## \$1.6 Million Assigned For Rural Water

A second round of loans and grants, for more than a million dollars, has been approved by the Farmers Home Administration for construction and development of the proposed water distribution system of North Runnels Rural Water Corporation, it was learned last week.

In this move, a loan for \$530,800 and a direct grant of \$505,000 was approved by the FHA, spokesman for the local non-profit water distribution organization said. This latest development brings the total of loans and grants for this project to \$1,680,400, it was said. Some time ago, approval was obtained for a \$337,600 loan and a grant of \$307,000, for the first phase of the project.

This means, according to LaDell Davis, manager of the corporation, that plans for the entire project can be completed, and work can begin on all phases of the project immediately, instead of piecemealing.

Davis said it is hoped that a call for bids for construction can be made in early December, and actual construc-

tion can begin shortly after the beginning of the new year.

The non-profit corporation has opened an office in Winters, on West Dale Street.

In a recent meeting of the board of directors of the North Runnels Rural Water Supply Corp., Sam Faubion, president, submitted his resignation as a member of the board. E.F. (Slim) Albro, a director, was elected president to succeed Faubion, and R.Q. Marks was named a director.

When completed, the rural water distribution system will purchase water from Winters and Ballinger, if needed, and will pump water to a large part of North Runnels County, from near Ballinger to the Runnels-Taylor county line, and into some portion of Taylor County. About 400 outlets already are planned, it was said.

Plans are to build storage tanks and pump stations at several points throughout the system, so that all outlets may receive water at high pressure. The water will be purchased treated from Winters and Ballinger.

## Ground Broken For Housing

Construction is expected to begin within a few days on a twelve-unit rental housing project in Winters, after many months of preparation.

Ground breaking ceremonies were held on the site of the project Friday morning, and Roy Clark, president of the Bright Company of Fort Worth, the private company which will build and maintain the complex, said heavy equipment is expected to begin excavation "within two" weeks, and it is expected that units will be ready for occupancy in 90 days.

The project is the culmination of many months work and study, first by the Winters Rental Housing Development Corporation, and then the Bright Company. The rental housing corporation was formed about three years ago, as a non-profit organization. The corporation was organized by local businessmen in an effort to develop needed rental housing in Winters. The board of the corporation worked for many months obtaining plans and applying for financial assistance from the Farmers Home Administration.

Several months ago, the Bright Company expressed a desire to undertake a building project in Winters, as a free enterprise venture, and all plans developed by the Rental Housing Corporation were turned over to that company. The local non-profit corporation has not been disbanded, but will continue to work for additional housing for Winters, officers said.

Twelve two-bedroom units will be built, in two sections, in the area north of Huffman House. The units will be rented. The Bright Company has a

similar project underway in Colorado City, in addition to other housing projects in other cities.

Roy Clark is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Clark of Winters, and is a 1963 graduate of Winters High School, and a graduate of Abilene Christian College. At ground breaking ceremonies Friday, he said he was glad to be given a chance to return to his home town and to develop such a housing project, "to repay," in a manner, the community which helped him so much.

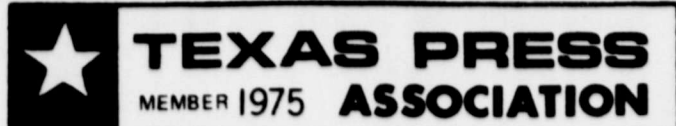

Nancy Parker, affectionally called Grandma Parker, was a herb doctor who lived in the cabin and dispensed her home brewed remedies long before there was a settlement or any doctors in the area.

She boiled the teas which she administered to the settlers in a huge pot over the fireplace. These herbs and plants used for medicinal purposes grew profusely on the mountainside nearby. Tea from the Balmoney weed which was very bitter was given for billiousness. It's affect was quite weakening and many a handy frontiersman after a through of this tea found himself unable to stand on his wobbly legs.

