Annual Christmas Parade Saturday, December 6

Introduction of the 38 candidates for the honor, and selection of Winters' Sno Queen 1975 will be the highlight of the annual Chamber of Commerce sponsored Christmas Parade, to be held here Saturday afternoon.

The parade will begin at 3 p.m., but entries have been asked to report to the United Methodist Church parking lot no later than 2:30 for the parade position assignment. The Winters Jaycees will direct the parade.

Candidates for Sno Queen will ride in the parade, with vehicle provided by sponsor of the candidate.

Several school bands, under direction of Kirke McKenzie, will also be in the parade.

A special kiddies division will be in the parade, with cash prizes of \$15, \$10 and \$5 for each section, individuals, and groups.

There will be no cash prizes offered for commercial or organizational floats, but several have been entered for this year's parade.

Candidates for Sno Queen will be girls from Winters High School. Each candidate will be sponsored by a merchant or business, drawn by lot

Council Discusses Teletype Tie-Up With Ballinger

Winters City Council Monday discussed the feasibility of a cooperative police teletype network, to include the Winters and Ballinger police departments, and the Runnels County sheriff's department.

At the present time, it has been explained, there is no direct contact among the three departments during the nighttime hours. Such a network would add to the efficiency of police intelligence, it was stated.

Members of the Ballinger City Council met with the Winters governing body to discuss the proposal. No action was taken.

In other action, the City Council authorized the Bicentennial committee to erect a replica of the old band stand in the City Park, at no expense to the city. The Council authorized some changing of the park to accommodate the band stand.

Bicentennial Committee Will Build Replica of Gazebo

One of the several activities included in Winters' observance of the Bicentennial will be the rebuilding of the old gazebo type band stand, which stood for many years in Winters.

The original structure was moved to the Tinkle Farm about 50 years ago, according to information, and plans had been to return it to town and rebuild it. However, after inspection of the stand, the committee working on this Bicentennial project decided that it would be impossible to use the original structure.

So, another gazebo will be built, to the exact specifications of the original, but with new materials. The Winters Lions Club is sponsoring this project,

and Kirke McKenzie is chairman of the restoration committee.

A special fund is being collected to purchase the materials which will be needed for the gazebo. Those who have already made contributions are Charles Poe, \$100; Homer Hodge, \$100; Kirke McKenzie, \$10. Those wishing to help in this project may contact Gattis Neely, who will be in charge of collections.

