Five Now Filed For Council Seats

There now are five candidates for two seats on the Winters City Council, to be filled in the city election April 5.

Earl Roach last week signed a candidate for one of the openings.

E. E. Vaughan, whose present term expires in April, announced Tuesday that he would be a candidate for re-election.

Jimmy Guevara filed Tuesday as a candidate.

E. A. Skates and Cecil Scott filed as candidates Wednesday morning. Woodrow Watts, incumbent alderman, said he is not a candidate for re-election.

Several weeks ago, Mayor Homer Hodge announced that he would be a candidate for re-election to that office.

Council Will Call For Building Bids

The City of Winters will call for bids on construction of an addition to the present fire station, it was announced Tuesday, following a meeting of the City Council Monday night.

The proposed structure will be 24x60 in size, and will be built to adjoin the north side of the City Hall and present fire station building.

The present fire station is inadequate for the four fire trucks and an emergency vehicle, it was stated. The new addition would add enough room so that all vehicles would be under roof.

Cost of construction of the new addition would be from \$10,000 to \$12,000, city officials estimated.

Rev. Edward Kennedy Assigned As Pastor of Winters Catholic Church

The Rev. Edward Kennedy, OMI, has been assigned as pastor of Our Lady of Mr. Carmel Catholic Church in Winters, and St. James Mission at Bronte, according to an announcement by the Most Rev. Stephen A. Leven, his superior.

The Rev. Kennedy succeeds the late Rev. Patrick Ryan, OMI, who died January 18.

The Rev. Kennedy was born in Thurles County, Tipperary, Ireland, and was ordained in 1937. He was a classmate of the Rev. Ryan in grade school, and in the seminary.

The Rev. Kennedy has served in parishes in Ciudad Victoria, Mexico, for the past ten years, and has visited the Winters and Bronte churches many times.

Three Trustees To Be Elected At Wingate

Three members will be elected to the board of trustees of Wingate Independent School District April 5.

Members whose terms expire are Gilbert Smith and Jack Pritchard. A third member will be elected to fill an unexpired term.

Winters Student Will Tour With McMurry Band

Dusty Nichols of Winters, student at McMurry College, will be with the McMurry College Band during the annual spring tour beginning February 27. The tour will last five days and carry McMurry musicians to seven cities.

Nichols will be on euphoniums.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. H.M. (Jiggs) Nichols of Winters.

Noe V. Ortiz To Sicily Base With U. S. Navy

Navy Aviation Storekeeper Third Class Noe V. Ortiz, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ubaldino Ortiz of Winters, has left the Naval Air Station, Norfolk, Va., with Detachment One of Helicopter Mine Countermeasures Squadron 12.

He will be deployed to the Naval Air Facility, Sigonella, Sicily, where the detachment will be headquartered as a unit of the U.S. Sixth Fleet.

Ortiz will be involved in fleet support activities, including the transportation of personnel and supplies to ships in the Mediterranean.

Nelan Bahlman Is "Man Of Year"

Nelan Bahlman, owner of Bahlman Cleaners in Winters was named "Man of the Year" during the annual Chamber of Commerce banquet last Friday night. He was presented a plaque of recognition for his service to the community.

Paul Wallace, minister of the North Main Church of Christ, made the presentation during the banquet program.

Bahlman was cited for his many services to the town and community. He presently is

president of Winters Rental Housing Development, Inc., a non-profit organization formed to provide additional housing in Winters. He also is a member of the board of directors of North Runnels Hospital. He was one of the members of a steering committee which drew up plans for the North Runnels Hospital District some years ago, and has been a member of the Chamber of Commerce and the Lions Club. He served as an alderman on the Winters City Council one term.

Hays Resigns As Head of Elm Creek Water Dist.

Wesley M. Hays of Winters Tuesday night resigned as chairman of the board of directors of Elm Creek Water Control District, "for personal and business reasons."

David Ledbetter, who has been a member of the board for several years, was named

chairman to succeed Hays. Also, Charles Clifton of Ballinger was appointed to the board, to succeed John W. Purifoy, who was elected Runnels County Judge last November. Purifoy had been one of the original members of the board, appointed when the district was formed about 10 years ago.

Hays had been appointed to the board and named chairman about seven years ago. He succeeded R.C. Thomas, who had been appointed to the original board and who served as chairman for about three years.

During Hays' years as chairman, much work has been accomplished, with preliminary surveys completed and applications made for priority to receive government grants for construction of water retarding

Plan To Build Rental Housing

Roy Clark, owner of The Bright Company, a construction, real estate and insurance firm headquartered in Fort Worth, announced last week his company plans to build an apartment complex with at least 16 units in Winters.

Clark now is in the process of compiling information on the need for such a complex in Winters. A housing survey

questionnaire is being published in this week's issue of The Enterprise, and those filling out the questionnaire are asked to mail them to the company at their Winters address, or leave them at the office of the Winters Chamber of Commerce.

Clark said this project will be financed through the Farmers Home Administration, but will be a "profit" venture instead of a "non-profit" undertaking. His company now is operating such rental complexes in other localities in the state.

The rental units being planned would contain two bedrooms, Clark said.

Clark is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert M. Clark of Winters. He is a 1962 graduate of Winters High School and a graduate of Abilene Christian College.

\$123 Added To Hospital Fund

Gifts and memorials to the North Runnels Hospital gift fund have been increased by \$123 during the past several days, Ted Meyer, chairman of the fund committee, has announced.

Meyer said all gifts and memorials now will be used to purchase a portable X-ray unit, which is needed at the hospital for bedfast patients and those with severe injuries which prohibit their movement. Cost of the X-ray machine will be about \$5,000, he said.