A brew made from the Redroot plant was given for diarrhea. She made Broomweed tea for coughs and tea from the Sassafras plant for a general Spring tonic. For groups who had asthma she recommended smoking the leaves of the Mullin weed. If a child was affected, the leaves were cooked, sugar added and a candy made.

We know that Nancy Parker came to the area as early as 1872. Runnels County records show that she made an affidavit of occupancy on Nov. 16, 1873. And according to Texas law, a resident was required to put improvements on the land, which usually meant a dugout or cabin, and occupy it at least a year before making the affidavit.

Nancy's husband, John Parker, was a cousin of Cynthia Ann Parker. He was one of the first four commissioners in Parker County and died there in 1869, leaving Nancy with three small children. Her family, the A. J. Rossons, lived in the area later known as Content, and it was understandable that she would return here to be near her parents.

Construction of the cabin points to the early 70's, and conforms to the building patterns of that day. The oak logs are joined together in rough box-end fashion. The oak logs are hand hewn and are stuck together with lime made in a home made kiln. Only six of the original logs have been replaced, and all of the chinking which is white is the original lime, except where the logs have been replaced. The huge floor sleepers are oak logs and are resting on large native rocks. On the flat side of the sleepers, the marks of the

broad axe can be plainly seen.

The cabin today retains much of its original status. The repairs which have been made by Mrs. Henry Bright of Tyler, have been made for preservation purposes.

Inside there is a fireplace made of native stone which continues to function perfectly. The hearth is level with the firebox and not raised as present day fireplaces. The mantel board over the fireplace is a plain pine plank.

In front of the cabin to the east stood Ranger Peak where Rangers were stationed to alert the settlers when Indians were sighted. There is no record of the Indians trying to harm Nancy, but it was probably a source of comfort to know that help was nearby.

From the south door, Nancy could view the tangled terrain of post oak, scraggy cedars and snarls of trumpet vines. She lived in the cabin nearly two decades and ministered to the settlers. She was often called out in the daytime and sometimes at night. Always she quickly gathered her things together in a black cloth bag and hurried away, usually on foot but sometimes riding a mule, across the rugged mountainside.

During the years she lived here it was said that she never lost a patient. Only once during this time was a doctor called into this area. None was nearer than Brownwood and it took a rider on horseback two days

and one night to make the trip. The Brownwood doctor lost his patient, a three-year-old boy named Bennie Fanning.

Nancy's three children grew up here. These were Daniel, Benjamin and Betty. Nancy also raised another girl, possibly a relative.

By 1888, Grandma Parker's eyesight had failed until she could no longer see her way about the countryside to aid the people whom she had served so long. So she sold her property and at this time couldn't see to write her name. Records show that she signed with an X witnessed by her daughter-in-law, Mary, wife of her son Benjamin. They were the parents of Ona Parker of Abilene.

Nancy moved into Content and lived here until 1892. She then was completely blind and moved to Kimbell County to live with a relative. She died there Oct. 12, 1893.

### Krueger Announces Rule Changes To Help The Elderly

Federally supported Medicaid nursing home patients now will be allowed up to 18 days a year to visit relatives or friends according to information released today by Congressman Bob Krueger. Such visits formerly were limited to three days at a time, six a quarter, and 18 a year.

From now on, Krueger explained, the only restriction will be 18 days annually, with the Federal Government paying its share of the cost of the nursing home bed during the patient's absence. "Patients were initially being asked to pay for the nights they were not staying in a nursing home," Krueger said, "which, in effect, discourages people from getting out to see their friends and families. We should encourage this type of activity," he continued, "since it not only is therapeutic, but provides a sense of dignity to people who need and deserve it."

According to John A. Svahn, Acting Administrator of HEW's Social and Rehabilitation Service, the Medicaid nursing home leave policy was eased in response to comments from Congress, State officials, and the

general public. "I was glad to see the bureaucracy respond to public pressure," Krueger added. "This was a good example of a bad rule which unduly infringed on the rights of decency, privacy, and mobility of average citizens."

