



Desiccated Milk.

Desiccated milk is one of the newer food products and is prepared by causing a spray of ordinary fresh milk to enter a tank filled with hot air. The "atomized" fluid is carried upward, and, its moisture being discharged in the form of vapor, the solid part of it is thrown down in another receptacle in the shape of a dry powder. Put up in suitable packages, this powder will keep fresh and good for a long time and is readily made available for use by the addition of boiling water.

Bologna's Leaning, Towers.

Bologna's two square leaning towers. the Gariseada and the Asinelli, which are more startling than the tower at Pisa, are safe. A rumor was started that they showed signs of weakening. but a commission of engineers pronounces them as solid as ever. The Asinelli tower is 315 feet high and was built in 1109. BAD AIR IN THEATERS.

A Boston Professor Says It Is Due to Downward Ventilation.

Professor S. Homer Woodbridge of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Boston believes that the chief cause of bad air and annoying drafts in the modern church or theater is the use of the so called "downward" method of ventilation, whereby fresh air is introduced at the ceiling while outlets are provided for the vitiated air in the floor. The principle of this method, he says, is obviously wrong in that the fresh air drawn in at the ceiling is cooler than the air immediately surrounding the audience, and, since the warmer air tends to ascend in spite of every effort to draw it out through floor openings, a state of unstable equilibrium is created which results in drafts, fitful or steady as the case may be.

Professor Woodbridge recommends in place of downward ventilation the adoption of exactly the reverse method, or upward ventilation, stating that the results obtained by the latter have in many cases been. extraordinary. Thus in the hall of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology the "Increment," or increase during the occupation of the hall, of carbon dioxide, the presence of which is an indication of certain poisonous elements in the air attending its use by many breathers, sank from 14.86 under previous conditions to 1.92. Professor Woodbridge's experiments were extended with simllar results to the legislative halls of the Maine statehouse, the new chambers of the Massachusetts and Rhode Island legislatures and the senate chamber, the house of representatives and the supreme court in Washington. More generally interesting, however, are the results which he gives for several of the large Boston theaters. In one of these, near the close of a performance during which the seats were well filled and many persons were standing, the carbon dioxide increment was found to be less than 1.6 in 10,000 parts of air. The increment is natu rally greater in the balconies than on the orchestra floor, due, of course, to the fact that they do not receive the full benefit of the flow of air from below, but even here the results are far superior, Professor Woodbridge says. to these obtained by the common methods of downward ventilation, where the carbon dioxide increment under "Who's Who In America?" a book that phy lesson was similar conditions has been found to cauge from 15 to 45.

OFFICE OF CHIEF POISONER

Generally Known That This Government Maintains One.

In a little house in south Washington is located a federal institution without which the Smithsonian institution and National museum could not exist. It is the department of the chief poisoner, Mr. Joseph Farmer. The office of chief poisoner was not unusual in countries ruled by despots. but it may be a surprise to many to learn that such an office is maintained by our own republican form of administration.

However, Mr. Farmer, unlike his contemporaries in Turkey, Spain, Arabia, etc., is not engaged in putting obnoxious and exuberant statesmen out of the way, but in placing the objects on exhibit in the institution and museum beyond the reach of thieves, rust and cockroaches.

Everything that is received by these institutions, whether it is a rare book, a Filipino bolo or a stuffed and mounted animal, is sent to Mr. Farmer to be poisoned. He is an expert in the preparation and use of preservative compounds. For stuffed animals and birds he finds that arsenical compounds bring the best results. Every object of metal receives a coating of something that prevents rust, while fabrics, basketry, silks, furs, etc., are poisoned in much the same manner 23 stuffed animals.

Even the shelves and cases of the museum in which the objects are placed have passed through Mr. Farmroach to think that he is walking over a redhot iron the minute he strikes their surface. By these means the museum is forever freed from vermin. Even the bones of the bottle nosed whale will on their arrival next April be treated to a poisoning process for fear some new variety of insect might undertake to prey on their softer parts. -Washington Post.






