Winters churches will observe Sunday, May 18, as "Festival of Faith Sunday," with special services in some instances, and recognition observances.

Mayor Homer Hodge has proclaimed this particular Sunday as "Festival of Faith Sunday," stating, "Our country was founded upon Christian principles of equality, love, and justice, and our nation is 'One Nation Under God,' and every person has the right and privilege to worship the Almighty God as he wishes."

He received bachelor of music and master of music education degrees from the University of Montana, and the Doctor of Philosophy from Indiana University. In addition, he is an Associate of the American Guild of Organists.

Roberts have been in the U.S. several weeks, and he has been holding a series of meetings in Temple and other Central Texas cities. Two years ago, the Rev. Mr. Roberts was exchange minister for the Winters United Methodist Church, performing all duties of the church pastor, while the Rev. Bob Sanders, then pastor, served the Rev. Roberts' congregation in Kingshall Methodist Church, Southhall, England.

## Rural Development Discussed

Members of the State USDA Rural Development Committee, meeting Tuesday of last week heard members of the Runnels County USDA Rural Development Committee Program describe varied and successful programs undertaken in the county for several years.

General chairman of the meeting was Dr. John E. Hutchison, director of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. He was assisted during the day by C.T. Parker, Runnels County agent; Neuman Smith, Runnels County farmer-rancher and businessman who is chairman of the Runnels County Program Building Committee; Tommy Hill, Runnels County FHA supervisor; and Harvey Kahlden, district conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service.

Following a welcome to visitors from throughout the state by John Purifoy, Runnels County judge, Dr. Hutchison

prefaced the talks on the agenda by explaining the Rural Development Committee's initial organization and its purposes and aims.

"In the Extension Service we serve all but two counties in the State of Texas, with a little over 1,000 staff members including our home economics agents as well as agriculture agents, and I mention this to indicate the level of resources we have available to work with the citizens of each county in the process of rural development. And, there can be no doubt in my mind but that the strength of our nation is closely associated with maintaining a strong and viable economy in the rural areas as well as in the urban areas," he declared.

The TAES director said he believes we are beginning to see a little bit of a reversal in the movement of rural people to urban areas. "You might be interested in knowing there has been a

slight reduction in the size of farms in Texas in the last 10 years, and a slight increase in the number of farmers during the last census (5-year) period, and this is encouraging to me."

W.R. Gray Jr., county executive director of the Runnels County ASCS Committee, told the group one of the biggest problems the county had had in the past is "salt water," which began back in the 1920's. Nitrate penetrations in water, plant insects, predators, undesirable range plants and trees, such as mesquite, have also plagued farmers, ranchers and others; but the county is "well diversified" and has made considerable progress and is continuing in this direction and in other areas through the Rural Development Committee, and cooperation of the citizens.

James Washington, chairman of the Committee for Better Living, described problems of obtaining U.S. Postal service and street problems, pointing out that his committee is committed to work with everyone for the betterment of living in the community.

Following lunch at Lowake, other speakers on the program included Ladell Davis, North Runnels Rural Water Supply; and Harvey Droll, Millersview-Doole Water Supply, members of the Runnels County Water Supply Corporation; Charles Hambrick, former Ballinger mayor; Arthur Eggemeyer, and Walter Spill, chairman of the Runnels County ASC Committee.

## BACKWARD

February 20, 1901: Thomas W. Murray became postmaster of Winters. Runnels County on this date succeeding Robert L. Hulsey who had bought the store and post office from McDonald Townsend. The office was moved across the street.

A general merchandise store was built at the southwest corner of Main and Dale streets by Frederick Platte in 1889. The post office was established in a corner of the store March 7, 1891, and Platte served as postmaster until September 17, 1891, when he sold it to McDonald Townsend.

The post office was a seven by ten foot enclosure, boxed up waist high and the entrance was through a small window facing north. A homemade desk and a few wooden mail

boxes, with no front, completed the furnishings.

In addition to the post office, the general store housed groceries, plow tools, harness, and dry goods consisting mostly of bolts of cloth and thread. Barrels of syrup and sides of salt pork were kept in a shed room on the back.

A blacksmith shop was added to the general store in 1891 and run by a Mr. Higdon. In January of that year, the first mail was carried from Ballinger to Abilene by Land Cade in a two horse hack. Horses were changed at Winters and Guion, and the return trip was made in the afternoon. Prior to this time people had to make trips by buggy or wagon to the courthouse at Runnels City for their mail.



Refreshments will be served at the home of Mrs. Barr.


