

One was a boy of 15 perhaps and his plea was a sore leg but it wasn't too sore to use vigorously when he thought no one was looking The whine that accompanied his plea for charity indicated the practiced mendicant. The second was a cripple and offered pencils for sale. It is not generally known but it is a fact that such people as these are hired by syndicates, paid big wages, and put on the road as protessional beggars. The people are easily duped. They give to any and all encouraging them in their duplicity. It is time to stop the practice.
