## Local Gas Rates Will Be Increased 8%

### Lions Protest Railroad Abandonment

Winters Lions Club Tuesday adopted a resolution protesting the proposed abandonment of the Abilene & Southern Railway, from Winters to Abilene, and members voted to make their collective protests known to the Interstate Commerce Commission and all congressional representatives.

The resolution pointed out the adverse economic impact the closing of the railroad would have on the entire community. Also, it was stressed that the abandonment hearing should be held in the affected area. Individuals also were urged to contact their congressmen and write their personal protests to the ICC.

### Grid Tickets Go On Sale Next Monday

Sale of season tickets for the 1975 Winters High School football season will begin Monday, August 11, with a full week option period for people who had reserved seats last year and who wish to obtain the same seats for this season.

Season tickets will be sold as a book of five tickets, one for each home game. Price of season tickets this year will be \$7.50 per book.

Fans who did not have season tickets last year may purchase season books during the week of August 18-23.

Throughout the season, tickets will go on sale each Wednesday at 8 a.m. and will be offered through Friday noon at the school business office for the game to be played that week.

Season prices on tickets of 1975 are as follows:

Student general admission, pre-game, 75 cents; at gate, \$1.00.  
Adult general admission, \$2.00.  
Reserved seat, \$2.00.  
Reserved season seats, \$1.50.

Users of natural gas in Winters will find an 8 percent increase in the cost of gas tacked onto their monthly statements soon.

Winters City Council Monday night approved a request by Lone Star Gas Co. to increase consumer prices across the board. Action now awaits only the signature on the resolution and publication of the necessary ordinance before becoming effective. It was predicted that the increase would show in the next billing by the gas company.

Mike Tuggle, Winters manager of Lone Star Gas Co., met with the Council Monday night and presented the request from the company. Members of the Council said approval of the request and passage of the resolution and ordinance were only formalities, as the City is bound to abide by State directives in such matters. The increase will be to \$1.04 per thousand cubic feet of gas consumed, it was said.

The gas company gave as the reason for the request for the rate increase, an increase in the cost of gas at the well head.

### First Aid Course Begins Monday

A first aid course will begin Monday, August 11, in the Winters City Hall, to be held each Monday and Thursday, except August 21, 25, and 28, and Sept. 1.

Classes will begin at 8 p.m., and will be approximately three hours long.

Twenty-five persons are enrolled in the course at this time, and others interested are invited to attend the first class next Monday.

First aid cards will be issued to all who attend each class, it was said.

interested in doing substitute work are requested to register their name, qualifications, and desired subject or grade level at the school business office.