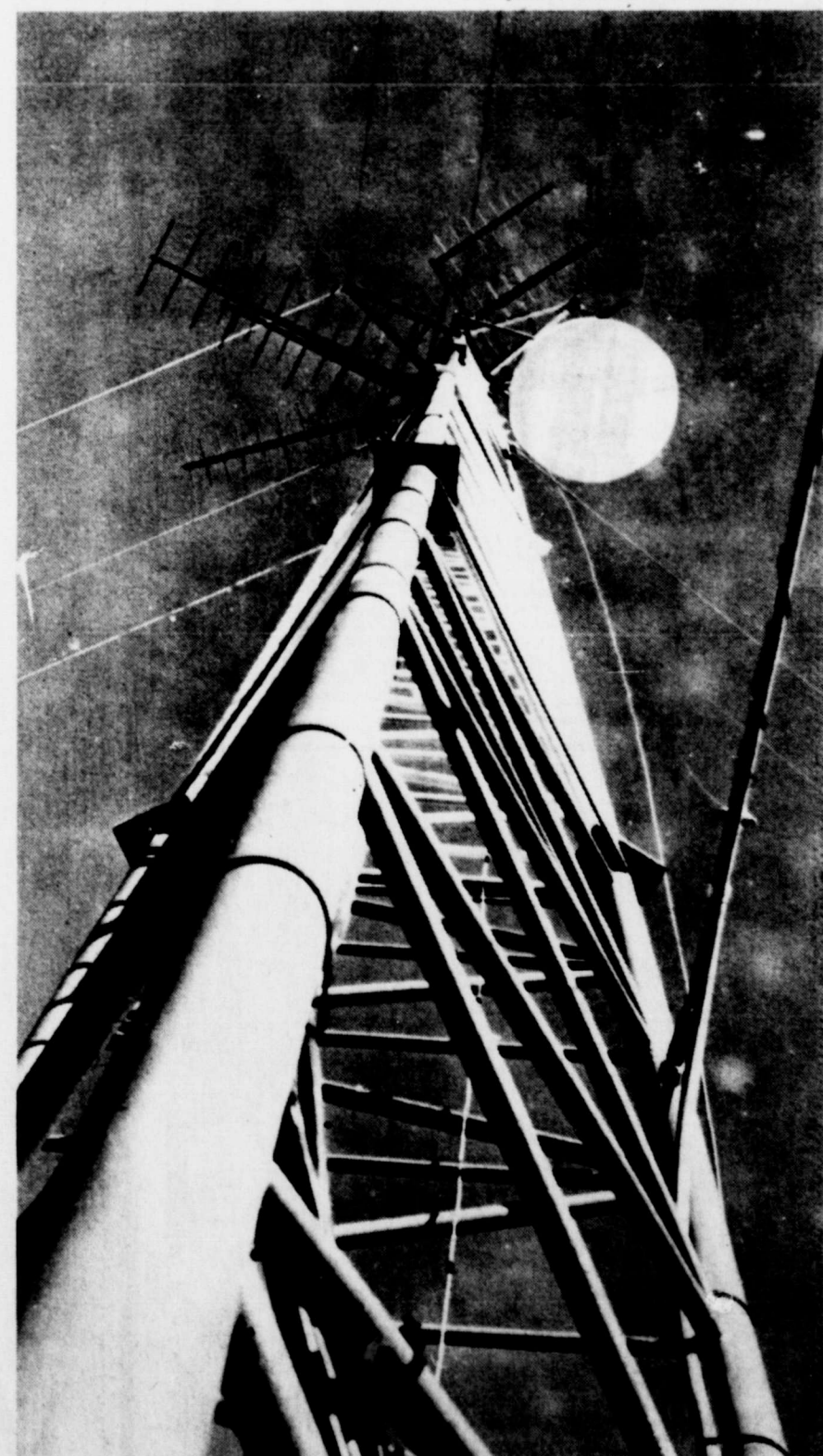

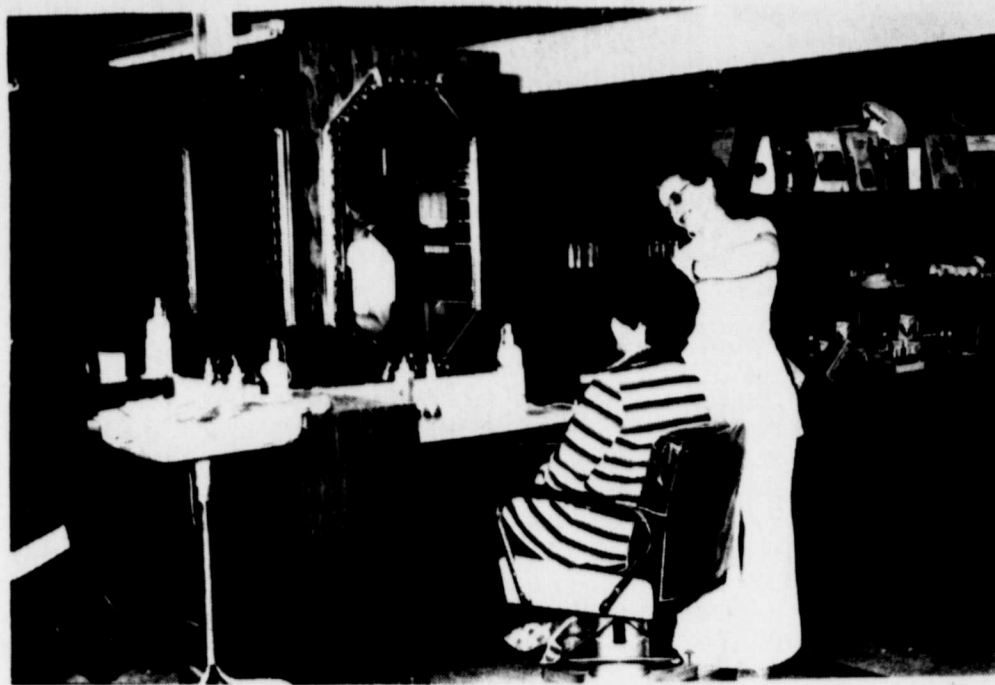

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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — State health programs for the needy may have to be cut back after January 1 unless the State Welfare budget can be altered.

While the department may have \$100 million or more in unspent state and federal funds for 1976-77, the money apparently cannot be transferred from other programs to health services.

Welfare Commissioner Raymond Vowell said a health program deficit in fiscal 1977 may run as high as \$76 million.

Welfare officials said they can operate within the overall appropriations available if they can move funds from program to program. However, the legislature has prohibited such transfers.

The State Board of Public Welfare authorized staff sessions with Gov. Dolph Briscoe and the Legislative Budget Board to seek transfer power.

The alternative, according to Welfare Budget Analyst Wes Hjernevik, is reducing or discontinuing nearly all health services for the aged, blind, disabled and other welfare recipients.

Most of the shortage, Hjernevik said, is due to spiraling medical care costs.

Welfare officials are contemplating reducing hospital stay maximums from 30 to 15 days, discontinuing intermediate care nursing home payments, limiting drug prescriptions to two per month and cutting off payments for glasses, dentures and hearing aids.

Control to State

Texas Air Control Board said the federal government is giving the state management of air sampling programs January 1.

The Board will collect for federal study air samples in 14 places — a job now done by the Environmental Protection Agency.

Amarillo, Beaumont, Corpus Christi, Dallas, El Paso, Fort Worth, Houston, Lubbock, Matagorda County, Pasadena, Tom Green County, Austin, San Antonio and Wichita Falls are sampled areas. City workers will be called on to collect information. The Air Control Board samples air at 100 sites in a state program started seven years ago.

Blue Cross Extended

