> At Little Rock, Ark., the Presbyterians are holding a meeting of the General Assembly. Many important church questions will come up for consideration, chief among them being the problem of inserting a footnote to the confession of faith on the "elect infant" clause.

> During the past week good rains have fallen in nearly every part of Texas and farmers and stockmen generally are greatly encouraged. In some places the rains, with accompanying wind and in some cases hail, were so heavy as to do more or less injury to growing crops, but in the main they were very beneficial.

Alexander Edwin Sweet, founder of the famous Texas Siftings, with the pen names of "Col. Bill Snort" and "Rev. Whangdoodle,' died in New York a few days since. A general strike has been ordered by the Order of Machinists in all shops in the country where a nine hour day has not been granted. A minimum wage scale is also demanded by the men. The order embraces some 50,000 men, but in a large number of places the nine-hour day has already been allowed.

The General Assembly of the Cumberland Presbyterian church in session at West Point, Miss, refuses to change the name of the church. 