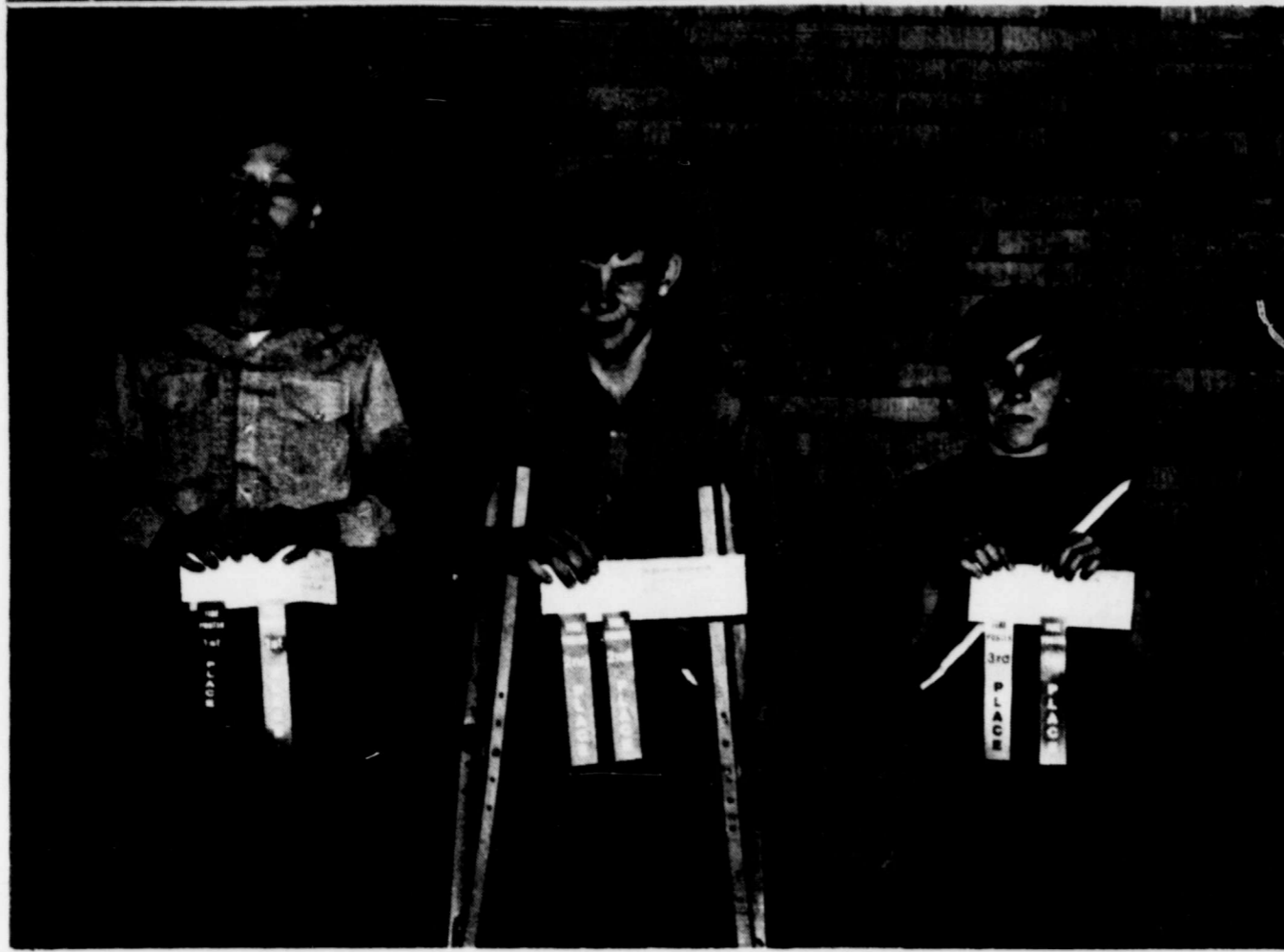

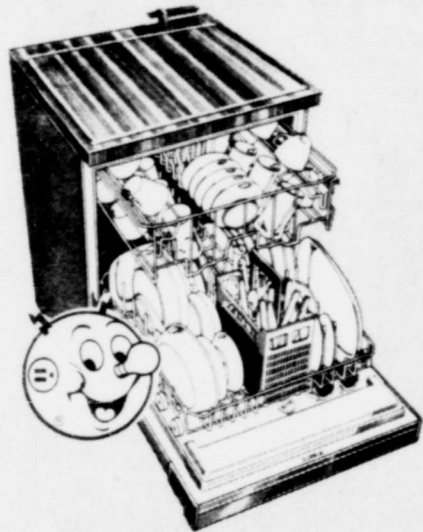

### Wingate School Will Comply With Title IX

In a regular meeting of the board of trustees of Wingate Independent School District November 11, the board adopted policy statements which regulate the administration of the requirements for compliance with Title IX, Federal school legislation.

Title IX prohibits sex discrimination in schools in any education program or activity. Also, no person shall, on the basis of sex, be subjected to discrimination in employment, promotion, dismissal, procedures for evaluating school personnel, or temporary disability leave.

### TURKEY-NOODLE PARTY CASSEROLE

4 ounces noodles (2 cups)  
1 10-oz. package frozen broccoli spears  
3 tablespoons butter or margarine  
1 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon prepared mustard  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
2 cups milk  
1 cup grated processed American cheese  
2 cups cooked cut-up turkey  
1/3 cups slivered almonds, toasted

Cook noodles in boiling salted water, drain. Cook broccoli until just tender and drain. Dice broccoli stems, but leave flowerets whole. Melt butter or margarine in saucepan, stir in flour, salt, mustard, pepper and milk. Cook and stir until thick and smooth. Remove from heat and add cheese, stirring until it melts. In a greased casserole or baking dish, arrange noodles, broccoli stems and turkey; cover with cheese sauce. Arrange broccoli flowerets on top, sprinkle with almonds. Bake uncovered at 350 degrees F. for 15 minutes or until bubbling hot. Serves 4-6.

