HOME TOWN

Talk

How did a brass watch fob, minted in the late 19th Century, and advertising a horse and mule auction company in Grand Island, Nebraska, find its way to Winters, Texas, then apparently become lost and plowed up in a yard many years later?

Was it dropped by a mule skinner on a wagon train winding through the pre-Winters countryside, or by a horse-jockey (horse trader) leading or driving his animals through the area?

For that matter, those under 35 might ask, just what is a "watch fob"? Webster can take care of that.

The watch fob referred to is one found when the yard of Mrs. W.W. King, on Murray Street, was plowed up. It is a brass medallion, with a slot through which a strap was run to fasten it to a pocket watch. On the front side are shown two big draft horses, in relief; on the back or opposite side, around the edge, is the legend, "Grand Island Horse & Mule Co., Grand Island Neb." In the center is "Auction Every Monday and Tuesday."

The watch fob is nicked up a bit, and shows some wear, and looks as if a watch chain had connected it to the watch.

Mrs. Jon McNeill of Wingate, daughter of Mrs. King, sent an inquiry to the Grand Island Chamber of Commerce, who forwarded her letter to the "Land of the Prairie Pioneer Stuhl Museum," in Grand Island. The museum replied, "The item described in your letter is a brass watch fob, given away by the Grand Island Horse and Mule Company as promotion during the late 1800's and early 1900's. This auction house has been in existence since the 1880's, and still does business under the name of Third City Livestock Auction."

"While we have examples of these watch fobs in our collection, there is no way we can provide you with a date of manufacture. The later ones (1910-1930) were dated below the horses. . . It would be interesting to know how this watch fob reached Texas."

The watch fob found in Winters has no date below the horses, so it apparently was made about the turn of the century.

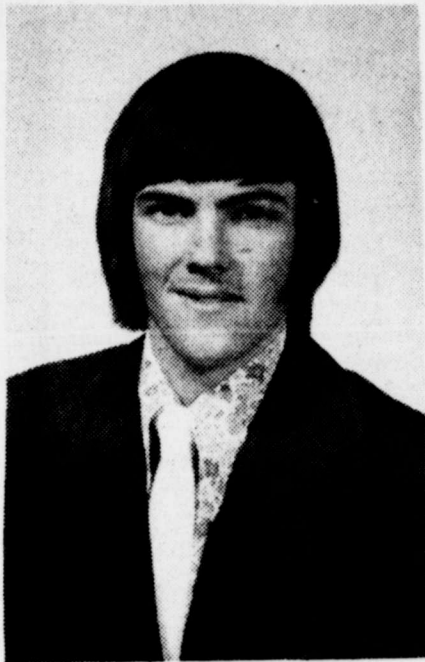
HONOR STUDENTS OF '75

School Bands' Music Festival On Tuesday

The seventh annual spring Music Festival will be presented by the Winters High School Blizzard Band and the Junior High Breeze Band, next Tuesday, May 13, in the high school gymnasium. The program will begin at

Blizzard Band To Compete In Flags Festival

The Winters High School band has been accepted to participate in the twelfth annual Six Flags Over Texas Band Festival. Competition will be May 8, 9, and 10 in Arlington.

Band director Kirke McKenzie said 125 band members will go to Six Flags for the Festival.

More than fifty bands will compete for honors and recognition during the three days of activities. Trophies will be awarded to the top group in each of five classifications: Junior High, Class A, Class AA, Class AAA, and Class AAAA.

Judges for the 1975 festival are Dr. Karl Hovik, professor of music and director of bands at the University of Northern Iowa; Al G. Wright, director of bands at Purdue University; and Lieutenant Colonel Clifford O. Hunt, internationally-known lecturer and guest conductor at Canadian festivals and American university summer schools of music.

To be eligible for competition, bands must have won a first division rating at their state contest during the past year, or a first division rating in the Six Flags Over Texas band festival during the past two years.

Following the festival activities, band members will spend two days enjoying the rides and attractions at Six Flags Over Texas.

Council Passes Tax Ordinance

Winters City Council Monday night passed on first reading the proposed ordinance which will increase property taxes for the city, fixing the rate at \$1.20 per \$100 valuation, and setting percentage of true value at 75 percent for 1975.

Council previously had approved the proposal, and passage of the ordinance this week officially fixed the rate. Mayor Homer Hodge said this increase would be about 20 percent "across the

board."

This is the first tax increase for the City of Winters since 1961, it was pointed out.

In other business, the council approved a proposal to advertise for bids to purchase a new backhoe for the water department.

Jerry Horton was employed by the city, and will divide his time between the cemeteries, and other departments as a multi-service employee.