Blue Cross' Medicaid contract with the state was extended 60 days by the State Welfare Board, though the company won't permit audits of its administrative costs.

A company official indicated the state auditor may be permitted at last to check the "methodology" of its accounting system. But he did not say a real audit of the books would be permitted.

Carrillo Sentenced

District Judge O. P. Carrillo has been sentenced to five years imprisonment, five years probation and a \$22,000 fine for filing false income tax returns.

Carrillo still faces impeachment trial by the Senate (now scheduled to begin January 5) and a removal proceeding before Texas Judicial Qualifications Commission.

An attorney for Carrillo and his brother, Duval County Commissioner Ramiro Carrillo, also sentenced on an income tax violation, said the conviction will be appealed.

AG Opinions

Waste disposal districts have authority to issue bonds for acquisition, construction and repair of disposal systems subject to review by the attorney general, Atty. Gen. John Hill concluded.

In other recent opinions, Hill said: A city may grant automatic rate adjustments to a utility.

Contributions to pay expenses of the Southern Governors Conference in Texas do not have to be reported as campaign or

lobby expenditures. A state university cannot use either appropriated or auxiliary enterprise funds to purchase liability insurance for its administrative officers and regents.

The legislature may constitutionally vest control of the Texas School for the Blind in five members of the State Board of Education.

A lease of federal land to get the purchase price of parking facilities on the site conveys to the lessee no separately taxable real property interest in facilities.

Appointments

Ed Leach of Longview and Jack C. Kellam of Van were named by Gov. Dolph Briscoe to the Texas Historical Commission.

Briscoe reappointed San Antonio Mayor Lila Cockrell and Fred N. Pfeiffer of San Antonio to the Texas Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations. The Governor also picked Don Rogers of Austin and Pledger B. Cate Jr. of San Antonio to the Advisory Commission.

