Winters State Bank Sponsors T'vision Series

The Winters State Bank, through its membership in the American Bankers Association (ABA), will co-sponsor a special series of NBC TODAY shows in tribute to the U. S. Bicentennial, it was announced today by Woodrow F. Watts, President.

To be produced by the NBC television news department, the TODAY show Bicentennial Program series began on July 4, 1975, and continues each Friday for 52 weeks.

Each state and the District of Columbia will be the subject of a two-hour TODAY program during the year preceding the 200th anniversary of the nation. There will also be a single telecast covering U. S. territories.

The first program of the series originated from Washington, D. C., and will serve to promote the entire series. The 50 states will then be saluted in the reverse order of their admission to the Union, beginning with Alaska and Hawaii and concluding with the 13 original colonies.

The final program on Friday, July 2, 1976, will salute one of the colonies with the richest early American history.

The ABA is the national association of the banking industry. Its membership includes nearly 14,000 banks, 96 per cent of the nation's total.

Washington, D. C., July 4, 1975; Hawaii, July 11, 1975; Alaska, July 18, 1975; Wyoming July 25, 1975.

Runnels SWCD Won Honors For Conservation

The Runnels Soil & Water Conservation District recently won runner-up honors in the 28th annual Goodyear Conservation Awards program, in the southwest area of Texas.

DeWitt County, Middle Clear Ford and Rio Blanco soil and water conservation districts won the top honors in the annual program.

Plaques will be presented to the winning districts and to the runners-up at the annual meeting of the Association of Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts. The outstanding cooperators with all participating districts also will be honored. C. O. Richards was named the outstanding cooperator for the Runnels SWCD.

District board members are Cone J. Robinson of Norton, Douglas Cole of Winters, Sam Faubion of Crews and Otto Gottschalk of Ballinger. There is one vacancy on the board.

In previous contests, Runnels District was a first-place winner in 1961, 1962 and 1968.

To Charter Buses To Billy Graham Crusade, Lubbock

Arrangements are being made to charter buses for Winters area residents who wish to attend the service Sunday, August 31, of the West Texas Billy Graham Crusade, to be held in Jones Stadium of Texas Tech University, Lubbock. This charter bus project is being sponsored by the Winters Ministerial Alliance.

The Rev. Mel Swoyer, pastor of St. John's Lutheran Church, and president of the Winters Ministerial Alliance, said that "Seats on the chartered buses will cost \$7 per person, and we expect to have at least two buses going to the crusade."

Those wishing to ride one of these buses may contact the Rev. Swoyer, or the Rev. David Crook, pastor of the First Baptist Church.

Plans are for the buses to leave the First Baptist Church at 3 p.m. on August 31 and return by 1 a.m. the following morning.

Some financial assistance is available, the Rev. Swoyer said, specially to pay the bus costs for any senior citizen wishing to attend the crusade.

Rural Water Easements Being Signed

"Dirt-turning time" is "just around the corner" for the long-awaited water distribution system which will supply water to most of North Runnels rural areas, LaDell Davis, chairman of North Runnels Rural Water Supply Corporation, said this week.

Right-of-way easements for construction of the distribution pipeline are being obtained in regular order, Davis said, and this should be completed within a few days. Because this phase of the project came during the harvest time, he said, completion has been delayed to some extent, but he expects contact work to be increased with the bulk of the small grain harvest out of the way.

Also, Davis said, all surveys for Phase I of the project should be completed by week's end. These surveys will determine exact location of the distribution lines, he said. Final engineers' plans should be received by July 20, Davis said.

When all easements for Phase I of the two-part project have been obtained, the chairman said, the board will be in a position to call for bids on construction of the pipeline system. Plans are to build at least two, and possibly three, storage tanks on the system; one of these tanks is included in Phase I of the project, and probably will be located immediately south of Winters on a site as yet unannounced.

Farmers Home Administration loans and grants have been approved for Phase I of the rural water distribution project, as announced some time ago. The corporation will receive a grant of \$307,000 and a long-term loan for \$337,600 for this first part of the project. Applications are being prepared for a loan and grant for the rest of the large project.

Plans are to purchase water from the City of Winters, and possibly from the City of Ballinger, if needed, it has been said.

14% of Runnels Residents Drawing Food Stamps

Although figures for current months are not available, indications are that close to 14 percent of the people of Runnels County are receiving USDA food stamps, in one category or another.