Drain liquid from apples into a small saucepan. Spoon apples into pastry-lined pie pan. Dot with butter. Cover with top crust; seal edges. Make 5 or 6 long slits for steam to escape. Bake at 450 degrees for 15 minutes. Reduce heat to 350 degrees and bake 40 to 50 minutes longer or until apples are tender. Bring drained liquid to boil, stirring constantly. Cook until thickened. Pour into baked pie through slits. Let stand 1/2 hour before serving. Makes 1 (9-inch) pie.

### O'Connor's Column

'Bi-Purpose' Turkeys  
**Best For Economy:**  
Economy-conscious consumers will buy "bi-purpose" turkey big enough for Thanksgiving dinner, with lots left over for other meals. Allow three-fourths to one pound per serving if the turkey is 12 pounds or under,

or one-half to three-fourths pound per serving for a heavier bird.

Protect leftovers from bacterial contamination by refrigerating right after dinner. Since refrigerator space is usually at a premium during the holiday season, remove meat from bones before wrapping for storage. And remember to store stuffing separately. Freeze all the meat that cannot be used within two or three days.

Make broth to use in soup and casserole dishes later, Mrs. O'Connor suggested.

Put bones and bits of meat and skin in a large kettle, cover with cold water. Add sliced onion and carrot, a garlic clove, spices and two teaspoons of salt. Cover and bring to a boil. Simmer two hours, then strain the broth. Refrigerate in a covered jar for two days or less.