Briscoe placed Carl Smith of Flaton, W. C. White of San Angelo and John Worsham of Corpus Christi on the Egg Marketing Advisory Board. Other recent appointments by the governor included Carl W. Swenson of Ganado, Hans R. Wittenberg of Edna and Joe Bonnot of Lolita to the Lavaca-Navidad River Authority Board of Directors; Mrs. Katherine M. Birkner of Maxwell to the State Health Advisory Committee and W. Sam Monroe of Port Arthur as Pilot Commissioner for the Sabine Bar, Pass and Tributaries.

Short Snorts

A three-judge federal court in Austin continued an order blocking implementation of Texas, new voter registration law until it is approved by the U. S. Justice Department.

Ernest Angel of Midland, Mrs. William Staff of Dallas and Ray Barnhart of Houston were selected co-chairmen of the Texas Ronald Reagan presidential campaign committee.

A detailed discussion of effects of the new Federal Voting Rights Act on Texas governmental units is scheduled here December 17 under auspices of the House Elections Committee.

Texas has been voted top state for beautification work in the Keep America Beautiful competition.

A record low of 10 new industries settled in Texas during October, but they will have an economic impact of \$46 million a year and directly employ 600 while generating 750 more jobs.

House Speaker Bill Clayton has named a nine-member committee to find alternatives to the property tax for financing public school education.

The State Democratic Executive Committee is scheduled to hold one of its longest meetings yet in Fort Worth December 8 to consider major party rules changes and a variety of other matters.

Fort's Flag

The flag that flew over Ft. McHenry when the national anthem was written is preserved in the Smithsonian Institution, Washington, D.C. It has 15 stars, for the original 13 states plus Kentucky and Vermont.

TV Inauguration

The first presidential inauguration to be carried by television was that of President Harry S. Truman, Jan. 20, 1949, which was seen over 15 stations from Boston to St. Louis.

The people of the United States consume about \$2 billion worth of potato chips, pretzels, nuts, crackers, spreads and other snacks annually. The average person also drinks about 20 gallons of sodas and fruit-flavored beverages each year.

O'Connor's Column

Can Sale-Priced Turkey For Later Use

Wise consumers can take advantage of turkey bargains by canning about half of a large bird bought on sale and freezing the other half for Thanksgiving dinner, Mrs. O'Connor says.

Canning the turkey is also a way to extend use of the pressure canner when vegetables canning is done.

"To prepare turkey for canning, rinse the bird thoroughly in cold water and wipe dry. Use a sharp knife to disjoint the bird; then sort into meaty and bony pieces. Set aside giblets to can separately."

"Pour enough hot water or broth over raw, meaty pieces in a pan to cover the meat. Put lid on and cook until pieces show almost no pink in the center when out."

Cut turkey parts small enough to fit loosely into the jars. Leave one inch headspace at the top of the jar. Add one-half teaspoon salt per pint if desired, or it may be left out for people on low-salt diets.

Cover the turkey with

boiling broth, again leaving one inch headspace at the top of the jar. Avoid overfilling the jar to prevent loss of liquid during processing, the specialist reminded.

"Wipe the jar rim clean. Fat left there will interfere with sealing. Place the lid with the sealing compound next to the glass. Screw the metal band tightly.

"Have two to three inches of boiling water in the pressure canner to prevent it from boiling dry during processing. Place jars in canner on rack and fasten lid securely."

Let steam escape from open petcock or weighted gauge opening for 10 minutes. Shut the petcock or put on the weighted gauge. When pressure rises to 10 pounds, start counting time. Adjust heat to keep pressure steady.

Process pint jars of turkey with bone for one hour and five minutes and quarts for one hour and 15 minutes. Process turkey without bone in pint jars for one hour and 15 minutes and quarts for one and one-half hours.

"Slide canner off the heat when time is up. Let pressure fall to zero. This takes about 30 minutes. Wait a minute or

two and open petcock slowly. Unfasten cover, tilting far side up to keep steam away from the face."

Cool jars overnight, wipe clean and label. "Canned turkey may be used in casseroles, soups and stews. For dishes requiring cold turkey, heat the turkey for 20 minutes to insure safety against botulism. Then chill and use in salads and sandwiches," the specialist suggested.