The latest figures available are for the month of January, which has been described as a "low employment" month for the county, show that 1,735 persons in the county are receiving

food stamp benefits. County population is pegged at 12,108.

County households represented are, 32 for Public Assistance (Welfare) rolls, representing 161 persons; and 471 households receiving non-public assistance, representing 1,574 persons. This was 14 percent of the county's population in January.

According to the Food Stamp Program office at Ballinger, approximately 187 households in the Winters area are receiving food stamps, or approximately 40 percent of the total

Runnels County number.

This is "big money," as indicated by the total monetary value of food stamp coupons issued during January, 1975: \$59,865.00. Of this total, food stamp recipients paid \$22,197, or 38 percent of the total monetary value, and received \$37,668, or 62 percent of the value, in coupons.

Figures available are for January, 1975, described as a "low employment" month. However, the total for current is a little lower, it was stated.

The purchase price of food stamps is determined by the total income of the families, "verified in writing, and by the amount of paid allowable expenses." Purchase price (of the food

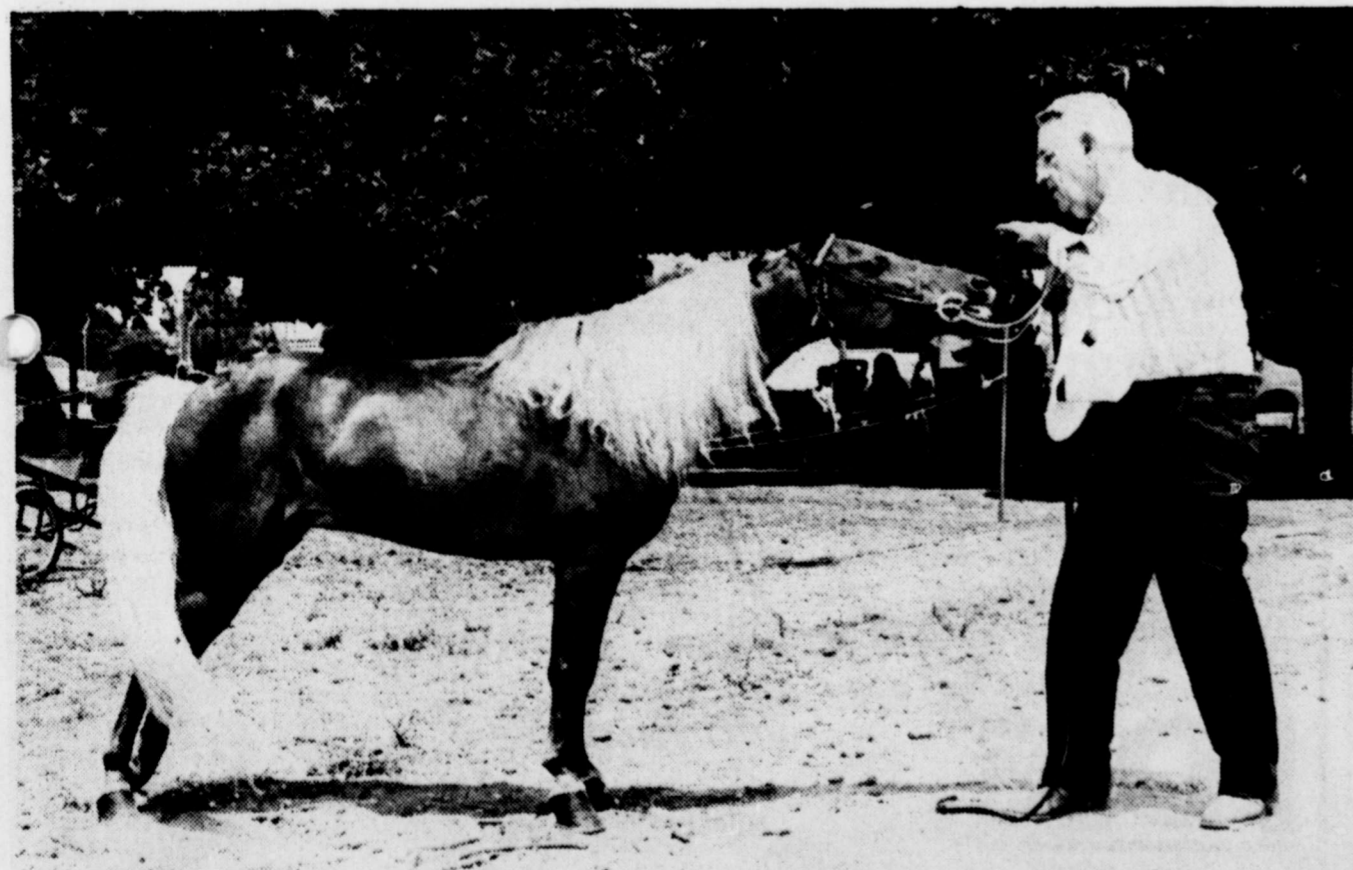

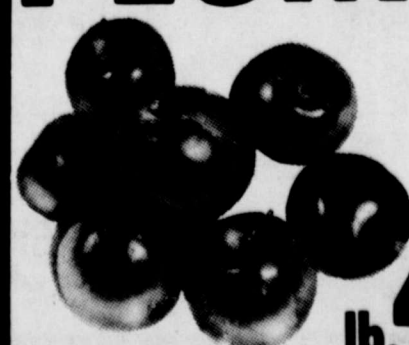

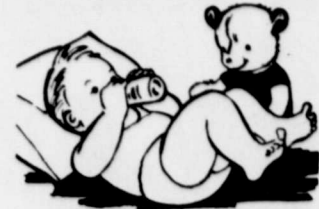

Bread and Butter Pickles
25 large cucumbers
12 medium white onions
1/2 cup salt
1 quart vinegar
2 cups sugar
2 tablespoons white mustard seed
2 tablespoons celery seed
2 tablespoons turmeric
Soak unpeeled cucumbers in water overnight. Slice cucumbers and onions and place in pan and sprinkle with salt; let stand 1 hour and rinse. Add vinegar, sugar, mustard seed, celery seed and turmeric powder. Boil all ingredients until peel turns yellow, about 40 minutes. Pack pickles in hot jars. Close. Process in boiling water bath 5 minutes. Start to count processing as soon as water returns to boiling.

stamps) may vary from month to month for individuals and families, it was indicated. Employment is some higher during the summer months, reports show.

Federal money for food stamps is received from cosmetic, cigarette and liquor taxes, according to the reports. The amount of food stamps received by each household is determined by the number of persons in the household.

Nationwide, since 1971, enrollment in the food stamp program has risen from about 9.4 million to nearly 20 million, and its cost is expected to

reach \$6.5 billion in the fiscal year that began July 1.

