Hearing Set To Discuss Paving Assessments

It had been expected and reported that paving contractors would be in Winters to begin paving city streets Monday of this week, but because of weather conditions, and legal technicalities involved, this work will not begin before July 7. City hall sources said this week.

Some of the contractor's equipment already is here, it was stated, but work being done is on private parking lots and driveways.

To Convention

Winters City Council Monday night approved sending four firemen to the state firemen's convention, to be held in Houston later this month.

Council also approved sending three members of the Winters Volunteer Fire Department to the A&M University firemen's training school.

Plans In For Rural Water

The board of directors of North Runnels Rural Water Supply Corporation last Friday night gave approval to engineers' final working plans for the first phase of the proposed system, and began planning for the surveying for easements and rights-of-way needed for the project.

LaDell Davis, president of the non-profit corporation, said Monday that property owners in the areas where the water distribution lines will be laid will be contacted within the next 30 to 60 days regarding easements and rights-of-way.

The project, which calls for providing water through a distribution

system to most rural areas of North Runnels, has received approval from the Framers Home Administration for loans and grants. The corporation will receive a grant of \$307,000 and a long-term loan for \$337,600, for about half the project. Applications are being prepared for a loan and grant for the rest of the large project.

Billy Jacobs, representing the engineering firm of Yeatts & Decker of Abilene, met with the corporation's board of directors last Friday night, and presented the final working plans for half the first phase. The rest of the plans for this phase will be completed within about 30 days, Davis said.

Cable TV Expected Ready In October

Winters television viewers are expected to have cable television by October, it was announced this week, as further plans are being made by Texas Cablevision of San Angelo, the company which has a franchise from the City of Winters to install and

operate the service.

It was reported that land upon which the tower will be located has already been obtained, across FM 53 north of the North Runnels Hospital. Construction on the tower is expected to begin within a short time.

85th Jamboree Will Be For Young, Too

Celebrating a town's 85th birthday, and looking backward to the "olden days" are not just for the older adults. They're for the younger set, too.

Winters' 85th Jamboree, scheduled for June 19, 20 and 21, promises to be of particular interest to school age young people, as many activities are being planned for their participation. Bill Graves, head of the Chamber of Commerce steering committee for the celebration, has announced.