Hartman and Alsdorf tied with 70s for the medalist honors.

There were 12 teams entered in the tournament, with 48 golfers.

One hundred and seventy-eight children from low-income families are being served through an Office of Human Development grant that Governor Dolph Briscoe announced Friday.

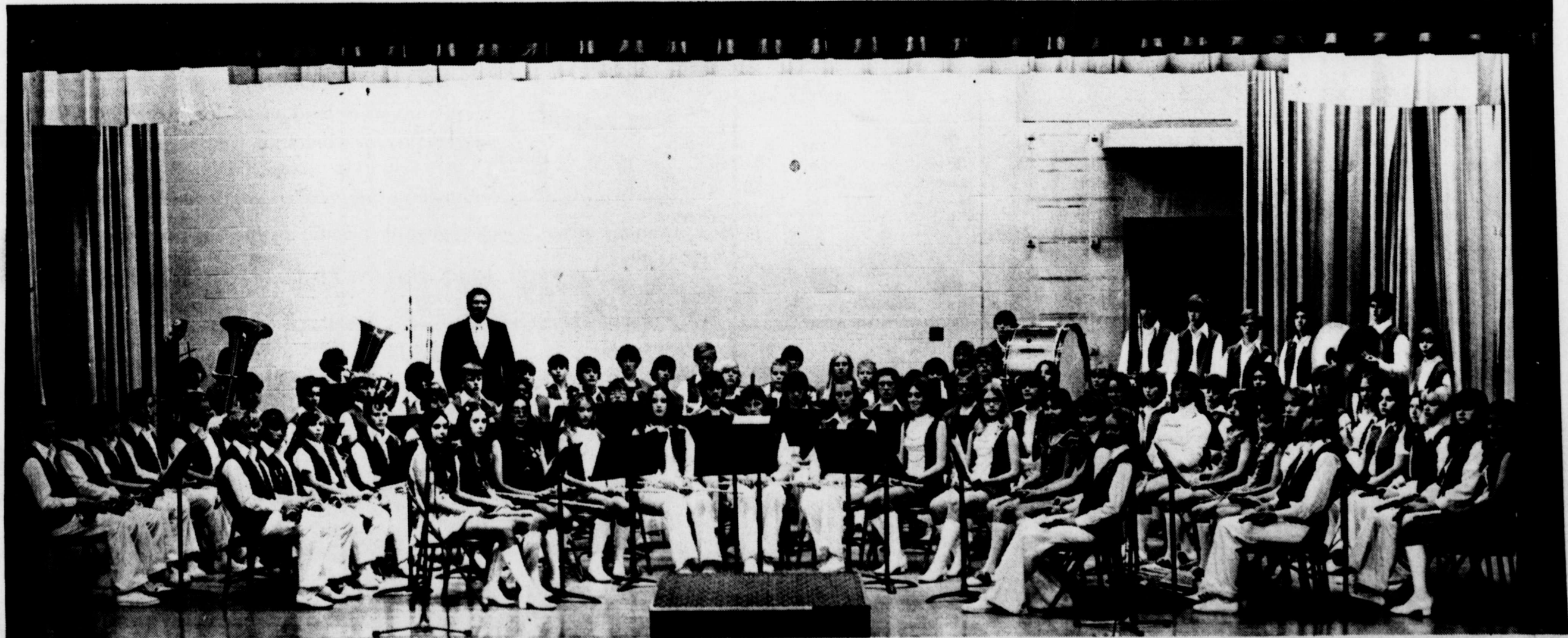
The grant is to Central Texas Opportunities, Inc., in Coleman, for \$177,207 in new federal funds and \$97

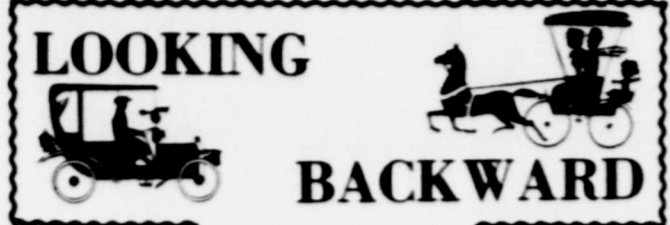

(Ed. Note: Winters will celebrate the 85th anniversary of the founding of the town June 19, 21 and 22. Of interest to those looking forward to the celebration are the following excerpts from the book by Charisse Poe, "Rannels is My County" (Naylor). Additional articles will be published in future issues of The Enterprise.)

January 12, 1880: A group of Rannels citizens presented a petition signed by 158 legal voters to the commissioners court of Coleman on this date expressing a desire that Rannels County be organized. Prior to that time Rannels continued to be attached to Coleman County for judicial purposes.