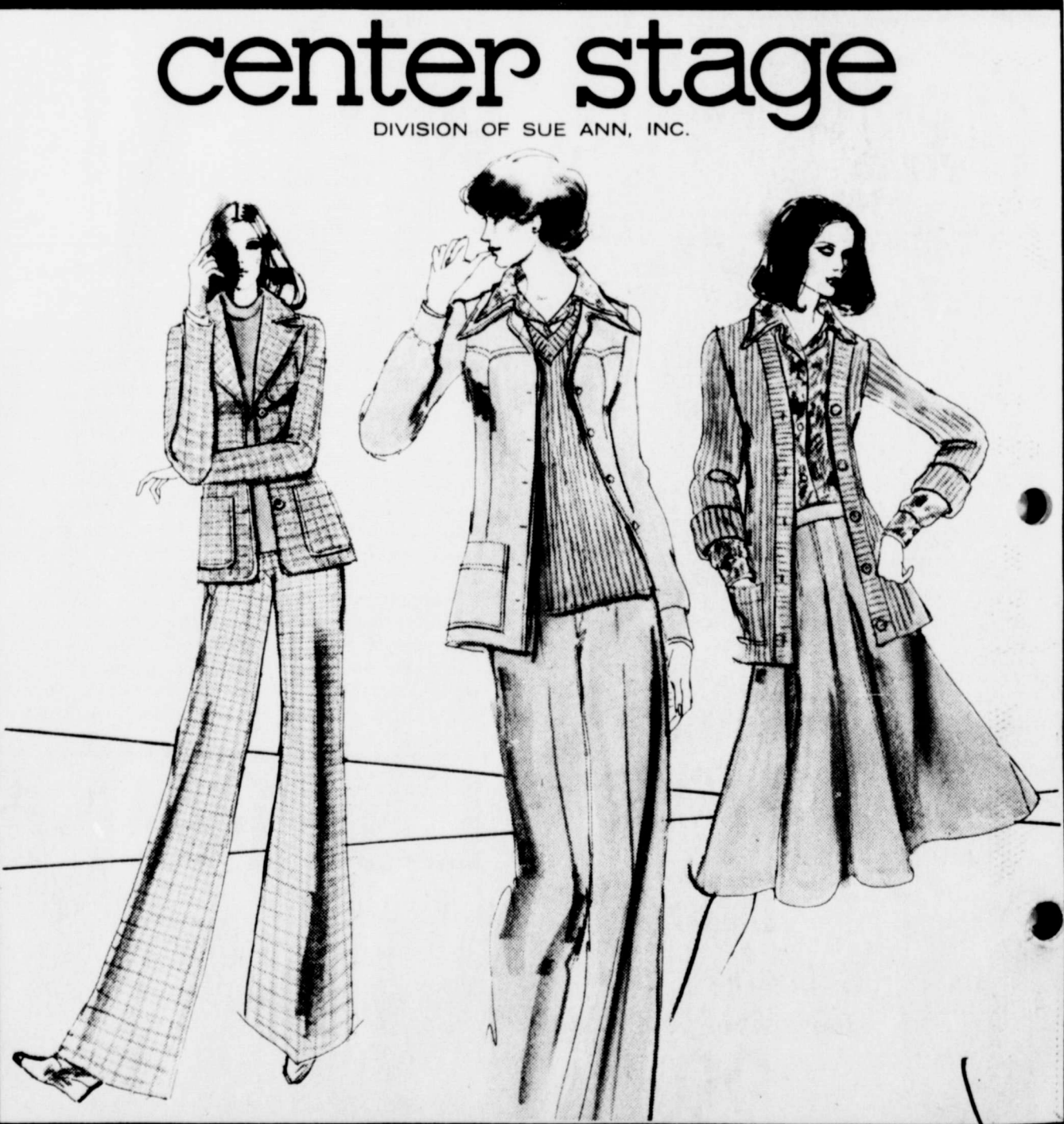