An administrative action taken recently by the Runnels County Commissioners Court, concerning transfer of the old Winters Municipal Hospital from the City of Winters to the hospital district had been interpreted as approval of land

sale to the district for the purpose of building an addition to the new hospital. The recent action was only administrative clarification of the actual transfer which occurred upon formation of the hospital district some years ago.

The old municipal hospital, which became the property of the North Runnels Hospital District, recently was sold to David Carroll.

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School Money Bill Waiting For Governor's Sig

State Representative Lynn Nabers, announced recently the allocation to Runnels County under the emergency appropriation to independent school districts that has now passed both the Senate and the House of Representatives and awaits the Governor's signature.

Nabers stated, This bill, H.B. 102, relates to emergency grants to each school district receiving revenue from the Foundation School Program Fund and will entitle the Olfen School District to \$1,714.00, the Ballinger School District to \$35,452.00, the Miles School District to \$10,604.00, the Winters School District to \$26,426.00, and the Wingate School District to \$1,199.00 for the 1974-1975 school year.

Nabers added that the procedure for determining the amount of the emergency grants is the same for each school district and is based on the approved average daily attendance and a factor representing the percentage of state support for the Foundation School Program in the district for the 73-74 school year.

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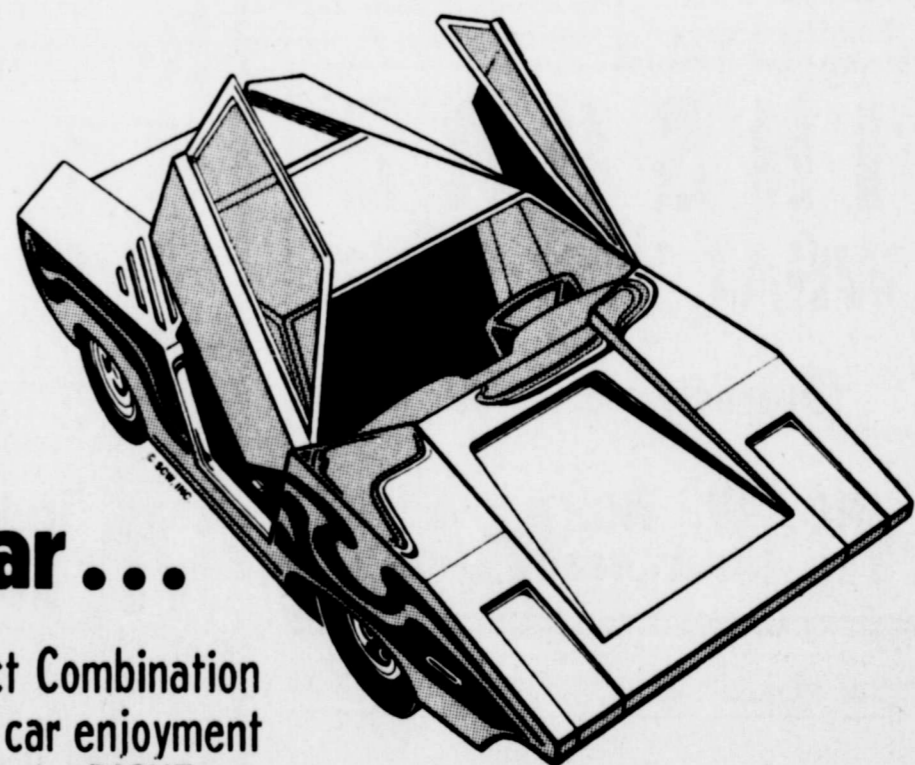



Richards Selected for Outstanding Farmer-Rancher Award in Soil Dist.

C.O. Richards of Ballinger has been selected for the Outstanding Conservation Farmer-Rancher award in the Runnels Soil and Water Conservation District, accordint to Arthur

Eggemeyer, District Chairman.

Mr. and Mrs. Richards operate the 26,700 acre C.H. Wylie Estate Ranch near Bronte. They entered into a district cooperative agreement with the Runnels Soil and Water Conservation District in 1969 and have since installed many conservation measures on the ranch.

With technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service, Richards has root-plowed, and seeded approximately 13,000 acres of rangeland to a mixture of grasses to speed up range recovery. Several thousand additional acres are planned to be seeded in the future, with the remaining acreage being managed to encourage native recovery. Approximately 775 acres of pastureland was also seeded to kleingrass in 1970. In addition, Richards has 17,722 acres in a Planned Grazing System which will be extended to include every acre of rangeland and pastureland on the ranch. When completed, this Planned Grazing System will consist of eight individual systems with seven to nine pastures per system.

Other work that Richards has completed on the ranch includes the construction of 104,600 feet of fence, approximately 32 farm ponds, 18,400 feet of pipeline for livestock water, and many water troughs. Richards also carries out good conservation management practices which include proper grazing use and deferred grazing on the 20,760 acres of rangeland, pastureland management on the 1,210 acres of pastureland, conservation cropping system and crop residue management on the 1,680 acres of Cropland, and wildlife habitat management on nearly the entire ranch acreage.

Richards is not only a good conservationist, but is involved in many community activities as well. For example, he was the chairman for the 1973 Cattleman's Roundup for Crippled Children, is an active member of the Methodist Church in Bronte, the Texas Section, Society for Range Management, the Soil Conservation Society of America, the Texas Farm Bureau; has served with the School Board, several hospitals, the Chamber of Commerce, and is active in several cattlemen's associations and the Boy Scouts.
