## EDISON TALKS OF FLYING

 Tells Santos-Dumont to Get Ri of His Balloon
## Thomas A. Edison believes

 that mankind ought to be asham ed of itself because the problem of aerial navigation of human beings was not solved years ago He also makes the statement he also makes the statemen that, while Santos-Dumont has done a great thing in steering airships about through the air it will be a long timg before any contrivance for air navigation is commercially possible, because no inventor will be able to secur any reward for his labor in this line of work under the present tas lits make this great possibility practical he thinks it will be necessary to establish sort of protective academy o invention, which shall reward the successful inventor of the commercial airship."I was down in Florida recent ly and one day I watched a bi bird--I think it was a vulturethat floated about in the air whole hour without moving it wings perceptibly. When God made that bird he gave it machine to fly with, but he didn't give it much else $H$ gave the bird a very small H with which a very small brain with which to direct the move ments of the machine, but he gave to a man a much large he bird.
Mr. Edison is not the first to make such a comparison, but when he talked in this way the other day to Santos-Dumont there was a world of meaning in the words. The wizard of the laboratory was much interested in the young man who has startled Paris and the world ity steering an airship over the times.
"You are the only man who has done such a thiug." exclaim ed Mr. Edison.
"I am sure you have neve worked on the problem of aerial navitation." replied SantosDumont, "or you would have than I have done now :
The aeronaut was.
The aeronaut was not trying to be complimentary. He has Edison and his inventive for Mr Edison and his inventive genius. "I don't know about that," said Edison. "I did take it up several years ago and built
a specially light motor to be operated by exploding gunpowder. I experimented a lot in lifting weights with it, but I
worked with a small model and did not attempt to fly. gave it all up because I had a number of other things to do which were far more profitable. "I tell you," he went on earnestly. "if the patent office only protected the inventor sufficiently the problem of aeria navigation wordd of aerial solved thirty years ago."
Santos-Dumont looked at Edison with some surprise and turn ed to M. Aime, his companion, to remark that had the laws been right the thing would have bee
done before he was done before he was born.
Mr. Edison saw the discomfiture of his guest and remarked
"But you are are all righ You are on the right track. You have made an airship and you have steered it and you have made a step toward the fina solution of the problem. Keep at it, but get rid of your balloon. "Have ymaller ail the time. on," inquired the aeronaut, that I am making the balloo smaller every time I build a new airship?"
"Yes, and that's right," replied Edison, "but make it smaller yet. You are doing the thing commercially possible. When
you get your balloon part you get your balloon part
smaller and yet smaller until it smaller and yet smaller until it
so small that you can not see it with a microscope, then you will have 1t. Then you will have olved the problem.
Here. in a nutshell, is Mr. Edison's solution of the problem f aerial navigation. He believes irmly that it can be solved. But e belives just firmly that the solution must be be reached by eans of the flying machine, and ot by the airship.
Only with the machine, he ays, can air navigation ever be made either safe or commer cially profitable. This will be cear to che reader when it is explained that in Mr. Edison's vocabulary the term "airship" applies to a contrivance that being lighter than the air, floats it as a ship floats" on the ater. The term "flying achine," on the other hand refers, as he uses it, to a con-
trivance heavier than the air it s intended to navigate.
At rest such an apparatus ould nut float at all, the powde of flotation being furnished by he high speed at which it moves. In Edison's mind, then, aerial navigation is simply a question of sufficient motive power, properly applied, vercome the lack of boyancy, to make the machine rise and keep it in motion to hold it in a position a certain number of feet efers the earth. He constantly hich anyone may see rise and ly at will.
"Take the case of the vulture,' e said. "Here is a natural fly ing machine which is a thousand times as heavy as the air it dis places. In a few seconds of eisurely night it can sweep over a distance which man finds encumbered with all sorts of obstacles, and there is scarcely a flutter of its wings in the
operation
"There is nothing there but a machine and a small brain, and it is not a very remarkable machine, either. Why is it that man can not make a flying machine as efficient as the bird? "A lot of people say that it was never meant that man should fly, hat if nature had intended such thing man would have been provided with the necessary machinery for the body, such as is now possessed by the bird But you might just as well say hat it was never intended that man should have any light aside rom the sun and the moon and tars which were originally pro vided for him, or that we should ot move about faster with the id of wheels because no wheel were supplied to him by nature,' -New York Sun