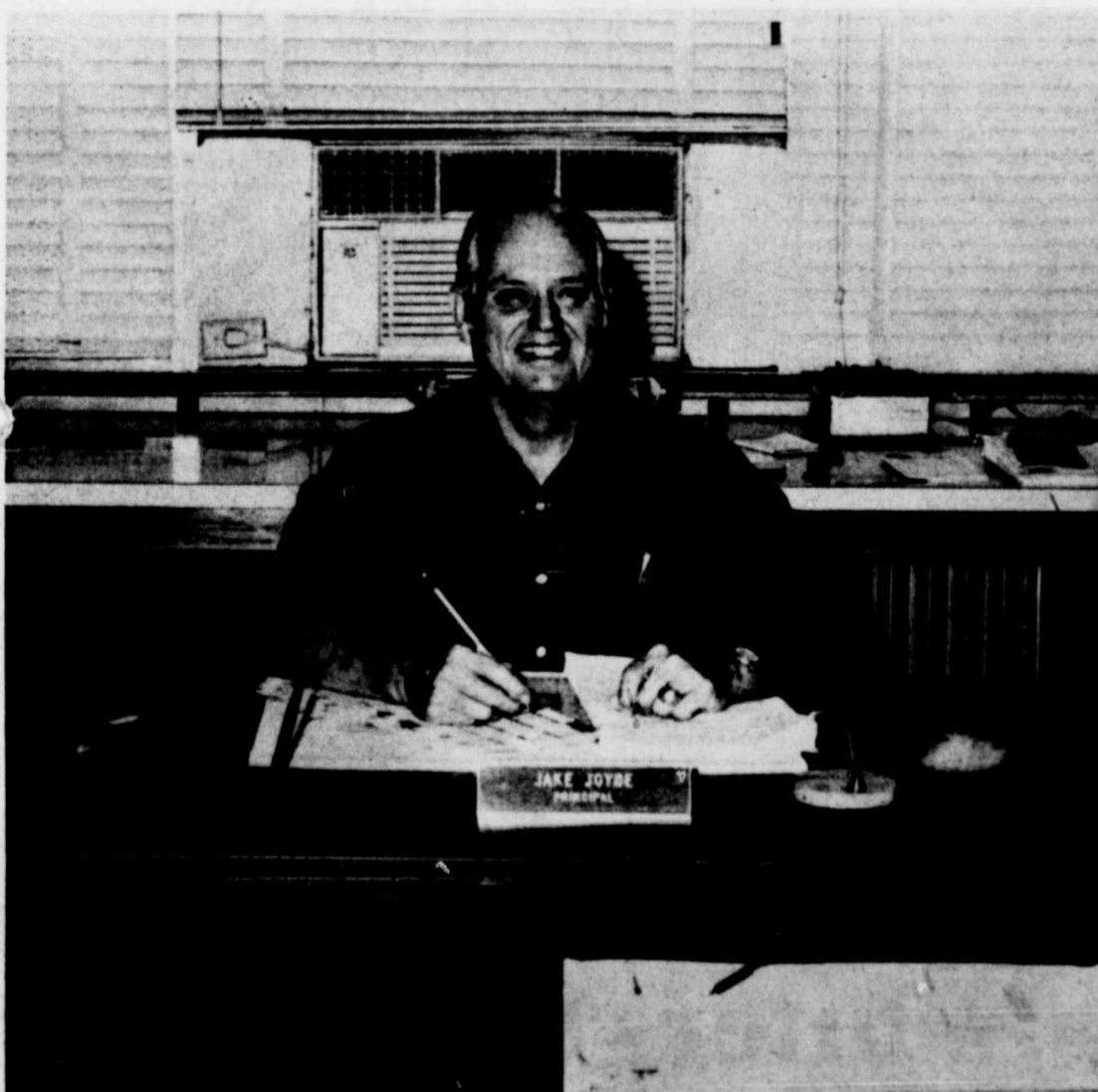

Classes will begin at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday. All school buses will make regular runs. Classes will be on an abbreviated schedule for the first day, with students released at 3 p.m.

The morning's program will also include a discussion of school policies and procedures by Superintendent of Schools Bill Graves.

Tuesday, August 12, faculty members will participate in a departmental and grade level workshop as directed by the school principals in preparation for the opening of school Wednesday, August 13.