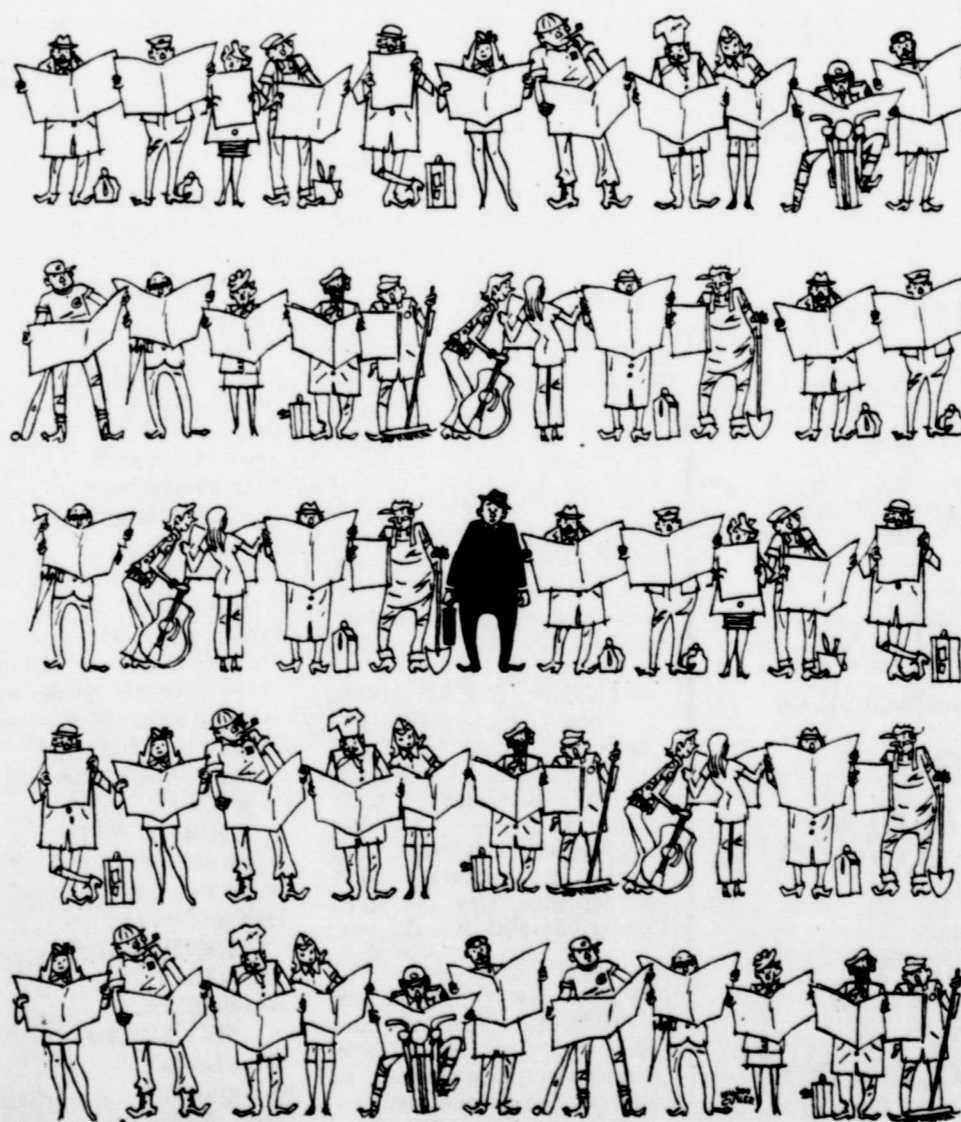

LEGAL NOTICE

AN ORDINANCE DETERMINING THE NECESSITY FOR, AND ORDERING THE IMPROVEMENT OF SUNDRY STREETS IN THE CITY OF WINTERS AND PROVIDING FOR PAYMENT OF THE COST OF SUCH IMPROVEMENTS.

THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF WINTERS HEREBY ORDAINS:

1. It is necessary that the hereinbelow mentioned portions of said streets in said City be improved as herein provided.

2. That the portion of streets hereinafter described be improved by excavating, raising, grading and filling and paving with a base of caliche having a topping of asphalt and stone, all in accordance with plans and specifications prepared by the City of Winters, Texas, said portions of streets being described as the following units:

a. Magnolia Street—North and South from Dale to Quana.

b. Majestic Street—East and West from Arlington to Frisco Street.

c. Broadway Street—East and West from Main to Church Street.

d. Parsonage Street—East and West from Murray to Rogers.

e. Van Ness—East and West from Rogers to Cryer.

f. Alvera Street—North and South from Van Ness to Truitt.

g. Bowen Street—East and West from Rogers to Cryer.

h. Farrar Street—North and South from Woods to Tinkle.

i. Copeland Street—East and West from Main to Heights Ave.

j. Alley—East and West from Copeland to Pierce Street.

k. Melwood—North and South from Dale to Parsonage.

l. West Commerce—East and West from Magnolia to Frisco.

m. Rogers Street from Dale to Alley between Vancil and Van Ness.

n. Michaelis Alley

o. Walnut Street from Rogers to Concho.

3. Each of the foregoing descriptive paragraphs being called units and shall be so known herein. Each unit herein ordered improved and paved shall be and constitute a separate and independent unit of improvement, and the assessments herein provided for shall be made for the improvements in each unit according to the benefits arising from the improvements in that unit, and independent of the costs and benefits arising from the improvements in any other unit.

4. It is further ordained and ordered that any ordinance, rule or regulation requiring or providing for competitive bids, and the same is hereby waived, dispensed with and suspended for the purpose of improvements herein ordered and for the purpose of the contract with the City of Winters.

5. The costs of the improvements in each unit shall be paid as follows:

(a) All of the costs of improving and paving each unit shall be ascertained by the City of Winters and one-tenth thereof paid by the City of Winters from General Funds and the remaining nine-tenths paid by the abutting property owners proportionately according to the unequal front foot of property adjacent to said improvements.

(b) The amounts payable by the abutting property and the owners thereof shall be assessed against such abutting property and against the real and true owners thereof, and shall be a first and prior lien upon the property upon which assessments are levied, and a personal liability of the owners of said property, and shall be payable as follows:

1. When the improvements are completed on a particular unit and the City of Winters has accepted said improvements, the sum assessed against property abutting upon such completed unit and the owners thereof shall become due and payable, subject to allowance for

special installment payout by specific individual approval of the City Council, and provided further that if default be made in the payment of any assessment as the same matures and it becomes necessary to foreclose the lien securing the payment of such assessment a reasonable attorney's fee, in addition to interest and expense of collection, shall be included in the judgment of foreclosure in favor of said City, its successors and assigns, but it is expressly provided that no assessment shall in any case be made against any property or the owner thereof, in excess of the special benefits of such property and its owners in the enhanced value thereof by means of said improvements in the unit upon which the particular property abutts as ascertained at the hearing provided by law in force in the City, nor shall any assessment be made in any case until after notice and hearing provided by law.

