Beef Short Course Feb. 3

A beef production short course for adult farmers will be held February 3 through February 6, under the sponsorship of the Winters High School Vocational Agriculture Department, Bill Graves, superintendent, and Stanley Blackwell, vo-ag teacher, have announced.

The course is scheduled to begin at 7:30 p.m. February 3 in the vo-ag building. Frank C. Litterst, beef production specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M University will be the instructor for the course.

Litterst is a graduate of Texas A&M University, with a degree in animal science. Much of his work was done in livestock production.

Following three years of service in the U. S. Army, Litterst served as instructor in the Veterans Agriculture Program in Hays County four years and was sales manager

for a milling company in Fort Worth four years.

He has served as manager of the Baldwin Land & Cattle Company, with ranches in Travis and Shelby counties, and has successfully operated his own ranching and farming business, with both registered and commercial cattle, sheep, Angora goats, pecans and grain farming. He is a former director of the State Shorthorn Breeders Association and a member of American Angus and Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

Winters Pupils Make Film Strip On Traffic Safety

Fourth grade students in Winters Elementary School have produced a colorful filmstrip for the Governor's Office of Traffic Safety in Austin.

The film, called "The Safest Show on Earth," was produced by the children with materials made available to the school by the Office of Traffic Safety to help teach pedestrian, bicycle and passenger safety.

Rep. Lynn Nabers Will Introduce Bill To Identify Country Origin of Meat

Representative Lynn Nabers, D-Brownwood, and Representative Jim Nugent, D-Kerrville, have announced plans to introduce a bill which will amend the Texas Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act, making it possible for the buying public to determine the country of origin of meat.

Nabers and Nugent said that they are seeking passage of the bill, which states that "if any article of food contains meat imported from a foreign nation, its labeling must contain a statement of that fact, including the English name of the foreign nation", so that the public will be better informed

about the meats they buy. Nabers pointed out that many people would prefer American processed meat because of the more rigid sanitary standards maintained in this country but at the present time they have no way of knowing which meat is domestic and which is foreign.

Nabers further stated, "Passage of this bill would enable buyers to choose certain products because they are American and this, in turn, would help the American meat industry as well as those who engage in the raising, selling and processing of livestock in this state."

LICENSE PLATE TIME—Vehicle license plates for 1975 will go on sale Monday, February 3. Mrs. Ellen Meyer, deputy county tax collector for the Winters sub-office, displays several of the different types of plates which will be issued. Prefix for plates to be issued from the Winters sub-office will be EXM, from 700 to 999, and then EXN and EXP, for passenger cars. 1975 plates are black on white, with personal numbers of letters blue on white. Mobile

home plates also will be blue on white. The "75" on this year's plates is not printed, but only imbedded into the metal. There is an indentation on the lefthand side of the top of the plate where a year decal will be affixed next year. Instead of receiving new plates next year, vehicle owners will receive special decals with the year number, to be placed on the old plate. This year's plates are not painted on the back side, but are galvanized.

AUSTIN, Tex.—The 64th Texas Legislature started with a bang and a burst of action last week.

State Senators set new records for speed in organizing while the House named Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake its new speaker and debated rules.

Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, as promised, named a complete roster of Senate standing committees on the first day of the session, January 14. Only changes in chairmanships were Sens. Don Adams of Jasper moving up to head the housekeeping appropriations panel and Sen. Pete Snelson of Midland taking over the intergovernmental relations committee.

The Senate went to work almost immediately on a proposed emergency pay raise for state employees, while both houses advanced a measure to extend unemployment compensation benefits four weeks and gain \$5 million in federal funds.

Clayton, who defeated Rep. Carl Parker of Fort Arthur for the speakership, delayed naming of his committees until this week, while he concentrated on getting rules changes he wants.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe submitted lawmakers a long list of emergency measures for immediate consideration, including the pay raise for state workers and \$80 million in stop gap aid for schools.