H.D. Pearce, assisted by W.N. (Newt) Copeland, rode horseback over the county to obtain signatures for the petition. The court ordered that Rannels be organized, divided, and laid off into four precincts.

On Monday, February 1, 1880, an election in each precinct for the county officials and commissioners

was held. The first record of a commissioner's court meeting was a called meeting the tenth of March, 1880, the meeting being held at Walthall.

On March 12, 1880, the commissioner's court authorized the county judge to procure from George Barnard and Company the first supplies for use by the county. It was also ordered that the county judge give notice of an election to be held April 14, 1880, to select the county seat of Rannels County. Mr. J.B. Cotton's stone house at Walthall was used as a temporary courthouse until one could be selected.

On April 14, 1880, two places were nominated for the county seat: Maverick, on the Colorado River in the Osgood Survey and a location in the Willett Homes Survey and Henry Garnes Survey on Elm Creek, where ten or twelve families had clustered. There were fifty-nine votes counted; twenty-nine for Maverick and thirty for a location on Elm Creek was declared elected.

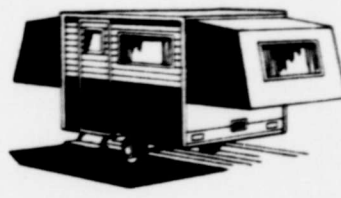

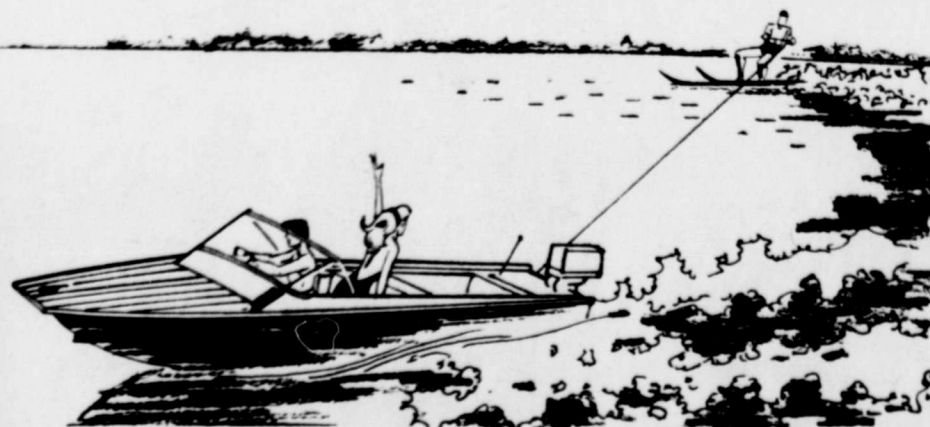

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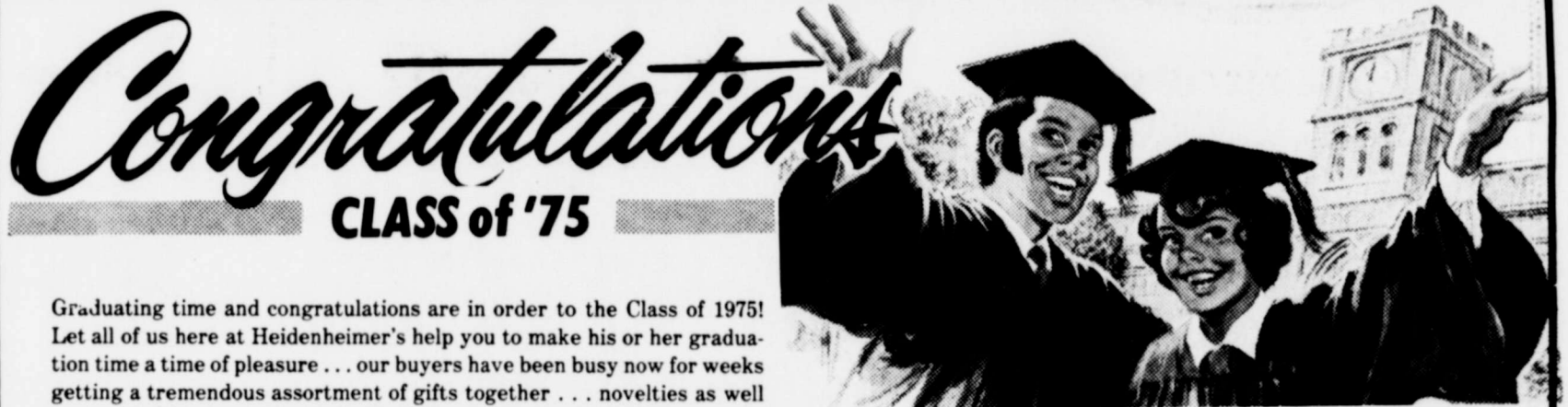

in carryover funds for Head Start programs. The grant includes \$123,123 in new federal funds and \$97 in carryover funds for a part-day Head Start program and \$54,084 in new federal funds for a full-day Head Start program. Funded under Title V of the Head Start, Economic Opportunity, and Community Partnership Act of 1974, the grant is effective retroactively from May 1, 1975, through April 30, 1976.