2. The assessments against the respective lots and parcels of property and the owners thereof shall be evidenced by certificates of special assessment which shall be executed in the name of the City by the Mayor and City Secretary, which certificates shall be issued by said City of Winters, shall give the terms and time of payment, the amount of the assessment, the description of the property, and the name of the owner, as far as known, and shall contain such other recitals as may be pertinent thereto, and shall further recite substantially that the proceeding with reference to the making of such improvements have been regularly had in compliance with law, and that all prerequisites to the fixing of the assessment lien against the property described in said certificates and the personal liability of the owners thereof have been regularly had, and performed, and such recitals shall be prima facie evidence of the matters so recited, and no further proof thereof shall be required in any court, and the said certificates shall provide substantially that if default shall be made in the payment of any assessment and the same is collected by legal proceedings a reasonable attorney's fee and all costs of collection so incurred shall be included and the same shall be over and above the amount of such assessment, all of which, as well as the principal and interest on the assessment, shall be a first and prior lien against the property, superior to all other liens and claims, except state, county, school district and city ad valorem taxes. No error or mistake in naming any owner, or in describing the property, or in any matter or thing, shall invalidate any assessment, or any certificate issued in evidence thereof, and the omission of improvements on any particular unit or in front of any property exempt by law from the lien of special assessment for street improvements shall not invalidate any assessment levied. The certificates referred to need not contain recitals in exactly the words provided for, but the substance thereof shall suffice, and they may contain other and additional recitals pertinent thereto, and may be issued at any time after the hearing provided by law has been held, either before, during or after the completion of such improvements.

3. In making assessments, if the name of any owner be unknown, it shall be sufficient to so state the fact, and if any property be owned by an estate or by any firm or corporation, it shall be sufficient to so state, and it shall not be necessary to give the correct name of any owner, but the real and true owner of the property mentioned shall be liable and the assessment against the property shall be valid, whether or not such owner be named.

4. The improvements provided for shall be made and constructed and assessments shall be levied, hearing shall be had and notice given, and all proceedings taken and had in accordance with and under the terms of the powers and provisions of the City of Winters and 1105 b, Vernon's Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas.

At produce counters, prices on fresh corn are trending downward as supplies increase. Other economical vegetable buys include cabbage, carrots, potatoes, squash and cooking greens.

Prepare turkey; combine all ingredients to make Bar-B-Q sauce. Place turkey in center of baking pan. Loosen skin of turkey with handle of long spoon. Spoon sauce underneath skin. Brush outside with sauce. Cover turkey with foil. Roast at 450 degrees for 3 to 3 1/2 hours or until drumstick feels soft to touch. Baste occasionally with sauce. Serves 25.

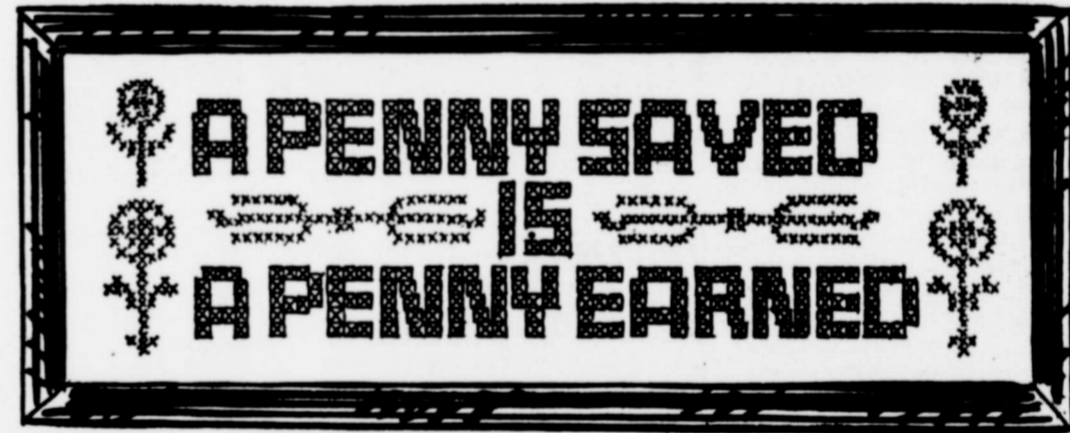

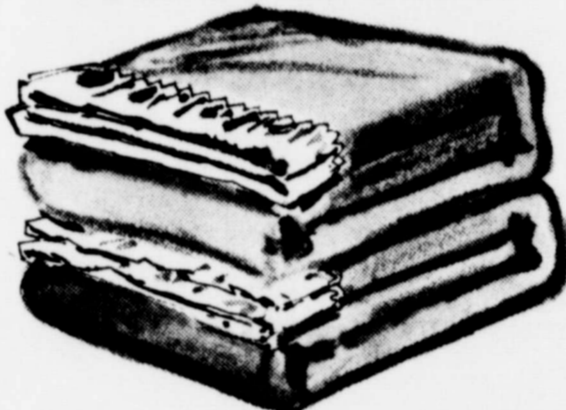

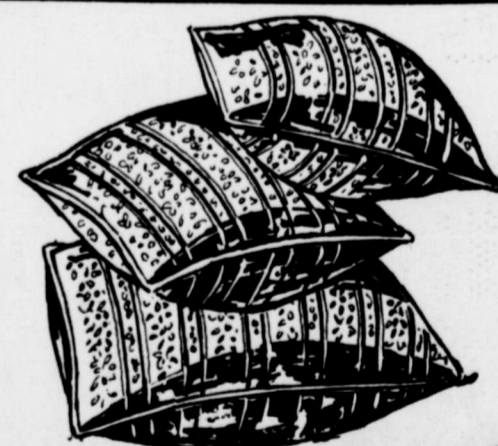