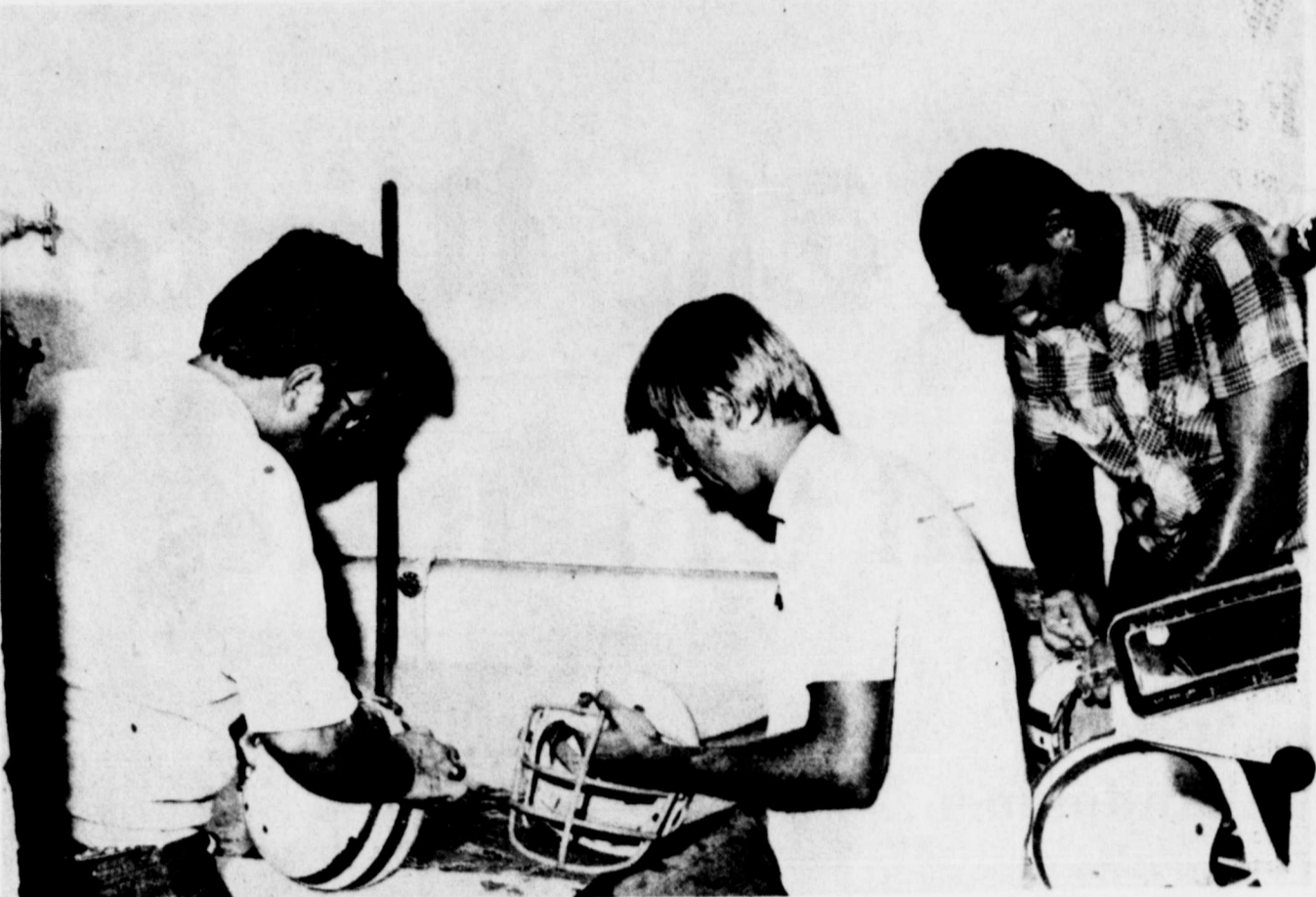

**Football Practice Monday**

The 1975 Winters High School Blizzard football squad will hold two-a-day workouts next Monday and Tuesday, and then will switch to once a day Wednesday, the first day of school, Jimmy Stubblefield, coach and athletic director, said this week.

Squad members have been taking physical examinations, and equipment was to be issued this week.

The first four days will be devoted to "unpadded" practice—in compliance with the ULL rules; boys will have no body contact and will wear athletic

shorts during workouts. On the fifth day, Friday, August 15, players will be allowed to don pads and begin personal body contact practice.

The Blizzards will scrimmage Comanche there Friday, August 22, and then meet Eastland her August 29 in a scrimmage. First game of the season will be played September 5, when the Blizzards will travel to Clyde for a non-conference match with the Bulldogs.

Coach Stubblefield said only six returning starters will be back for this

season, Tony Johnson, Jimmy Chapman, Jack Fairey, Jerry Willis, Bobby Poindexter and Douglas Williams. However, bolstering the squad will be last year's highly successful "B" team.

Members of the coaching staff are Stubblefield, Bill Cathey, Sam Scott, Bud Busher, Eddie Knight, and Phil Swenson. Swenson is new to the Winters system, and will coach girls' basketball, assist with the 7th and 8th grade football teams, and do scouting duty.

**Many Improvements At School**

A number of improvements have been made to the facilities of the Winters Independent School District during the summer, in preparation for the 1975-76 school year.

Superintendent of Schools Bill G. Graves said the school cafeteria has been remodeled, the Elementary School has been repainted on the inside, and a number of rooms in both the High School and Elementary

School have been paneled.

Two buildings have been added to the school plant. These frame buildings, each with a floor space of 1700 square feet, were obtained from Goodfellow Air Force Base in San Angelo, at no cost except moving expenses. They will be used to overcome the crowded conditions in several areas of the school program, Graves said. One of the buildings is

being remodeled and will serve as a dressing room for the varsity football team. The other building will be used as a diagnostic and learning center for the Special Education program.

