New Water Tower "On the Line"

After many months of planning, a delay of several months after construction was started, the new water tower in the north part of Winters was put "on the line" Saturday, with Mayor Homer Hodge and members of the city's Water Department on hand, along with the project engineer and the construction company foreman, to turn the main valve to start the water.

The new tower has a capacity of 300,000 gallons of water, and will provide high pressure delivery. Addi-

tion of the new tower increases the high-stand water storage capacity to 300,000 gallons for the city, it was stated. The south tower has a capacity of 100,000.

The new water storage tower replaces the old 50,000-gallon tower which was torn down about three years ago to make room for widening of Winters' Main Street (US 83). Cost of the new tower was \$112,000, plus engineering fees, and financing was through sale of revenue bonds by the City of Winters.

Construction of the new tower was begun last summer, but then delayed for several months because of a strike against a company manufacturing some of the materials used. The tower was built by Chicago Bridge & Iron Works, with engineering by Yeatts & Decker Engineers of Abilene. Billy Jacobs was project engineer.

City officials said the addition high-stand water storage, and the pressure available, would to a great extent provide lower insurance rates for residents of the city.

Rural Water System Meeting April 7th

Loans and grants from the Farm Home Administration to finance the proposed rural water system in North Runnels have been virtually approved, contingent upon approval by the membership of North Runnels Rural Water Supply Corporation of certain "conditions" called for by the FHA.

A meeting of the corporation membership has been called for 8 p. m., Monday, April 7, in the Winters Community Center, to discuss these conditions, and to obtain approval of a majority of those members present.

At a meeting of the board of directors of the corporation, along with representatives of the FHA, Tuesday night, the "Letter of Conditions" from the FHA was read. These conditions

set up basic regulations which must be followed by the corporation if loan and grant approval is made by the FHA, and include such things as requiring that water must be offered to everyone in the rural community to be served by the system, and that all must have an opportunity to refuse such service if it is not desired. Certain conditions concern interim operating financing—while construction is underway; proper administration records and facilities; non-discrimination; and approval by the FHA of all construction contracts. Also, approval from the Texas Water Quality Board and State Department of Health must be obtained.

The entire project has been divided into four phases, with approval by the

FHA of the applications for grants and loans almost assured, for two phases, or about half the project, once all conditions are met. The money is available, it is understood, but all requirements must be met by April 15 in order to "tie down" the funds. A loan of approximately \$337,000, and a grant of about \$307,000 would finance the first two phases, it was stated. Additional applications must be made for loans and grants to finance the second half of the project.

LaDell Davis, chairman of the board of directors, said Tuesday night notices of the April 7 meeting will be mailed to the membership of the corporation immediately, in order to meet the 10-day notification requirement.

Winn's Store Under Construction, Completion In June Is Expected

Construction has been underway several days on a new building on West Broadway, near Piggly Wiggly, which will house Winn's Variety Store when finished.

Winn's presently is located on North Main Street.

Construction on the new building is expected to be completed in June, Richard Davis, local store manager, said.

The building will contain about 11,000 square feet of merchandise display space, and stockroom area. This is more than three times as much space as is available in the present location, Davis said.

The variety store was opened in Winters by Marvin York in 1928. Martin Middlebrook was manager, and

continued to manage the store when it became a part of the Winn's chain in 1949. Middlebrook retired as manager in 1972, and Richard Davis was named manager.

COCONUTTY COOKIES

- 24 cookies
- 6 slices enriched day-old bread
- 1 1/2 cups chopped nuts
- 1 can (3 1/2 oz.) flaked coconut
- 1 can (14 oz.) sweetened condensed milk
1. Preheat oven to 375 degrees.
2. Grease large baking sheet.
3. Trim crusts from bread; cut each piece lengthwise into quarters.
4. Mix together nuts and coconut.
5. Dip bread sticks in sweetened condensed milk, then roll in coconut mixture.
6. Place on greased baking sheet and bake in preheated oven 10 to 12 minutes, or until lightly browned.
7. Remove immediately from baking sheet and cool on wire racks.

What's Your Potato I.Q.?

The survival power of the potato is something of a legend. Praised and condemned alternately, the potato's natural goodness has just naturally made it a proper food for rich or poor, for basic cooking and haute cuisine.

If you think you know all about the potato, here's a small chance to confirm your knowledgeability or to expand it. If you score 10 points per question, and correctly answer 9, go to the head of the class. Anything less would indicate you need to become better acquainted with this important food. So, true or false...

1. When buying potatoes, it is important to select those that are firm, well shaped, and smooth.
2. Potatoes are best stored in the refrigerator.
3. If potatoes are stored at high temperatures-70 to 80 degrees-they should be used within a week.
4. Each person in the United States eats an average of about 50 pounds of potatoes a year.
5. Almost 50 percent of the U.S. potato crop is used in processed potatoes.
6. The best way to bake a potato is to wrap it tightly in foil.
7. Loss of nutrients in cooking potatoes can be prevented by using plenty of salt.
8. To protect the whiteness of potatoes, once peeled, soak them in a bowl of cold water.

9. Peeled potatoes turn dark if not cooked right away.
10. Potatoes are fattening and should not be eaten by those interested in losing weight.