Lone Star Gas Files Rate Application Seeking To Increase City Gate Price

Lone Star Gas Company recently filed an application with the Texas Railroad Commission seeking an increase in its authorized city gate rate based to a large measure on sharply higher costs of purchased gas. The company also seeks to recover increases in expenses for materials, labor, costs of money, taxes, and other operating items and to earn the return allowed by law on its increased property investments. The company's weighted average cost of gas for the month of November, 1974 of \$44.93 per thousand cubic feet (MCF) compares with the \$37.14 per MCF in July 1974, the month cited in Lone Star's most recent rate filing of September 3, 1974, which is pending. Robert E. Reading, rate officer and assistant controller of Lone Star Gas, stated that an urgent need exists for a total rate adjustment of \$25.62 per MCF, of which \$16.35 per MCF is immediately required to cover current increases in the costs of gas which the company buys to serve its customers. The remaining portion of the increase represents a recovery of higher expenses and a fair and reasonable return on its property dedicated to serve its one million customers. The company's city gate rate of \$55.31 per MCF would increase to \$80.93 per MCF. The overall increase in revenue will amount to about \$30 million, based on 1974 residential and commercial sales volumes.

The average residential bill would rise from about \$100 to about \$124 annually, or a \$2 a month increase. However, it is the intent of the company, following action of the Railroad Commission, to adjust its customer rates in a manner that would place the greater part of the increase on customers using the greatest quantities of gas. This would ease the burden of the increase on those least able to afford it.

During 1974, Lone Star announced higher industrial and electric generation rates in addition to placing nearly all such customers on a rate basis that adjusts monthly to the company's weighted average cost of gas.

Reading explained that the company's weighted average cost of gas increased by an average of 1 1/4 per MCF monthly during 1974. He further stated that future higher average costs are built in to existing gas purchase commitments required to continue to serve customers. Reading pointed out that Lone Star's average cost of gas is among the lowest in the State at this time. Present costs to acquire new supplies of natural gas in the areas near Lone Star's 12,000-mile transmission pipeline system have escalated generally to the \$1.75 per MCF level compared with the company's weighted average cost of gas in 1971 of \$17.81 per MCF. "Additional gas which we have already acquired at competitive prices to continue supplying our customers dictates that we be permitted to recover fully and on a timely basis these increased costs," Mr. Reading stated.

The present filing recognizes that Lone Star has pending before the Railroad Commission an application to increase its gate rate based solely on the increase in the weighted average cost of gas and a motion for interim relief. A

new motion for an interim gate rate increase to cover fully the cost of purchased gas only will also be presented to the Commission. Lone Star has asked permission to amend its earlier application to increase the gas cost recovery to 100% of all increases in the weighted average cost of gas on a monthly basis. In the most recent rate order dated August 26, 1974, the Railroad Commission continued the practice of permitting semiannual adjustments in the city gate rate to reflect 65% of the increase in the weighted average cost of gas.

As an alternative to a current month full cost of gas adjustment clause, Lone Star's application proposes to establish a special gas cost account in which to accumulate uncovered gas costs. The recovery of these accumulated costs would be in the form of an annual adjustment to rates. Late last week, Lone Star Gas Company received an order from the Oklahoma Corporation Commission. The order includes an increase in base rates. The order also consolidates and reduces the number of industrial and special rate classifications, generally as the company had requested. The impact of the order is evaluating the dollar impact of the order. Lone Star sold 13.4 billion cubic feet in Oklahoma in 1974. The company was pleased that the Commission granted Lone Star full gas cost protection on residential and commercial service on a monthly basis for gas purchased in Oklahoma and sold to its approximate 35,000 customers in some 42 communities in that state.

Comptroller Bob Bullock reminded Texas business operators Saturday that the state store license requirement has been abolished. Bullock said his office has been besieged with calls and letters this month by businesses which were unaware that the license requirement was repealed as of Dec. 31, 1974. "Obviously, the past administration didn't get the message out," Bullock said. "I consider it good news that we've been able to do away with the store license."

The store license, which started at \$5 for a single store, was a minor revenue source. Its repeal by phases was ordered by the Legislature in 1971. Bullock said that some 240,000 stores in Texas had previously been covered by the license act. He said his office is returning license money still being sent in by businesses unaware of the repeal. "It's gratifying to see businesses voluntarily trying to do right and pay their taxes, but in this case we are saying 'thanks, but no thanks,' Bullock said.