According to Mike Zuniga, executive director of Central Texas Opportunities, Inc., the part-day Head Start program is serving 120 children through three centers offering six classes for five hours a day, five days a week for September through May. The full-day Head Start program is

servicing 58 children through three centers offering three classes, nine hours a day, five days a week from September 1975, through May 1976.

Primary goals for the Head Start program include improving children's health by proper medical and dental care; building self-confidence, self-expression and self-discipline; improving the children's ability to think, reason, and speak more clearly; increasing ability to get along with other children; removing language difficulties; correcting nutritional deficiencies, and, special emphasis in meeting physical and mental needs of the handicapped children.

Grant processing for the state was performed by the Texas Department of Community Affairs' Texas Office of Economic Opportunity.

Junior Scout contests were string burning, compass walk and bandaging relay. Anna Vera and Terri Scates won ribbons for their second place finish in string burning.

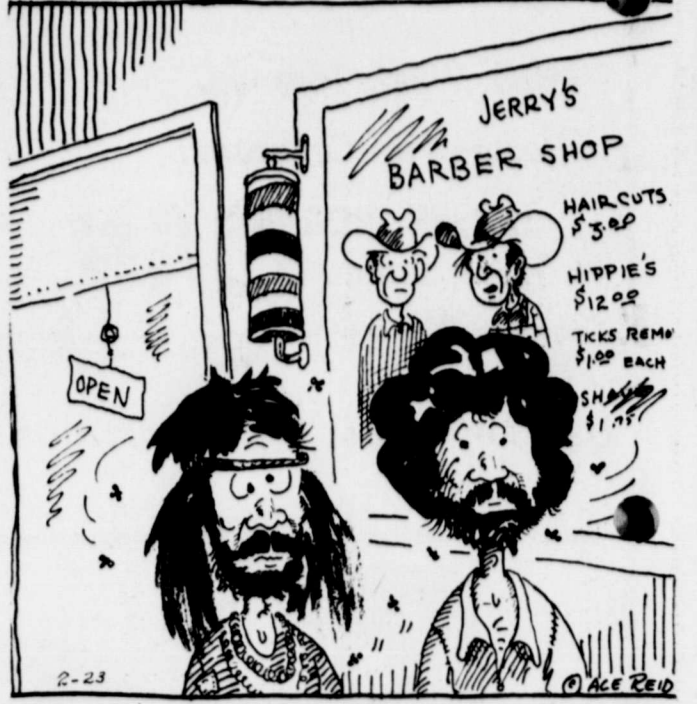
Cadette Scout contests were tent pitching, table lashing and stretcher relay. Dawn Miller, Lisa Roznov-

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KRUEGER'S KOLUMN

21st Texas District

I had the opportunity to be back in the district again over the weekend, to visit the Hill Country Livestock Raisers, to meet with people in town meetings in Kerrville and Junction, and to participate in ceremonies at the Nimitz Center in Fredericksburg.

Traveling with me was Dr. Manfred Abelein, who for ten years has been a member of the German Parliament, and who may very well be the next Foreign Secretary in Germany. One of the questions he was asked, while in Texas, was whether he considered that America's withdrawal from South Vietnam would cause our allies to question our reliability. He said, "No." People in Ger-

many and Europe recognize that fighting a guerrilla war in Southeast Asia is very different from the joint defense efforts of Europe and America opposing Communist expansion and dominance in the western world.

Dr. Abelein also pointed out that it is time, as I am sure we would all agree, that other countries take their full share of the defense burden. NATO members cannot defend themselves against the threat of Russian power alone. But they can be expected to give the same portion of their gross national product to defense that the United States does. This, he suggested, might be a good stipulation for the U.S.A. to expect of its NATO allies, and I agree.

There will be efforts in the future to reduce our defense expenditures, and it is certainly important that we spend our money wisely, but it would be short-sighted to attempt drastic cuts in our defense budget. We must maintain a strong national defense, while expecting our allies to assume their proper share of defense responsibilities. Even in times of economic difficulty, we will have to retain both military and economic strength. The two are complementary, and essential for a nation that the world continues to look to for leadership and inspiration.
