pharr-San Juan-Alamo School district for \$107,800 in damages.

A \$48,866 award to a Galveston County youth hit while "playing" in front of a car was upheld in another Supreme Court case involving whether a lawyer hinted the motorist's insurance policy was limited to a \$100,000 payment.

### NEW PRIMARY PUSHED

—A strong push for establishment of a Texas presidential preference primary in 1976 (and thereafter) is anticipated in the legislature this year.

Some writers have sought to link it with the White House aspirations of U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen. The senator is expected to announce his candidacy soon, and, of course, wants to make a strong showing in his home state. Opinion is divided as to whether he could win more delegates in a primary or the traditional convention system.

At any rate, at least four legislators already have indicated they will offer bills to provide for selection of Texas presidential and vice presidential nominating delegates in a May primary. They feel the time is ripe to make the change, and note polls indicate support for preference primaries.

### INVESTMENTS HURT

—State investments in stock, like those of individuals, are taking a beating, at least on paper.

If state-owned stocks in the major Texas investment funds had to be dumped at today's market values, losses could be half a billion dollars.

However, the officials who manage these funds emphasize they are under no pressure to cash in the chips, and that they will ride out the market plunge without ill effects overall.

### SHORT SNORTS

A legislative committee recommended establishment of a Commission on jail standards with authority to close sub-standard jails.

Governor Briscoe reappointed B. F. Block of Amarillo and Murray D. McKinley Sr. of Pearsall to the Texas Water Well Drillers Board, and named Tommy C. Bussell of Houston and James Taylor Virdell of Llano to the same board.

## WASHINGTON REPORT

In this, my first report to the District since it honored me by electing me its Representative, I want to comment on two things: the state of Congress and the state of the Union.

First, the state of the Congress. Some press reports have suggested that the large number of new members means that the new Congress will be "liberal." I disagree. Most of the new members come from basically conservative districts, like ours, and I doubt that those members campaigning in favor of big new spending programs. Further, I doubt that they will vote for such programs. Certainly I do not intend to.

What the new Congress has done, however, is to bring reforms and procedures that altered the seniority system. Now districts with new congressmen have a chance of a more equal voice, so that they can be represented as effectively as the districts of long-time senior members. This change reflects democracy: all congressional districts should be equal and their need be no apology for these reforms. They will help the 21st District and the American system.

Second, the state of the

Union. The President in his address said that the state of the Union "is not good." I disagree. Yes, we have problems: high inflation, deepening recession, uncertainty about our national direction. But improvement lies within our power. We can work to control federal spending, and I will do so. We can give short-term, immediate tax relief to those most in need, as the President suggests, but we must always recognize that money spent today must be paid tomorrow, and I have strong reservations about the massive deficits that the President is asking for and that some in Congress will be willing to provide. The only way that I know to restore government to sound financial footing and to control inflation is to have the government live within its income. I will work for that, and I will work to find others to join me.

I hope to use these columns to give you a first-hand report from your Representative on events in Washington, and I hope you will call on me for help with any particular problem.

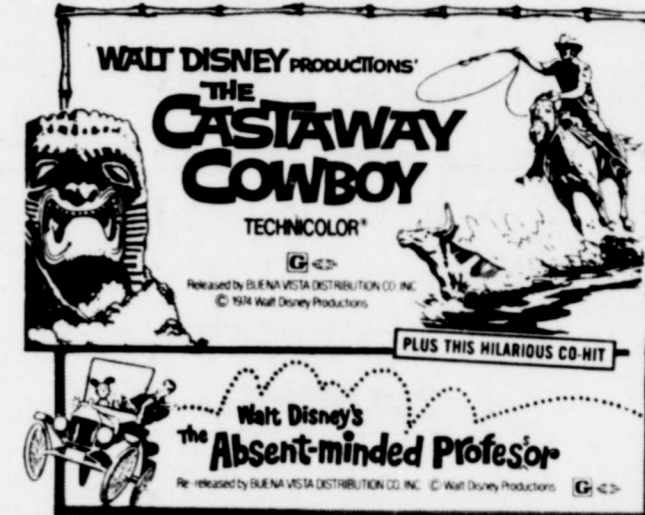
