HOME TOWN

How did a brass watch fob, minted in the late 19th Century, and advertising a horse and mule auction company in Grand Island, Nebraska, find its way to Winters, Texas, then apparently become lost and plowed up in a yard many years later.?

Was it dropped by a mule skinner on a wagon train winding through the pre-Winters countryside, or by a horse-jockey (horse trader) leading or driving his animals through the area?

For that matter, those under 35 might ask, just what is a "watch fob"?' Webster can take care of that.

The watch fob referred to is one found when the yard of Mrs. W.W. King, on Murray Street, was plowed up. It is a brass medallion, with a slot through which a strap was run to fasten it to a pocket watch. On the front side are shown two big draft horses, in relief; on the back or opposite side, around the edge, is the legend, "Grand Island Horse & Mule Co., Grand Island Neb." In the center is "Auction Every Monday and Tuesday."

The watch fob is nicked up a bit, and shows some wear, and looks as if a watch chain had connected it to the

Mrs. Jon McNeill of Wingate, daughter of Mrs. King, sent an inquiry to the Grand Island Chamber of Commerce, who forwarded her letter to the "Land of the Prairie Pioneer Stuhr Museum," in Grand Island. The museum replied, "The item described in your letter is a brass watch fob, given away by the Grand Island Horse and Mule Company as promotion during the late 1800's and early 1900's. This auction house has been in existence since the 1880's, and still does business under the name of Third City Livestock Auction. . .'

"While we have examples of these watch fobs in our collection, there is no way we can provide you with a date of manufacture. The later ones (1910-1930) were dated below the horses . . . It would be interesting to know how this watch fob reached Texas."

The watch fob found in Winters has no date below the horses, so it apparently was made about the turn of the century.



Plans Being Finalized for 85th Jamboree



(Ed. Note: Winters will celebrate the 85th anniversary of the founding of the town June 19, 21 and 22. Of interest to those looking forward to the celebration are the following excerpts from the book by Charlsie Poe, "Runnels is My County" (Naylor). Additional articles will be published in future issues of The Enterprise.

January 12, 1880: A group of Runnels citizens presented a petition signed by 158 legal voters to the commissioners court of Coleman on this date expressing a desire that Runnels County be organized. Prior to that time

Runnels continued to be attached to Coleman County for judicial purposes.

H.D. Pearce, assisted by W.N. (Newt) Copeland, rode horseback over the county to obtain signatures for the petition. The court ordered that Runnels be organized. divided, and laid off into four

1880, an election in each precinct for the county location on Elm Creek was

was held. The first record of a commissioner's court meeting was a called meeting the tenth of March, 1880, the meeting being held at Walt-

On March 12, 1880, the commissioner's court author ized the county judge to procure from George Barnard and Company the first supplies for use by the county. It was also ordered that the county judge give notice of an election to be held April 14, 1880, to select the county seat of Runnels County. Mr. J.B. Cotton's stone house at Walthall was used as a temporary courthouse until one could be

On April 14, 1880, two places were nominated for the county seat: Maverick, on the Colorado River in the Osgood Survey and a location in the Willett Homes Survey and Henry Garnes Survey on Elm Creek, where ten or twelve families had clustered. There were fifty-nine On Monday, February 1, votes counted; twenty-nine





KRUEGER'S

KOLUMN

By CONG. BOB KRUEGER 21st Texas District

I had the opportunity to be back in the district again over the weekend, to visit the Hill Country Livestock Raisers, to meet with people in town meetings in Kerrville and Junction, and to participate in ceremonies at the Nimitz Center in Fredericksburg.

Travelling with me was Dr. Manfred Abelein, who for ten years has been a member of the German Parliament, and who may very well be the next Foreign Secretay in Germany. One of the questions he was asked, while in Texas, was whether he considered that America's withdrawal from South Vietnam would cause our allies to question our reliability. He said, "No." People in Germany and Europe recognize that fighting a guerrilla war in Southeast Asia is very differnet from the joint defense efforts of Europe and America opposing Commuance in the western world.

Dr. Abelein also pointed out that it is time, as I am sure we would all agree, that other countries take their full share of the defense burden. NATO members cannot defend themselves against the threat of Russian power alone. But they can be expected to give the same portion of their gross national product to defense that the United States does. This, he suggested, might be a good stipulation for the U.S.A. to expect of its NATO allies, and I agree.

There will be efforts in the future to reduce our defense expenditures, and it is certainly important that we spend our money wisely, but it would be short-sighted to attempt drastic cuts in our defense budget. We must maintain a strong national defense, while expecting our allies to assume their proper share of defense responsibilities. Even in times of economic difficulty, we will have to retain both military and economic strength. The two are complementary, and essential for a nation that the world continues to look to for leadership and inspiration.

Girl Scouts "Skills Day"