In addition to remodeling and special projects, the maintenance staff of the school district, under direction of Cecil Sudduth, has also been responsible for preparing all of the grounds and area for the opening of school next week.

TO THE PUBLIC:

The Abilene and Southern Railway Company is seeking to abandon 39 miles of its track in Taylor and Runnels Counties, Texas. The abandonment of this trackage will sever the sole rail connection from the Winters area.

This action will have an adverse economic effect on everyone in this area. The cost of moving freight in and out will increase due to the lower efficiency of truck freight that would take its place. Rail is many times more energy-conserving than truck. In view of our continued fuel shortage, it very well may be that shipping by rail will become an economic necessity in the years ahead.

Your help in preserving this vital connection is urgently needed. The Interstate Commerce Commission has the authority to allow this abandonment without public hearing unless sufficient protests are received by September 1, 1975.

My company urges you to take the following actions:

1. Write a protest to:

Mr. Robert L. Oswald, Secretary

Interstate Commerce Commission

Washington, D. C. 20423

In your letter, reference "Abandonment No. 21" and state your reasons why a public hearing should be held. Request that the commission hold its hearing in Winters because this is the community most affected by this action.

2. Write our elected representatives at the state and national level and request that they use their influence to assure us of an opportunity to be heard.

3. Request other individuals and civic organizations to file similar protests.

4. If we are successful in getting a public hearing, then be present and voice your objections to this abandonment.

There are many reasons that can be developed in public hearing that will support continued operation of our railroad.

## KRUEGER'S KOLUMN

This week the House narrowly turned down the opportunity for a major improvement in moving this nation toward energy independence, and, instead, took a backward step toward increasing reliance on the Arab countries.

A number of us, both Democrats and Republicans, have been working for some months to fashion an energy policy which would allow the phased decontrol of government-regulated oil prices. Over a period of several years, the government would move away from regulating the price of domestic oil, much of which is now sold at prices less than half of those which we pay for imported oil, and these prices are frequently too low to encourage new exploration and development in this country. Consequently, we now rely on imports for 40 percent of our oil, and this means that we will be increasingly subject to Arab blackmail and to the economic disaster that could be caused by another oil embargo.

In order to counter this threat, many of us, Democrats and Republicans alike, are working toward a compromise package that would protect the consumer against sharp price increases, but would give adequate rewards to producers of domestic oil so that we would not be subject of such economic blackmail by foreign countries. In this process, I offered one of the two major energy proposals considered by the House, and when both mine and the opposing versions narrowly lost, I was asked to offer President Ford's oil pricing compromise. On six occasions in the past ten days, I met with

Frank Zarb, head of the Federal Energy Administration, and several Congressional leaders to work out this compromise. Although I did not like it as much as my own initial proposal, I was more concerned with getting an improved energy policy for the country than I was with seeing my own ideas enacted. Unfortunately, this proposal was also very narrowly defeated. Had six of the 435 House members changed their votes, we would have won, and the President had indicated that he was prepared to agree to the compromise—but we lost. Now it is my best guess that there will be a sudden decontrol of all domestic oil prices on September 1 and that is likely to mean an increase in the price of gasoline from \$.07 to \$.10 per gallon. If this happens, then some of those members anxious to punish people connected with the oil industry are likely to come back with punitive legislation and with threats of nationalizing the oil companies, though I do not believe such proposals would ever pass.

I think there are several reasons for this failure to reach a compromise: (1) the irrational desire among some to punish the oil companies; (2) a failure among some members to examine the real issues, but instead a willingness to vote for short-term price roll-backs as if that was a real help to the consumer; (3) the tendency among some to play confrontation politics, pitting the Congress against the President, rather than addressing the needs of the nation; and (4) strong lobbying activity by special interest groups. Unfortunately, the need for a strong economy, with reliable do-

domestic energy reserves to free us from dependence on foreign sources, is a viewpoint that does not have any special interest lobbyists or special interest spokesmen. Sometimes the special interest win out over the public interest and this happened in last week's vote. The margin was narrow and I am convinced the President will veto the bill and, in the long run, I believe that the public interest will be served. I will continue to work toward that end.