COCOA CANDY DANDIES

Makes 2-1/2 dozen
3 tablespoons butter or margarine
2 cups quick oats, uncooked
1 cup firmly packed brown sugar
3 tablespoons cocoa
1/4 cup corn syrup (either light or dark)
1 tablespoon vanilla

Confectioners sugar
Stir butter until soft. Combine oats, brown sugar and cocoa; blend well. Work oats mixture into butter, mixing well. Blend in syrup and vanilla.

With wet hands, shape to form small balls, about 1 inch in diameter. Roll in confectioners sugar. Let stand a few hours to blend flavors.

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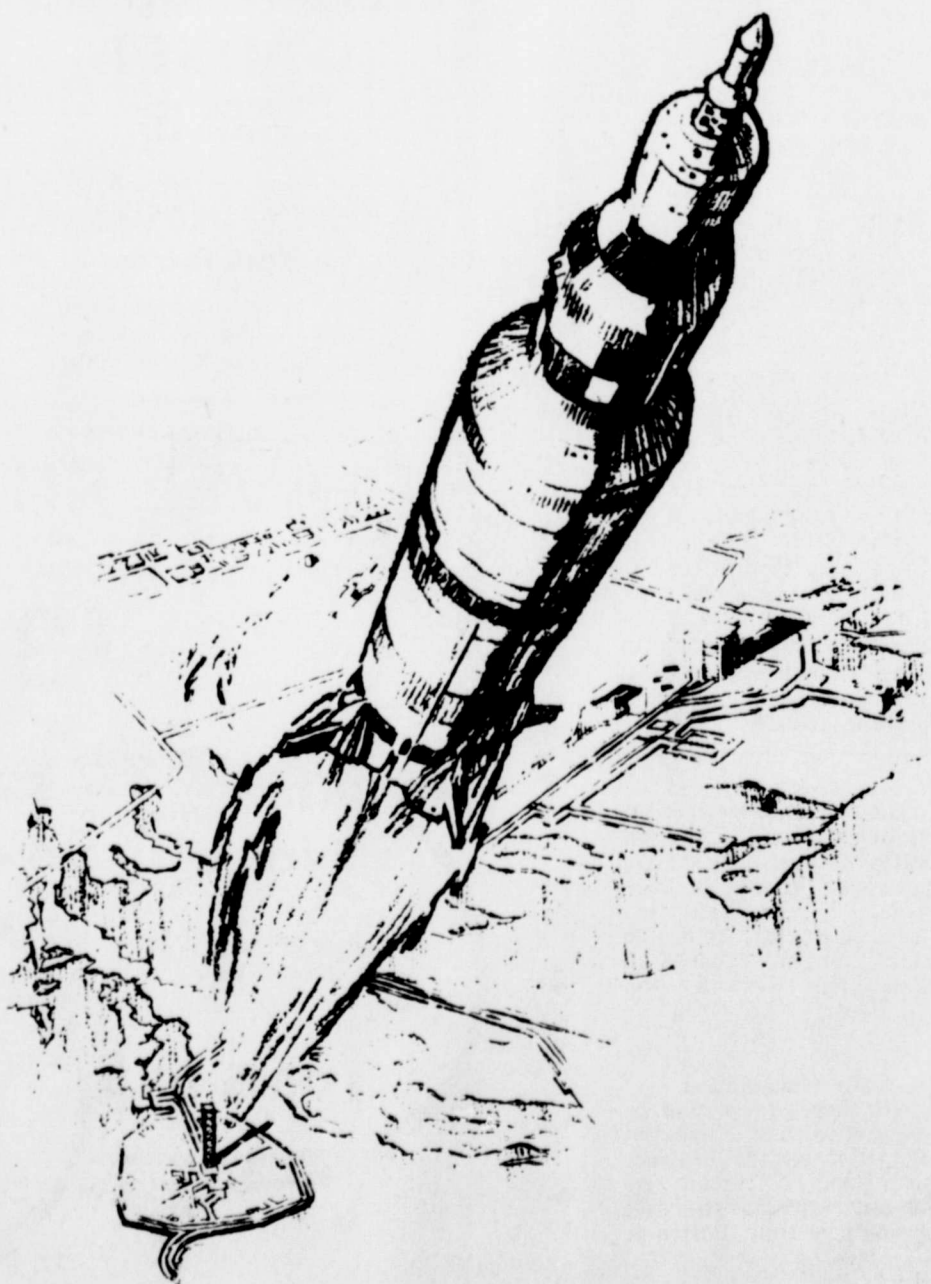