The amount each family is allowed to receive in food stamps is determined by the net income of the family, after certain expenses are subtracted from the gross income. Some of the expenses that can be subtracted from gross income, to meet the net income requirement in order to receive the stamps, include local, state and federal taxes, Social Security taxes, medical costs over \$10 per month, child care payments, tuition fees, rent or mortgage payments, and union dues and alimony payments.

MRS. O'CONNOR'S WEEKLY COLUMN

Nonperishable Ham for Camping and Picnicking
When you are packing food for a camping trip or a picnic, be sure to include meat which keeps well, suggests Mrs. O'Connor.

A good item to include is a "nonperishable ham". This is

a term which USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) applies to a fully cooked small canned ham about 1 1/2 to 3 pounds.

The ham has been cooked to an internal temperature of at least 250 degrees F. during processing. You can store this ham in your food box without refrigeration until opened. You can serve it "as is" when you open it. However, you may find the ham tastier if heated to 140 degrees F. and then served.

Be sure to read the label when you buy canned ham. Most canned hams are the perishable type and must be stored in the refrigerator. This storage "must" is prominently displayed on the label.

Perishable canned hams have been cooked to 150 degrees F., so they are ready to eat "as is", but most people prefer to heat them before serving to improve the flavor.

"Ham-Gelatin Addes" is generally found on the label of canned hams to which gelatin has been added to help hold the boned ham together during shipping, storing and slicing.

Gelatin is added in dry form just before the can is vacuum-sealed and cooked. It is meant to thicken juices drawn from the meat to fill the air space. This ham is fully cooked and can be eaten "as is", but you may wish to reheat before serving.

All canned hams are produced under federal or state meat inspection standards.

Serving Suggestion for Ham

Ham and ham slices are great with a tasty sauce. Barbecue, cranberry, cherry, mustard, marmalade or orange are just a few. Bake a fruit dressing such as apple or orange between two ham slices for more elegant fare.

...Ham is tops for outdoor cooking. Prepare a whole ham on a spit, slices on a grill or chunks for kabobs. Use a favorite sauce for basting.

...Ham and eggs are a natural team. Ham bits and scrambled eggs and ham-asparagus benedict are other suggestions.

AFTER SURGERY