Popular Country-Western Song Writer Visited Here

Marijohn Wilkin, popular entertainer, successful songwriter, and music publisher, played and sang some of her top recordings for residents and guests at the Senior Citizens Nursing Home while visiting her uncle, Buford Owens, Saturday.

"I've been in the songwriting business for the past 17 1/2 years," she said. "And that's a long time."

Miss Wilkin wrote for the Cedarwood Publishing Co. for seven years and then founded Buckhorn Music Publishers. She is the only woman to start a music publishing company in Nashville, Tenn., and build it into prominence. Her son John Buck Wilkin is a musician with the company.

She began in the field of country music and two years ago, after a spiritual awakening, began writing gospel songs. She dates the beginning of her present success to that.

"I Have Returned," a gospel album with the popular "One Day at a Time" on it was No. 1 on gospel charts for the singer and pianist early this year. It won the gospel industry's Dove Award, the equivalent of a Grammy, for Miss Wilkin. And recently she was inducted into the Nashville Songwriters Association Hall of Fame.

Author of some 750 songs, Miss Wilkin is co-writer with Kris Kristofferson on the famed "One Day at a Time." Miss Wilkin wrote all 11 songs in her new album,

"Where I'm Going" that has just been completed for Myrrh records.

Johnny Cash has already recorded two of the songs in this album, "Back in the Fold" and "Our Little Old Home Town."

Marijohn is well known in Winters. She has been visiting here since she was a small child and performing in the various churches on her accordian and with vocal solos. She also made Winters her home while her husband was in the service.

A 1942 graduate of Hardin Simmons University, she was a singer on scholarship with the Cowboy Band, and considers this an important phase of her life. She taught public school music in Lovington, N.M., and Tulsa, Okla., for a number of years before going to Springfield, Mo., to be on Red Foley's Ozark Jubilee, and try to establish herself in the music world. Her early songs "Waterloo" and "Long Black Veil" are well remembered.

Miss Wilkin explained that gospel records are not sold through regular channels, and can only be purchased in religious book stores. She has made arrangements for her records to be available at the Riess Radio-TV Store.

AUSTIN — Insurance made news again, as the State Insurance Board hiked rates for homeowners coverage effective February 16.

Board staffers a week earlier recommended an average 17 per cent increase statewide in auto insurance premiums.

The Board-approved homeowners' rates will increase at an average of 8.3 per cent, fire insurance rates on homes 7.9 per cent for single-year policies and 14 per cent on three-year policies.

Rates were far less than those requested by the insurance industry.

Homeowners policy rates and extended coverage (storms, hail, riots, accidents, etc), vary by territories.

Homeowners' rates for average residences would increase as follows:

- Seacoast, 7.6 per cent.
- Central, 7.6 per cent.
- North-Northwest, 12 per cent.

Rate on a \$35,000 brick veneer home in Galveston will go up from \$940 to \$1,021 for a three-year homeowners policy. The same type home in Houston would see a rate increase from \$814 to \$886, in Austin from \$654 to \$714 and in Lubbock from \$1,137 to \$1,283.

Amount of the annual increase on the same home would be \$17 in Galveston, \$24 in Houston, \$20 in Austin and \$49 in Lubbock.

VRA Study On

The House Elections Committee began a "major study of effects of the recently-extended and expanded Voting Rights Act on Texas.

The Committee will try to gauge impact of the law on local governments and recommend legislation needed to help smaller governmental units comply with complex VRA re-
